I visited the Takarma Middle school to-day. It has been provisionally recognized as M.E. school with effect from the 1st January, 1922 (vide Memo. No. 1775, dated the 15th December, 1921 from the Inspector of schools, Chotanagpur Division to the address of the District Inspector of school , Ranchi).

The duplication of class V with only 15 boys in each section is a provision ^{admitting larger than the number of boys} for admissible in that class who are expected to seek admission to this school after completing the lower primary course in the neighbouring schools. The infants of classes II and I read with the girls in the adjoining Girls' U.P. school located in the same compound as the M.E. school 95 per cent of the total number of boys are Christian aborigines. The rates of fees levied are -/10/-, -/8/-, -/6/- and -/4/- in class VIII, VII, and VI and V respectively and -/2/- in each of the last two classes, Re 1/4 in each of the first two classes, Re 1/4 ⁱⁿ each of the two classes below and -/4/- in each of the last two classes. The authorities of the school have evidently adopted the scale of fees prescribed in Art. 277 of the Code for Govt. Middle Vernacular schools with slight deviation in the case of classes VII to III but it is not clear why the non-aboriginal boys should be charged at a higher rate than the one prescribed for M.E. schools in the same article. This anomaly should die out. The managers are at liberty to adopt the

The reason for levying higher fees has been stated in my letter of 3.12.21. In that letter I have asked your permission to levy these fees.

lower scale for the aborigines as prescribed in Art 277 (2) and the higher one for non-aboriginals as laid down in the same article but without sanction from proper authority they can not levy fees at special rates.

2. Accommodation.

The school is held in a residential bungalow having verandahs on all sides except the west which was never designed and intended to serve the purposes of an educational building. Accordingly into some of the rooms sufficient light is not admitted as for example in those at present occupied by classes VIII and V B. The capacity of the class rooms at 10 sq feet per pupil may be judged from the dimensions noted below :--

Accommodation as indicated above is more than sufficient for the present roll number. No room has, been allotted to class III which meets in a verandah yielding sufficient floor space for the present number of boys in that class.

3. Condition of Residence.

Of the total number of boys 102 are boarders, 2 are living with their parents and 23 with guardians. The records of the school, however, do not show how local guardians have been appointed.

4. Financial condition.

The school income is derived from private sources only - (1) from fees and (2) the mission contributions. The average monthly income from the former does not exceed Rs 20/- but the monthly expenditure amounts to Rs 244/- as detailed below.

The managers therefore contribute Rs 224/- per mensem towards the maintenance of the school.

5. The Committee of Management.

A Committee of Management as known to the Department is ⁱⁿ not existence. The Head Supervisor of the Lutheran schools and Secretary to the Advisory Board is in direct charge of the school.

6. The Teaching staff.

The staff thus appears to be exceptionally strong for M.E. school in respect of the number of its members but for the very reason it is also open to objection in as much as it exceeds the standard scale (Art. 318) by almost half as many as the Department will ordinarily allow for a school of this class. Assigning an additional Master to one of the duplicated classes, it is doubtful if the managers are justified in maintaining an extra staff of three teachers. In point of qualification as well there should have been one more Vernacular Mastership certificate holder on the staff and the Assistant English master should have passed the same examination as the Headmaster (note i' to Art. 318)

7. Furniture.

Dual desk of approved design have been provided for class

If funds are available, which we hope there will be, we shall appoint another English Master with the same qualifications as the present one. We shall decrease the staff.

More furniture will be supplied when more funds are available
VI only. In classes VIII and VII the old-fashioned long writing desks are in use. In the remaining classes the boys sit on mats. The kind of desks last mentioned though cumbersome are yet serviceable and should gradually make room for those of up-to-date design. Black Boards, chairs and teachers' tables are sufficient in number.

8. Equipment.

Reference to library and maps will be supplied
Probably no Lutheran school of the Middle status is so ill equipped as the one at Takarma. There is no library attached to the school. The prescribed text books alone have been provided. Of maps even those of Asia, Europe and Africa are wanting. The last three together with a good map of Division are indispensable for a Middle school. There is sufficient supply of pictures representing animals life but none to serve as an aid to the study of Plant life. Even if the pleasure garden attached to the bungalow is not used as a school garden there is ample space for one in the school compound.

9. School Records.

The attention of the Head Master has been called to the defects. Orders have been issued to maintain all the required registers and records for M. E. schools.
Of the school account books, registers and other records (1) the register of Transfer certificate issued (2) the book in which the Transfer certificates received are preserved (3) the acquittance roll of teachers and (4) the progress book are maintained in form. The Admission Register in use is kept in the form prescribed for the L. P. schools. The Marks Register is not a clean record. The Instances of overwriting and mutilation of figures are in evidence. The cash Book is only a record of the monthly fee collection and of payments. No separate fee collection register is maintained nor an acquittance roll of scholars although there is at present one L. P. scholarship holder in the school.

10. Recommendation.

Concerning fees for Marginal note in para 1.
The school may be finally recognised provided :--

(1) Fees are levied according to a prescribed scale either under Art. 277 or 278 and that any deviation from this or that scale receives the sanction of the proper authority.

(2). Steps are taken to admit adequate light into the class rooms or if that be not feasible to move the school to a

more suitable building. Of the other three buildings in the same compound both boys' hostel and the girls U.P. school with a slight modification as for instance by breaking open windows where necessary, can best serve the purpose of a school house.

(3) Local guardians are duly recognised by the Headmaster on the written authority of the parents or the real guardians of the boys who do not reside with their parents or in the hostel.

In case of admission of the school to grant-in-aid we shall be supplied with the amount the Departmental Rules allow.

(4) If at any time hereafter the managers apply for Government grant, the additional cost of maintaining an extra staff over and above the standard scale except in the case of the duplication of classes on the increase in the roll number or the adoption of an additional Vernacular, is not made a ground for a larger grant than is admissible under the rules.

(5) A Reference Library is opened and the maps suggested in paragraph 8 are provided.

(6) The registers prescribed in Art. 133 for a school of the Middle class are maintained.

The school superintendent is obliged to abide by all the Departmental Rules

(7) The authorities of the school undertake to abide by all the Departmental rules applicable to recognised schools

SIR,

With reference to your letter no 4805/32-5-2 dated 18th September 1920 exempting the Sub Inspector of schools Monoharpur circle from visiting the mission schools in his circle I have the honour to state that the exemption has created the following difficulties:—

- (1) The Sub Inspector has ceased to draw up bills in favour of these schools on the ground that they are not under his inspection.
- (2) The mission officer in charge of these schools has not submitted bills perhaps thinking that his bills may not be accepted by the District Board with the result that bills for months together have not ^{yet} been ~~drawn up~~ drawn up.
- (3) The District Board or myself have not been kept informed about the schools and their works by copies of inspection remarks.

With

With a view to remedy the short coming
pointed out above I beg to suggest

- (1) That the Sub Inspector Gachoud Monsharfan
circle may be asked to visit the schools
once a year
- (2) That the mission officer in charge of these
schools may be requested to submit quarterly
bills as well as the arrears bills to the Sub Inspector
for submission to the chairman District Board
with his countersignature as it is the Sub Inspectors
alone who have been authorised by the rules
of the Department to submit stipendiary bills
to the District Board.
- (3) That the mission officers in charge of the
schools may be requested to furnish me with
copies of his inspection remarks for communica-
tion to the District Board if necessary
- (4) That a statement showing the names of
schools and their teachers with their qualification
and the amounts of stipends sanctioned by
the District Board may be submitted to the District
Board for reference when passing bills.

The same procedure and principle may be
adopted as regards the Primary schools of
other circles in charge of the mission officers.
The Head Supervisor of the G.E.L. Mission schools
may kindly be requested to see that his subordinates
act up to the above suggestions if approved
by you.



I inspected the Gobindpur G. E. L. Mission M.E. school to-day.

1. Statistics of Attendance.

Of the total No. of 157 boys on the rolls distributed as follows :-

3 are Mohamadans, 14 Hindus, 121 Christians and 18 Non-Christian Aborigines.

In class VI there are two L. P. scholars who read free. The fees charged are -/4/- per head in the first two classes, -/3/- in classes VI and V, -/2/- in the two lower and -/1/- in the last two. These rates do not conform even to the lowest scale prescribed for aborigines in note 2 to Art. 277. The percentage of attendance for the last six months has been 79 against 88 for the corresponding period last year. This bespeaks of laxity in enforcing regular attendance. When both the average roll No. and the average daily attendance have considerably increased being 162 and 128 against 129 and 115, the percentage of attendance should have risen higher than 79.

2. Condition of Residence.

69 boys live in the school hostel, 8 in messes, 66 with parents and 14 with near relatives but no record was forthcoming to show that (1) the messes had been duly licenced or approved in writing by the Head Master under Art. 616 of the Code or (2) letters of

authority appointing near relatives as responsible local guardinas demanded from the parents.

3. Financial aspect.

The income and expenditure of the school for the past three years could not be ascertained from the records in Head Master's office but from the information furnished by that officer the following figures may be accepted to represent approximately the receipts and disbursements of the year 1920.

Excepting therefore a small contribution from fee income the whole cost of maintenance is borne by the mission itself.

4. Committee of Management.

The school is managed by an Advisory Board and not by a Committee constituted under Art. 311 of the Code on which all classes of the community from which the school population is drawn are duly represented. The statistics of attendance shows that the school is attended by 14 Hindus, 3 Musalmans and 18 Non-christian Aborigines.

5. The Teaching staff.

The establishment charges as shown above, amount to Rs 209/- or deducting the pay of No. 6 who is a temporary teacher and of No. 7 who is a teacher of Theology, to Rs 189/- or Rs 29/- in excess of the standard scale inclusive of Rs 15/- for contingent charges prescribed for a school of this class in Art. 318 of the Code. The Authorities thus spend Rs 29/- + Rs 15/- = Rs 44/- per mensem on the teaching staff as shown above for which there is ~~no~~ no justification as neither has any class been duplicated nor an additional medium of instruction adopted.

6. Library and Prizes.

No funds are annually allotted under either of the above two heads nevertheless the present stock of all kinds of books in the library which number 460 is sufficient for the purposes of a Middle English school. Since January last 68 books have been issued to the students.

7. Furniture and Equipment.

No desk of standard design is in use in this school. Old fashioned long desks have been provided in all the classes except the last two in which boys sit on mats. It is desirable that ~~that~~ these cumbrous articles should be replaced by desks of modern designs as they unnecessarily minimise the floor space which in their absence might have been more usefully utilised. There is a sufficient supply of tables, chairs and almirahs. *Map, charts and Black boards are enough for the*

present purposes of the school but one Hindi map of the Division and another of the District in the same language should be provided. Some of the Black boards require a coat of paint.

8. Accommodation.

The school building extends east and west with a verandah on the north instead of on the south, the class rooms, however, being sufficiently lighted. The following figures give an idea of the capacity of these rooms at 10 sq.ft. a head :-

Thus the accommodation available for present ~~max~~ roll No. is sufficient. It is to the credit of the Head Master that the buildings are kept neat and ~~exam~~ tidy.

9. School Registers and Account Books.

(1) Admission Register - Admission rules are not followed strictly. As for instance; (1) Roll No. 149 was admitted without a declaration although this was a case of first admission and (2) Roll Nos. 191 and 192 were admitted into classes IV and V from classes III and IV of their former school without transfer certificates.

(2) Fines Book :-- Fines are imposed by Head Master at the rate of -/1/- per diem and the income derived from this source is spent by him on the purchase of books for the library and on Games and sports. Attention, in this connection, is invited to Art. 316 (14) of the Code.

(3) Fee collection Book;-- It was found almost blank. Fees are collected at any time during the year.

(4) Cash Book :-- In January, 1921, Rs 240/- is shown on the receipt side and Rs 244/- on that of the expenditure. Now the extra charge was met was not shown. Overwritings and entries in pencil should be avoided.

(5) Marks Register :-- Mutilation of figures should be discontinued. (vide entry against No. 10 in class V).

10. Teaching

I examined the first three classes in English Hindi, History, Geography and Science, and the Sub Inspector of schools, Karra circle who accompanied me, the rest of the classes, in all the subjects of their study. The results attained were on the whole good.

11. Recommendation.

I recommend that the school be recognised as Middle English School provided the authorities thereof agree :---

(1) To adopt for the present, the scale of fees for aborigines in Middle schools prescribed in Art. 277(note 2) at page 131 of the Code.

(2) To abide by leave rules as laid down in Arts. 260 and 261 to regular attendance.

(3). To licence under the provisions of Art. 616, the messes in which some of the students, as stated elsewhere, are said to be living.

(4) To form a representative committee of management under Art. 311.

(5) To cut down the monthly charges of establishment to the scale prescribed in Art. 318 or as an alternative, not to make the excess expenditure on the staff a basis for applying for larger

I visited the Lohardaga G. E. L. Mission Middle English School on the above date.

1. Statistics of Attendance.

94 boys out of 102 on the rolls were present at inspection. Of the latter number 20 are non-Christians Aborigines, 79 Christian Aborigines, 2 Hindus and one Musalman. The number of free students is only 2 both being L. P. Scholars. Fees are charged as shown below :--

No fee is charged to the Infants of class I & who read free along with the Girls of that form in the Girls U. P. School. 2. Accommodation appears to be sufficient.

Condition of residence.

48 students live in the school building used as hostel, 43 with parents, 9 in recognised messes and 2 with near relatives but there is nothing on record to show that (1) those living in messes are under the direct control of

of the Head Master (Vide Art. 585 of the Code) and (2) that in the case of the last two the provisions of Art. 613 (11) and Art. 616 have been complied with.

3. Financial Condition.

The following figures show the income and the expenditure of the school during the year 1920:-

Even if the Head Master's information about Government contribution or aid of Rs 80/- is correct, it is obvious that almost the whole cost of maintenance is borne by the Mission authorities. I need not therefore enter into the question - how is the deficit met ?.

4. The Committee of Management.

The school is not governed by a representative managing Committee constituted under Art. 311 but by an Advisory Board on which all classes of the Community as contemplated in Art. 312 (1) are represented. To safeguard the interest of the 20 non-Christian Aborigines on the rolls the appointment of a member of that class is desirable.

5. The teaching staff.

The staff, thus, is numerically more than adequate but academically it is weak in one respect viz, the qualification of the second master (English teacher) who is matriculate only (vide note (1) to Art. 318 of the Code). It is not clear why the authorities should spend so much as Rs 218/- per mensem on the establishment charges alone. The employment of 3 extra teachers too seems unjustifiable as neither has any class been duplicated nor an additional medium of instruction adopted.

6. Library and Prizes.

The number of English and Hindi books in the Library including text books and religious tracts does not exceed 125 and 231, respectively. Prizes were last distributed in 1913 separate funds have not been provided either for the former or the latter.

7. Furniture and Equipment.

~~The number of English~~ Eighteen dual desks of approved designs have been provided for classes VIII and VII and VI and III. The eight old fashioned long desks in use in classes IV and V which unnecessarily encroach upon floor space should make room for ~~the~~ up-to-date dual desks. The other articles of furniture are sufficient for the purposes of the school except that another almirah and a map rack seem to be its immediate requirements. The supply of maps, sheets and charts is adequate but a Hindi map of the Division and a map of the District in the same la

language are badly needed.

8. The School building.

The school building extends north and south with a verandah on the west. The class rooms are sufficiently lighted. We may ask the authorities to construct a new school house extending east and west with a verandah on the south but we need not refuse recognition if they fail to comply with our requisition for want of funds. The school building, however, should not be used as dormitories and the sooner the authorities provide a separate boarding house the better for the health of those who occupy the former for double purpose.

9. School Registers and Account books.

(1) Cash book - shows every transaction for which the Head Master receives remittance from the Secretary to the Advisory Board. School receipts and expenditure should alone be shown here.

(2) Acquittance Roll - Payments should be acknowledged both in figures and words. The teachers have been paid up to June but the two L. P. scholars in this school up to April. The Head master informs me that their scholarships for May and June have been billed for. Office copies of scholarships bills should be kept.

(3) Daily collection Register - is not kept properly. Art. 183(iv) of the Code will show that it is a fee register (in schools where fees are levied).

(4) Marks Register - is kept but figures should not be erased, overwritten or mutilated. A wrong total or entry may be corrected by drawing a red line through it over or under the initials of the officer who makes the correction.

(5) Transfer Certificate Issue - The counterfoi

ls of Transfer certificates issued are kept but not in the prescribed form. For want of necessary information the checking of age becomes an elaborate process. The departmental form should be adopted.

10. Teaching.

I examined the first two classes in all the subjects of their study and the two local Sub-Inspectors who accompanied me classes VI-II. The results attained were fairly satisfactory except except in class VI in which English is not taught properly.

11. Recommendation.

I recommend that the school be recognised as Middle English School provided the authorities agree :-

(1) To adopt a higher scale of fees than the present one.

(2) To comply with the provisions of Art. 65 with regard to the boys who are said to be living in messes.

(3) To form a committee of management under Art. 311.

(4) Not to apply for larger initial grant-in-aid than is admissible under the rules merely on the ground of the extra staff employed.

(5) To fix an annual allowance for the Library as well as for prizes and keep the two accounts separately.

(6) To maintain the registers prescribed in Art. 188.

(7) To abide by all the Departmental rules that should be observed by recognised Middle English Schools specially those laid down in Section VIII of the Education Code.

No. 4806, dated 18th September, 1920, I have the honour to state that the District Inspector of schools, Singhbhum, has reported to me that the Sub-Inspector of schools, Monoharpur Circle, has discontinued preparation of stipend bills in favour of teachers of Lutheran Primary schools in the district of Singhbhum on the ground that they are not under his control. The Supervisor of Lutheran schools, Chakradharpur Circle, has not, it is reported, submitted stipend bills for ~~many~~ months together. Would you please see that the arrear stipends are drawn as soon as possible, and that stipend bills are drawn up and submitted to the District Board of Singhbhum for payment regularly in future ? The money may be disbursed by you, with the special grant of Rs 1700/- a month.

In this connection I have to request you to be so good as to instruct the Supervisor Sub-Inspector of schools (i) to furnish the District Inspector of schools, Singhbhum with copies of inspection notes on the Lutheran Mission schools for communication to the District Board, if necessary, and (ii) to furnish the District Board of Singhbhum with a statement showing (a) the names of schools, (b) the names of teachers serving in them, and their qualifications and (c) the amount of stipend for each school, as sanctioned by the District Board for reference when passing stipend bills. The recognition of these schools is still under consideration. Your report on ~~these~~ each school should deal, in detail, with the following :-

- (1) Teaching staff and their qualifications and pay.
- (2) Scale of fees, class by class.

- (5) General remarks, including definite suggestions about the Departmental requirements which the school authorities are to fulfill.

Replying to your D.O. No.2294-5-R-1-21, dated the 16th July, I see that I did not make my meaning clear. Perhaps the following statement will be clearer:-

The Advisory Board applies all the Government Grants to the purposes specified by the Director's instructions in the "Proceedings of the Committee appointed to suggest temporary arrangements for the management of the Lutheran Schools," dated 26th September, 1919, and signed by G.E. Fawcus. These total Government Grants do not cover the expenditure there outlined. The Advisory Board supplies the deficit monthly from funds received from Lutheran friends in America.

In addition to this deficit, the Advisory Board pays the whole cost of the five schools under discussion, less fee receipts. Not a rupee of Government Grants Provincial, District, or Municipal, has been spent upon these five schools since I became Head Supervisor. The reason I am so sure of this is that all payment of their salaries and minor expenses has been handled by me personally.

Applying this statement to your specific inquiries:-

Para. 1-a). The Government Grants or portions thereof were not spent on any of the five schools in 1920, while I was Head Supervisor, nor indeed so far in 1921.

b). "Outside money" maintained in 1920 not only the deficit on Primary Schools, but also the much larger deficit on these five Middle Schools. I might add that the Advisory Board also find "outside money" to meet the deficit in the Ranchi Boys High School.

Para. 2. The answer is, Yes.

Possibly he confused what was spent from Government Grants on the Primary Schools in the Burju Ilaka, outside of Burju Station.

2. Accommodation.

The school is at present held in three different buildings but all situated in one and the same spacious compound. The first is a bungalow of which four rooms are utilised to accommodate classes VIII, VII, VI-A and V-A but being a residential house every part of the class rooms is not equally lighted nor is it possible to admit light from the north (Article 736). The second block of building is the old Girls' School in which classes VI-B, V-B, IV and III are held as also class VII which has

This building in which the rooms stand in one row and are sufficiently lighted faces north with a verandah on the same side and windows on the opposite. The third building is the Boarding house of which two rooms on the south are used as class rooms for classes II and I. This building faces east and west with verandahs on both sides. In the southernmost room light is admitted from all the sides except north and in the adjoining room on the north from east and west only. The ceiling needs immediate repairs. The capacity of every one of class rooms at 10 sq. feet for each student may be judged from the dimensions noted below :-

It will thus appear that rooms Nos. (2), (4) and (6) to (8) do not afford sufficient accommodation. These together with No. (9) are less than 15 feet in breadth. (Article 734).

3. Condition of Residence of the students :--

Of the total number of 199 students, 161 are living in the School hostel, 26 with parents, 3 with near relations and 9 with guardians recognised by the Head Master but the School records do not show how the local guardians are appointed.

4. Financial condition.

The school income is derived from the Government subsidy and the fees only. In 1920, Rs 2028/- was received from Government and Rs 283/- collected as fees. In the same year the expenditure under different heads amounted to Rs 2364/- detailed as follows :-

7. Furniture.

The first five classes have been provided with 12 benches and desks and the last three with mats. With the exception of 11 dual desks of standard design all the remaining benches and desks are all cumbersome and old fashioned but are serviceable and should gradually make room for these of up-to-date types. Black Boards chairs and tables are sufficient for the present purpose of the school.

8. Equipment.

No school of the Middle class in the district is so well stocked with Library Books both English and Hindi. A manuscript catalogue is also maintained. Some of the text books as for instance Hindi Reader for class VI or Hindi Grammar for class VIII, have not been supplied. No Loan Book has yet been opened. There is an adequate supply of maps, Charts and Sheets both in English and Hindi but a good Hindi map of the Province and one or two of the District in the same language should be provided. At present, however, there is no provision for a school garden but there is ample space for it in the compound and the Headmaster has promised to lay out one as soon as the rains set in.

9. General Remarks :--

boys were found lacking. This can be done by plenty of
judicious questioning and the exaction of intelligent re-
plies. Babu Z. Soy the last teacher did not appear to be
familiar with the teaching of so simple a subject as the
Action Songs. In Drill the boys seemed to be out of pra-
ctice but I admired the teacher for his smartness.
