THE plates included in this work are a selection from those which were published in 1825 by Lewis Vulliamy, the architect, on his return from the tour which he made through Greece, Asia Minor, and Italy, as Travelling Student of the Royal Academy. The volume in which they appeared was entitled Examples of Ornamental Sculpture in Architecture, drawn from the Originals in the Years 1818-21, long since out of print and now practically unobtainable. The plates display in their spirited execution an intimate appreciation of the refinement and vigour which characterizes the best work in Athens and Rome, and form an exceptionally fine series of illustrations of the choicest examples.

The acquisition of the original copper plates by the Publisher has afforded the opportunity of re-issuing a selection of the most interesting subjects at a price within the reach of most students. In making the selection the whole of the Greek examples, and a few of the more important of those in Rome and Italy, have been included, and it is believed the series will prove to be of great value to students, not only on account of the large scale to which the drawings are made, but because they include elaborate examples of Greek carving which are not to be found elsewhere. There is still some further interest attached to them, as in some cases they are the only representations known of antique fragments which have since disappeared, whilst in others the ninety years which have passed since they were drawn have led to their partial mutilation. The plates, which have been carefully printed from the original copper engravings, present all the sharpness and brilliancy of the first printings, and they are accompanied by short descriptive notes.
