Dear Dieter,

How are things in Germany? Do you have allready more achievements in the succession of Erhard? Did you see Gudrun allready? How was your journey to India? Was the conference interesting in Madras?

Now some more explanantion to the enclosed revised contract of the EEC. The delegate was disappointed that Gossner considers to step out of the programme. But he accepts that I will finish the programme until June, so the present agreement is than fullfilled by Gossner Mission. However, since I am not fully involved, but about half of my time (at least) goes in the programme, he feels that some amendments regarding the fees should be made. Too big changes, however cannot be made, according to the discussion, since costs like the second assistant, the typist and the driver are carried by Gossner Mission at present, awaiting the new extended agreement after June, which now will not have place.

Please let me know if you can agree to the revised agreement, so I can sign it here in the office.

2. Mr. D.Macrae and myself went through all the projects which could be finished in June. One of them is the waterscheme in Livingstone, which only need fittings, which are not available in Zambia.

Izaak has requested proforma's in Botswanak and Zimbabwe, and even went there, without results. Now the request is, could you find out

if the items on enclosed list are obtainable in Germany and how much

it would cost to airfreight them to Zambia from Germany.

May be you could ask WEM. Would it be possible for Gossner Mission to prefinance this, and get a refund from the EEC?

EEC cannot spend forex on Microprojects programme.

So the refund will be Kwacha for the project. Please let me know as soon as possible. We also are still looking in the possibility of getting them in Botswana, since my assistance has gone there for a course and will try to find out the matter. If they would be available (which I doubt), could you then consider to pay them in Botwswana, so the freight is less expensive?

Anyway, let me know the German costs + freight as soon as possible, so I can continue the discussion with the EEC on the subject.

Dear Mr. van Melle,

I am very sorry that we could not so far come to a clear decision concerning the succession of Mr. Izaak Krisifoe as an EEC Micro Project Coordinator. Since there will be a change also in our Liaison Office and up to now we have not been able to get a new Zambia secretary, we have come to the conclusion that at the present stage Gossner Mission will not continue to organize this programme as an NGO for the EC. This may change when we have settled the other things with our own staff after some months, if the EC have not found any other organisation to take over the responsibiltly for this programme. We also decided already for a person as sucessor for Sietske Krisifoe in our Liaison Office at Lusaka. Therefore at the moment there would be no point in negiotiating with Mr. Aantjes. Most probably I shall visit Zambia in May or June this year, if things look different at that time I would try to contact Mr. Aantjes in Harare in connection with my visit to Zambia.

I hope you can understand our present situation which has caused some uncertainty to the candidate whom you suggested to us. We do hope that things become clearer for us within the next few months.

Pending completion of your forthcoming discussions with the co-operative unions, I think it would make sense to support NGO's efforts to procure seeds to the farmers in the areas where those NGO's have been established for many years and where they have on-going development activities.

I would therefore suggest that the Delegation transfers to the Gosner Mission, out of the funds earmarked for EEC assistance to the Gwembe Valley, the amount of 100,000 Kwacha needed for the purchase of seeds to be used in the 1987-88 season. The Delegation would accept that the seeds are sold to the farmers at the usual prices, under the condition that the proceeds are used, as proposed in Mrs Krisifoe's letter, for building storage facilities in the area.



Dear Erhard,

Izaak J. Krisifoe P.O.Box 50162 Lusaka. 30th June 1987

How are you? About thee weeks ago I was very sick, an asthma attack, maybe caused by the changing weather, at present it is cold and very very windy with a lot of dust in the air. But I am OK again. Also Sietske has recovered fully from her malaria and is very busy again. She has moved the last few months very often to the Valley for various meetings. She is leaving to-morrow morning very early for the Valley to attend the budget meeting on Wednesday and on Thursday the staff-meeting, and will be back on Friday. I will leave on Thursday morning for meeting in Kabwe and from there I shall procede to Ndola Twere I will meet Mr. Mac Rae. On Friday -morning we will be taken to Chilubi Island in Lake Bangwelu, Northern Province by the Flying Doctor's Service to see

some projects there. I hope to be back on Saterday for a long weekend till Tuesday the 7th July, because of public holidays. Immediately after that I shall leave on 8th Wednesday-morning for Mbala District in the Northern Province to inspect one of the funded projects there. Shall be back on the 11th. As you will see in the enclosed report all the funds for the Lome II are committed. All together there will be 67-microprojects taken up all the 1.920.000. -- ECU even with an over-estimate of about 250,000. -- ECUs. Microprojects no. 1-35 have been approved by both the EEC and GRZ for funding. Microprojects no. 36-50 are approved by NCDP and are awaiting to be sand to Finance and EEC. Microprojects no.51-67 have been approved by the district and provincial authorities and are being prepared for submission to NCDP, after which they will be presented to Finance and the EEC. I hope this process will be completed by the end of July1987. So, that more time can be given to the real funding and monotoring of it. From the first group of 15-microprojects, 5-microproject are completed only small jobs are remaining. The other projects are on different levels of progress. They are all affected by the shortage of building materails.

As we agreed during your visit, I have employed a secretary/typist to assist me. With the effect of the first of June Miss Mary Mulenga is employed. I also managed to get the room next to my office for her, which is good and handy. Already now nexticed I can noticed her assistance. More administration work is done and visitors now can at least be told where I am and appointments can be made for them to see me. I enclosed a copy of commaratt that I have made for her and the first payment made.

I have just completed the First Implementation report, which is now with the EEC and the GRZ. A second one is wanted in October and out of the two a basic indecative report will be made in November for Lome III.

Mr.MacRae has mentioned the sunflower project proposal to Brussels. What do you need immediately for the applecation as am NGO to EEC in Brussels. Please let may have your reply as early as you can, so that I can conclude the project proposal. Sietske will be in Holand during the period 25th August till the 21st September and should be able to take the report. As you suggest, you both could take the request to Brussels and discuss it.

Is there any further progress on the KfW? Buleya Malima will get financial assistance from the Japanese. Funds are still to be released from Finance, I am keeping one eye on it from the NCDP which is the same Ministry. I hope to attend the GSDP-staff meeting in August and shall try to attend at least one meeting every quarter. By that time the Makonkoto Sec. School will be financed by the microprojects programme and I abve to be there anyway to monitor the progressmade. By attending the GSDP meetings I hope to remain up-to-date informed and be more of assistance to the project.

Dear Erhard we had last night the pastor group for dinner together with the sr.members of the CCZ. I had hoped to give this letter with them but was stuck due to the visit from two Germans. One from the GDI-Berlin, who wanted to see the work of the Gossner Mission. Sietske will attend to them. The gentleman from Berlin will bring this letter to Berlin.

Contractual arrangements following the death of Mr Isaac Krisifoe Subject:

Since Mr Isaac Krisifoe passed away on 26 September 1987 the above project has been officially without a project coordinator.

I understand that the Gossner Mission are actively searching for a suitable replacement and are expected to provide the curricula vitae of at least two candidates in the very near future. It is expected, subject to our mutual agreement, that a suitable candidate could be appointed before the end of November 1987.

For the time being Mrs S Krisifoe, the Gossner Mission Representative, who is well acquainted with the details of the programme, is working as temporary coordinator. If you are agreeable to this, I would propose that we regard Mrs S Krisifoe officially as the microprojects coordinator for the interim

In order for payments to the projects to be made during this period it will be necessary for her to be added as a signatory on the programme's imprest account.

At the time of his death Mr Krisifoe had accumulated a certain amount of leave to his credit. If the leave entitlement is carried forward to the end of November only the last week of October needs to be worked to complete that month.

It is hoped that a permanent replacement coordinator can be made available for the second half of November. Following his arrival Mrs Krisifoe will be required to work closely with the new person in order to ensure a proper handover. The permanent replacement could then take over officially from 1st December 1987 and could work on a continuous basis using the funds still available in the contract until the end of July 1988.

For the third quarter of 1987 I would suggest that it would not be unreasonable, given the contribution that Mrs Krisifoe is expected to make to the programme, for the Gossner Mission to be paid the agreed leavel of fees for the months of November and December in full.

The terms of the Rider to Technical Assistance Contract No. 58 with the Gossner Mission allow for the return to the Netherlands of the whole of the Krisifoe family at the end of the present assignment in June 1988. I wish to put on record our intention to honour this aspect of the contract so that Mrs Krisifoe and her children are entitled to the air trip home which will be taken in mid 1955.

According to the General Provisions of technical assistance contracts financed by the EEC. the Gossner Mission should bear the travel costs of the replacement coordinator's journey to Zambia at the start of his assignment. His return journey to Europe at the end of the assignment can be considered as provided for under the contract.

I would appreciate confirmation of your agreement on the various points contained in this letter, which I hope resolves the contractual aspects of this unfortunate occurrence.

How are you? Here things continue, even if it sometimes is very difficult. Also the reallity of what has happened becomes more. Last week thursday there was the memorial service, conducted by Violet and Rev. Siatwinda. About 60 farmers and project members from Siatwinda stayed here overnight from Wednesday to Thursday. It was good.

Did you receive my letter, which I wrote just before leaving? Did you Contact Johan Westra?

Yesterday, I had a short talk with David Macrae. I told him that GM is trying to get a temporary successor.

If there is a possibility to get Johan, they would like to get a CV, to start the "Red tape" of the Government. Since I did not hear anything from your side yet, because the slow post at present, since last week a bomb exploded in a postbag, and all the post is now checked carefully, with the necessary delays) I send with the same post a letter to Johan in which I asked him, if there would be a positive outcome, to send me straight a CV.

In the meantime I got the adress of another friend, who was formerly the Dutch Volunteer Field Coordinator, and does now short assignments, lacking a more permanent job. I have no idea if he is free at present, but I wrote him also, explaining the work Izaak did, and if he would be interested. Below his adress, so you could contact him also:

The EEC would like it if at least two candidates are brought forward, that is why I give you his address. He also has a wide experience. He is about our age. Izaak knew him from New Guinea, and we both from the volunteers office in the mid-70's.

Two other subjects I discussed with EEC, and later have to be brought forward to Mr. Filori, were: repatriering of Izaaks family and returning of luggage. Erhard most probably told you, that in the long run, about 1 year time, I am thinking of returning to Holland. So in this light I took up above subjects since in fact the EEC is responsible for our return, but since this will not be immediately, they should be made aware of it in time.

Anyway, about this subject I will write more in details at a later stage.

Thank you very much for your letters of the 24th of May and the one from the 14th of June. Also your letter of the 14th of June May we received with the enclosed letters for the Ministry of Finance and the EEC. Sietske's telex and my letter crossed yours causing the misunderstanding. Sorry for this and I hope this is clear now.

We have submitted the claim now to the EEC and the Ministry of Finance for the first quarter of my work-expences. I send you a copy of this a week ago with Mr.Gsänger of the DIE. One invoice of the subsistance allowance was left out in the copies to you. I hereby enclosed it for you.

I have forwarded my first Microproject for financing to the Ministry of Finance. It is a very bureaucratic way and I have no idea yet how this will take before the people of

the project will receive the funds.

I first have to write to my director of Planning and he has to forward this to the director of Economic and Technical Cooperation, the latter one has to write to the PS of the Ministry of Finance and Finance to EEC and the Bank of Zambia, I hope it will work out, I am following the procedure step

by step.

As far as projects are concerned I have received sufficient projects to claim for the funds. The 2-million is on paper used, but I still have to screan the projects one by one. Projects are still coming in and I was scheduled to leave for the Northern Province on the 17th of June for about 10-days. But due to an acute shortage of diesel-fuel at the moment, I may not be able to go out. This a pity because I was right on schedule as I had planned. I had planned that by next month I should have visited all the Provinces to intruduced the Programme and myself right down to the district-level.

The shortage is caused due to none-payment of the oldoil bills and not having crued-oil. The oil payments of the last years are paid by the foreign banks. The foreign-banks form a syndicate and loan the GRZ the funds to buy the oil. The GRZ is now importing oil from South Africa, refined by road and un-refined by boat to Dar El Salaam and via the pipe-line to Ndola.

Thank you for the payments made to our account, the contracts and other copies, such as the donation letter for the tyres

and the lorgi-insurances for the VSP and the GSB.

This is all what I have for the time being.

SECOND PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION REPORT: January 1987 - June 1988

#### A. Guidlines:

#### 1. General considerations of the programme:

#### 1.1. Text of agreement:

Following a request from the Government of the Republic of Zambia, the Commission of the European Communities has undertaken to fund the first Microprojects Programme (LOME II).

To assist the Government to execute the Micro-projects Programme, the Government entrusts the Programme to the Gossner Mission under the Technical Assistance Contract No. 58.

#### 1.2. LOME-convention:

Under the LOME II-convention, the European Economic Communities (EEC) are providing financial assistance to Micro-projects in Zambia.

The Micro-projects Programme is a community oriented programme. For any community to be eligible for EEC-financing, a Micro-project must:

- meet a real priority need at local level
- ensure the active participation of the local community
- each project for which assistance is requested, must stem from an initiative taken by the local community, which will benefit there from.

Micro-projects shall overcome small projects, making an economic and social impact on the life of the people and local communities in the country. These projects should be normally located in the rural areas; however assistance may also be given to urban areas.

The local community must be fully involved in the planning and execution of the project they are requesting for.



Micro-project shall include projects, which respond concretely to the needs of the local communities with regards to development, e.g.:

- Rural services; roads and bridges; pontoons; schools (primary & secondary); training colleges; crafts industries, such as centres and co-ops; social and community centres; dams; wells; boreholes; watersupply systems; silos and storage sheds; cattle crushpens and diptanks; productive units; etc.

The financing of the Micro-projects shall have in principle a tripartite structure and shall stem from:

- The GRZ in the form of financial contribution, the use of public equipment or the supply of services, e.g. transport and expert advise.
- The local community concerned, in the form of financial contributions, the use of kind or through the provision of services adapted to its capacity to contribute.
- The EDF-Funds of the EEC.

The Government and the local communities are responsible for 50% of the project costs, in principle equally shared by the two.

The EEC Micro-projects Programme contributes the other 50% of the project costs.

The EEC-contribution of each Micro-project may not exceed 200,000 ECU. The contributors of the three participants should be moblised together to finance the Micro-project and should be finished in one year time.

#### 1.3. First Micro-projects Programme:

During 1984 an indicative financial proposal for the first Micro-projects Programme, presented by the Government of Zambia was accepted and approved by the European Communities.

Together with the financial agreement both parties accepted the Technical Assistance Contract No. 58.

The Gossner Mission agreed to execute the First Micro-projects Programme. They provided the Project Coordinator and work was

#### 1.4. Project Objectives:

To provide additional financial assistance to the local communities in the Rural Areas. Selfhelp Projects initiated by the local communities are provided with a grant to the maximum of 50% of the total project costs. The assistance should help to bring an improvement in the living standards of the local community.

To realise this, the following steps are done:

- 1. Information to local communities by:
  - circular letters to all Provincial Permanent Secretaries and provincial planning Units.
  - distribution of a project information letter.
  - introduction to various planning meetings and seminars.
- 2. Follow-up visits to all provinces and most of the districts.
- 3. To choose clusters of projects.
- 4. To concentrate projects in areas.
- 5. To keep the projects simple.
- 6. To give priority to projects in EEC-areas.
- 7. To assist the communities in securing the necessary materials required.
- 8. To help in the completion of the projects.
- 9. To give necessary assistance and advise.
- 10. To commit all the funds for the First Micro-projects Programme.
- 11. To prepare the basis for further assistance.
- 12. To present an indicative project proposal for LOME III.

RE: Clusters of projects: A number of projects in the same sector are put together to combine the execution-efforts.

a. in the sector Rural Basic Needs, all water wells and boreholes are combined in various water schemes, e.g. Project no. 1 - Village Water Scheme, NW-Province.

a number of waterwells and boreholes are constructed in four districts

(Solwezi, Chizera, Kabompo, Kasempa).



- b. in the sector <u>Agriculture and Animal Production</u>: Project no. 16 - Village cattle Crushpens - 10 pens Mazabuka district.
  - Project no. 17 Communal Rural Diptanks 14 diptanks in Mazabuka district.
  - Project no. 25 Storage bins 10 bins in Kapini Area Kabwe Rural district.
  - Project no. 4 Cattle Water Ponds 15 ponds in Senenga district.

RE: Concentration of projects: A number of projects are selected and concentrated in certain areas for easy administration, economising on distance and efficiency.

- a. Along the <u>line of rail</u> for projects in the Copperbelt province, Central province and Southern province. Projects no. 6, 7, 8, 10, 16, 17, 19, 20, 22, 25, 26, 29, 30, 31, 34, 35, 36, 37, 40, 43, 45, 52, 54, 58, 63, 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 69, 70, 72, 73, and 75.
- b. In the <u>Eastern Province</u>: Petauke and Katete areas. Projects no. 11, 12, 13, 14, 24, 30, 33, 38, 46, 48, and 59.
- c. In <u>Western Province</u>: on the Kaoma Mongu Senanga West road. Projects no. 4, 5 and 49.

RE: Simplicity: A project should be of a very simple choice. Projects of a very sophisticated nature should be avoided and referred to a NGO. For instance project no. 7 - Oil - expellers project. This is very good, but to assist this type of project, a lot of technical knowledge is required to make it successful, especially the economical side of it and the technical side, e.g. wearing out of parts. The latter ones may have to be imported. Microprojects must be done with <u>local avaliable materials</u>. This must be a <u>priority</u>.

#### B. Community Involvement:

1. The Micro-projects Programme is a community oriented pro-



gramme and as such local communities must be involved right from the beginning. The idea to have a project started must be born within the community. The community must initiate the project plans. They must express the willingness to improve their living situation, by indicating the projects, that they want to do. Projects, that will help the community to meet their needs. They have to decide on the priority of the projects, that they want to embark on and they must involve themselves in the realisation of the projects. The local communities, presenting the projects, are mainly from the <u>rural areas</u> in the country. If needed, also <u>urban communities</u> are assisted. Approval from local authorities is required before a project can be recommended for assistance.

Once a community has identified a project, a proposal is taken to village ward development committee (VWDC) for approval. The Village Wards Development Committees are responsible for development projects in the villages. From the VWDC, the proposal is taken to the District Council and from there to the Provincial Planning Unit.

The latter one makes its recommendation to the Permanent Secretary NCDP and from here the Project Coordinator makes his final report and presentation for funding to the Permanent Secretary Finance (NAO) and the Delegate of the EEC. The local communities involved are from the rural areas. A few are from the most populated compounds in the urban areas. In the rural areas are mostly villagers, farmers communities and communities located around Boma's, the District Council Centres.

Communities are represented in the projects through PTA-committees in the case of the school projects or work-committees in other projects. The committees are very essential for the mobilisation of the local people and are responsible for the running and construction of the project. The local people are often supported by Government officials from various departments. Members of Parliament are providing usefull assistance to a number of schools, conversely other kind of projects.



#### 2. Choice of projects:

For a major part, this was decided by the local communities. In the sector <u>Basic Education</u> there are a good number of projects. Not withstanding the steady improvements in the results of school certificate examinations, there is a decline in the quality of education, indirectly caused by poor facilities for teaching staff and shortage of funds to maintain the sector. The planned goal of enabling all the 7-year old childeren to enrol in grade 1 cannot be attained, because of shortage of places. The Government has directed that school communities, through Parents-Teachers Associations (PTA) are responsible for the running of the schools and school-projects. Although some classroom blocks were constructed throughout the country on selfhelp basis, there was an increase in the cost of essential building materials. Some projects could not be completed.

The Government is encouraging self-help educational projects by local communities and will improve the quality of teachers by developing resources and teachers centres. In this light the school projects will benefit from the EEC-funded project "The Zambia Mathematics and Science Teachers Education Project", where training is given to junior secondary teachers to become senior secondary teachers.

There are a good number of junior secondary schools. Projects no. 3, 8, 13, 18, 21, 27, 31, 35, 39, 42, 43, 53, 57, 61, 64, 65 and 68.

Health sector: This is the second sector that communities are requesting for assistance. Also here the Government has directed the clinics and health centres to be run by the District Councils. Priority has been given to rural areas to increase the number of rural health centres in order to increase the basic health services. To realise this, the communities are asked to assist by building health centres and clinics on self-help basis. One third of the rural population still lives out of reach from the existing health services.

Number of projects are no. 5, 22, 28, 38, 40, 41, 46, 48, 59, 62, 63, 67, 69, 70, 71, 73 and 74.



Projects in other sectors are more slow, as communities are not easy to be organised. There is a growing awareness for communities to mobilize themselves for selfhelp projects.

#### C. Sector allocations:

- Sector allocation as given in the original version is very difficult to be maintained. Projects are based on real needs of the local communities and as such requests must come from the communities. Some communities are coming forward as they are organised, such as: the school committees through the PTA's and other project sectors through the assistance of other agencies, e.g. a dam project was possible through the involvement of the Maize Development Officer, who advised the farmers in the maize development area.
- Suggestions: production projects are possible through the involvement of other NGO's or GRZ departments, which are able to group the communities and assist them. Ward Development Committees could also play a good role by involving themselves in mobilizing their people in other local activities, e.g. clinics, skill training, small scale industries, etc.

The projects received are devided into sectors and these are:

- a. Basic Education
- b. Agriculture and Cattle Pro- Waterponds, dams, crushpens, duction
- c. Rural Basic Needs
- d. Rural Transport and Infrastructure
- e. Village storage
- f. Village Food Processing and production
- g. Youth Development and Training

- Primary and Secondary Schools
- diptanks.
- Village water supply.
- Pontoons, bridges, roads.
- Village storage of harvest bins.
- Oil expelling machines.
- Skills training centres.

#### 1. Project Sector Allocation:

The initial idea to have many projects in different sectors of



development is difficult to realise. The majority of projects are in the service sector and very few projects in the other sectors. In the production sector and other sectors local communities are not organised and they do need to be mobilized for a common effort. However, it is apparent, that services such as schools, health and watersupply are still in great need in the rural areas. Local communities are well organised for projects in the service sectors.

#### 1.1. Education Sector:

The majority of projects are from the Education Sector; about 45% are School Projects. It is an important sector, providing services to the rural children.

Many new schools are formed to cater for the increasing number of Primary School children and consequently Secondary School children. To meet the latter ones, many Primary Schools are given the permission to upgrade their school to Basic School Level. The PTA's are well organised and are able to mobilize parents to embark on selfhelp school projects.

#### 1.2. Health Sector:

Also this sector is very important for the rural population. Assistance to this sector is in increasing demand, especially in the rural areas.

#### 1.3. Basic Needs Sector:

In this sector water supply schemes are assisted. Digging wells, making of dams/wells and establishment of reticulation systems. The drilling of boreholes is difficult to be assisted, because in this case it is very difficult for the local communities to secure the 50% local contribution. Nater supply in the local areas is in many cases very acute. Nater for domestic use and animal use has become very difficult during the past years of draught.

### 1.4. Rural Transport & Infra-structure Sector:

In this sector improvement of roads are assisted. The assistance of local councils is very much needed to mobilize the local communities to identify projects in this sector and more impor-



tant to formulate the projects.

#### 1.5. Youth Development and Training Sector:

Skills Training Centres are assisted with the assistance of District Councils to organise and mobilize school leavers and unemployed youth. In combination with the Education Sector a new programme has been planned. Skills Training Centres will be asked to produce building materials, such as wooden window-and doorframes. This will create work and income for the youth at the Skills Training Centres.

#### 1.6. Village Storage Sector:

In the agricultural sector, storage facilities are still in need. Many improved storage bins have been developed and rural farmers can make use of these. Also storage sheds for Co-op Societies are assisted in this sector.

# 1.7. Agricultural & Animal Production Sector:

Assistance is given to diptanks and crushpens for the treatment of cattle. Wells and dams are built to provide irrigation water for production of crops. Also agricultural production and processing units are assisted.

There are 75 projects, devided into 7 sectors:

### D. Financing aspects:

# 1. Allocation of funds:

Under the LOME II Convention, the European Community agrees to fund the First Micro-Projects Programme in Zambia, for which an indicative amount was approved.

The financing decision of each single project shall be taken by the Government in co-operation with the EEC-Delegation. Project Proposals are checked and presented to the Government and to the EEC-Delegation for approval.

Once approval has been granted, funds are released to the Micro-Projects Programme Imprest Account.

Due to late implementation new project proposals were prepared during the first half of 1985 and presented for approval and assistance. It took a considerable time before the imprest account could be established due to the long procedures required by the Government. In December 1985, the procedures were finalised and authority was granted by the Ministry of Finance to open an



imprest account.

### 2. Payments:

#### 2.1. Imprest Account:

The imprest account was opened on the 12th of December 1985 with Zambia National Commercial Bank Ltd., Main Branch, Lusaka. The account number is no. 116483. The account is under the control of the Director General of the National Commission for Development Planning.

#### The approved signatories are:

- Mr. B. Kawele Deputy Permanent Secretary

- Mr. K. Mwiya Assistant Accountant at the NCDP
- Mrs. S.C. Krisifoe Interim Micro-Project Coordinator Two signatories are required on each cheque payment; one should always be the signatory of the coordinator.

#### 2.2. Release of funds:

It has been agreed that funds are released to finance Micro-Projects in batches. An advance payment of 80% of the estimated EEC-contribution to each batch of Micro-Projects should be paid into the imprest account.

## 2.3. Advance Payments:

Five payments have been made into the imprest account:

- 1st payment (06.02.'86) K 699,380 advance towards
  - projects 1 1
  - 2nd payment (06.11.'86) K 526,984 advance towards projects 16 21
  - 3rd payment (14.07.'87) K 474,737.24 advance towards
    - projects 22 25
  - 4th payment (17.07.'87) K 768,720 advance towards projects 26 30
  - 5th payment (24.02.'88) K 1,775,764 advance towards projects 36 50

Advance payments to project 31 - 35 have not been made yet.



#### 2.4. Conditions of Disbursement:

a. <u>Individual Accounts</u>: Each Micro-Project recipient is required to have an account with one of the banks where the funds can be transferred to.

Funds are disbursed to the Micro-Projects in 3 ways:

- (1) Direct payment to the account of the individual project.
- (2) Payment to a general account for one or more projects, on district level to be controlled by the District Executive Secretary.
- (3) Payment to a general account for one or more projects, on provincial level to be controlled by the Permanent Secretary.

For individual Micro-Project Accounts, see Appendix I .

- b. Release of Funds: Funds are released in stages. In principle, in allocations of 20% at a time. For small projects allocations may be altered to meet the project situation. The next allocation must be applied for and the conditions are:
  - (1) Application can only be made after 75% of the allocated amount has been used.
  - (2) The amount used accounted for by receipts and other documents.
  - (3) The receipts and other documents to be endorsed by the appropriate authorities.
  - (4) A progress report of the project to be attached.
- c. <u>Bulk Payments</u>: To assist the projects, bulk payments of items available in Lusaka and other payments, if required, will be paid directly from the main account by the Project Coordinator. The projects involved will be charged accordingly. Bulk payments have helped projects to obtain materials which are not available in their respective districts.
- d. Procedures of Disbursement: After projects have been approved by the EEC-Delegation, and funds are advanced to the imprest account, payments are made to the indivi-



dual project accounts or payments are made to purchase materials. For the first one, payments are requested from the DPS/NCDP and the Micro-Projects Programme issues the cheques.

New procedures: Following the Memorandum of understanding between the Government of the Republic of Zambia and a Mission from the Commission of the European Communities, signed on the 28th February 1987, new financial procedures, regarding tender-board, were agreed upon. These procedures are now implemented (see also point 3.5.).

#### 2.5. Deposit Account:

A deposit account has been opened with the Zambia National Commercial Bank Ltd., Main Branch, Lusaka.

Account: 15 days Notice Deposit Account, Account no. 310592 at 191 interest per annum. The account was opened in order to earn interest to cover the account-costs incurred. Interest accrued on this account is almost K 13,000.

## 3. Commitment for Projects:

#### 3.1.

As the situation stands, a good number of project requests were made (75), of which:

- a. Fully approved projects: 57 Micro-Projects (appendix II).
- b. Projects deferred: 16 Micro-Projects (appendix III).
- c. Projects not defined and not approved: 2 (Project nos. 64 and 67).
- d. Projects deferred, but given advance in materials (Project no. 5, 51, 56, 60. This due to the fact that, if some urgent repairs were not made before heavy rains, the started school buildings should have been damaged severely, and work had to start from square one again. Verbally it was said that the projects would fall in Micro-Project Programme, but were only deferred because of lack of new appointment of the Coordinators.

# 3.2. Total Project Costs

See Appendix IV.



#### 3.3. Project Estimates:

Planned estimated EEC contributions:

ECU 2,251,028.00

Projects funded and committed:

ECU 1,528,230.60

Balance:

ECU 722,797.40

The balance will be committed to the deferred projects when the new Project Coordinator comes.

#### 3.4. Increase of Project Estimates:

Almost all the projects have been affected by the increase of prices, caused by the auctioning system and the time lag; the time when the project estimates are made and the time the projects are approved for funding. Additional estimates were made for the first 20 projects to meet the shortfall, but this was never officially approved. Approval is very much required.

## 3.5. Progress of Funding:

The new financial procedures have improved the rate of payments to the Micro-Projects. Projects which want their materials paid for straight from this office, have been allowed to do so. This has made it easy for these projects to buy more materials within a short period of time. District Councils should be encouraged to provide transport to the Micro-Projects when collecting building materials. The Councils may ask for money to buy fuel when they are transporting these materials. Due to lack of reliable transport on the part of some District Councils, it would be recommended to have a lorry for the Micro-Projects Programme, so that some materials could be transported to the projects.

# 3.6. Purchase and Transportation of Materials:

Most of the materials bought in bulk are purchased from parastatal companies. This should be encouraged because most of the private dealers are very unreliable in supplying the materials. Where possible, the parastatal companies that sell the materials should be asked to transport the materials to our 'warehouse'.



#### 3.7. Financial Summary:

#### 3.8. 6 Months Fixed Deposit Account:

Due to the small interest rate on the 15 day fixed deposit account, a 6 months fixed deposit account was opened with the Leasing Finance Bank Ltd. for K 500,000.00 on an interest rate of 15.5% per annum. This is intended to help the Programme to pay for increased costs of the materials for the projects.

#### 4. Commitment for Technical Assistance:

The Technical Assistance Contract was for two years. Due to the late implementation of the Microprojects Programme, it was requested by the Government to extend the TAC for another 1 - 1 1/2 years. A rider to the TAC No. 58 was signed at the beginning of 1987. Due to the death of the late Mr. I.J. Krisifoe on 26th September 1987, who was the Project Coordinator, there was a one to two months delay in the project implementation. Mrs. S.C. Krisifoe became the Interim Project Coordinator, and in March 1988 another rider to the TAC No. 58 was signed. The project employed a Secretary, Mary Mulenga, in June 1987, to ease up the typing and other secretarial work. In January 1988, the project (Gossner Mission) engaged the services of an Assistant to the Coordinator: Mr. B.E.L. Zulu. Mr. C.F. Nyirenda, seconded to the project by GRZ, continued to work tirelessly for the project and made several follow up visits to the projects, for which he could use the Gossner Mission vehicle with driver. He also went for one and a half months seminar in Botswana on Project Planning and Management.

Due to problems encountered by Gossner Mission in getting a replacement for the Coordinator of the Micro-Projects Pro-



gramme, Gossner Mission decided to withdraw from the Project, so that the GRZ - Gossner Mission contract should come to an end on the 30th June 1988. The EEC delegation has now found a new Coordinator by the name of Mr. M. Candotti, who will start work the 15th of June 1988.

#### 5. Recommendations for LOME III:

- The LOME II projects should be completed as quickly as possible, because there are many more projects lined up for LOME III.
- 2. All project proposals should come to the EEC Micro-Project Coordinator Office through the PPU after they have been approved by the District Councils. It should be avoided that applications reach the office through private or other resources.
- 3. The District Councils shoud play a more active part in the implementation of the projects, e.g. supplying of transport and skilled labour.
- 4. The local communities should be issued with the project proposals before they sign the financial agreements. This will help them to know what to buy with the project funds, and what is their own responsibility.
- 5. The contingency percentage should be raised from the present 15% to 25%. The most remote projects should be given a higher contingency than the projects near major towns.
- 6. Advance payments to project 31 35 should still be made.
- 7. The office of the Project Coordinator should have a direct telephone line for easy communication with project recipients.
- 8. The office of the Project Coordinator should have easy access to transport facilities for transporting materials in cases that the Councils or other means fail. Private transporters are very expensive and mostly unreliable.
- 9. Since the project has grown so much, better facilities should be made available to let the work go more smoothly, like e.g. its own tipewriter, fotocopier, cupboards, etc.
- 10. If this is realised, better security measures should be taken, since several debts have occured from the office in the past.

#### INTRODUCTION

The EEC-Microprojects Programme is funding the following projects in the two provinces:-


- 1. Senga Day Secondary School, Mbala, Northern Province
- 2. Katuta Basic School, Luwingu, Northern Province
- Chienge Primary School-Nchelenge, Luapula Province
- 4. Milambo Road and Mulimbi Clinic, Mansa, Luapula Province

The purpose of this tour was to go and see the materials which were bought with the refunded money from the P.T.A. at Senga and also to have a word with the local community concerning the use of project funds. The tour was also aimed at visiting the last three projects which were given their first allocations towards the end of last year. The need to complete the projects on schedule was also emphasised and also the adherence of the agreed financial conditions and the active participation of the respective district councils on projects in their areas.

On Monday the 28th of March, we left for Mbala (Senga Hill) at 07.00 hours and we arrived at the school (Senga Day Secondary School) at about 1615 hours. We found the P.T. A. executive in a meeting which was a blessing to me since I had to talk to them about the project. I warned the PTA that our office does not expect any more financial mismanangement from the school otherwise funding would be discontinued for good. The P.T.A. regreted the incident and promised that nothing of the type will be done. They also said that they will do everything possible to complete the project on time.

I inspected the bricks which the local community made. There are over 40,000 bricks and some more will be made after the rainy season.

Worked on the project is expected to resume on the 4th of April.



Two staff houses have been built up to full plate level and only needs glass panes, doors and roofing sheets in order to be completed. The foundation of one other house is dug. A boys' dormitory has been built and is in use although it is not complete. It is also used as a store room for the building materials.

We spent the night in Kasama so that we could easily travel to Luwingu the following day.

On Tuesday morning I visited the people at the Provincial Planning
Unit (in Kasama) and we discussed the projects in the province and
other matters concerning the possible LOME III projects. We later
proceeded to Luwingu District. Fortunately, we found the Head-teacher
of Katutta Basic School at the Social Secretary's office. We went to
Katuta in the late hours of the morning. At Katuta, they have built a
1 x 2 classroom block which only remains of plastering. One staff house
has been built and it in use although it still has a thatched roof.

On Wednesday, we visited Chienge Primary School in Nchelenge.

Nothing much has been done except that the project site has been cleared and they had just brought the building materials which were purchased with funds of the first allocation.

On Thursday, we visited the Milambo Road and Mulimbi Clinic

Project in Mansa District. Here also, the Clinic project site has

been cleared and they have bought the pockets of cement and River sand

in readiness to make the blocks. I was told that if all goes well,

the clinic may be completed before June this year. Nothing has been

done on the Road project, but I reminded the people in the area that

their project is expected to come to an end before the beginning of the

rainy season.

On Friday, April the 1st, we started off for Lusaka.

EEC-MICROPROJECTS PROGRAMME



#### MIRODUCTION

The EEC-Microprojects Programme was set up by the EEC with a view of helping those communities which had taken an initiative to start a project on self help basis.

- It is aimed at helping the community in securing materials which they are unable to buy due to financial constraints. This is done by either supplying the needed materials or by giving the project money to buy the materials.

The NEC-Microprojects Programme plays a role in the New Economic Recovery Programme (NERP) by:-

- that all materials needed for the project are obtained locally.
- Reaching out to those places which lack the basic socio-economic infrastructure thereby reducing the disparities in regional development (aims at funding equal number of projects in each province.
- Carrying out rehabilitation projects of the available socio-economic infrastructure.
- 4. Helping to put up an efficient water supply system by digging wells, bore holes, providing water engines etc., hence encourage agricultural production and improved sanitation standards.
- Inhancing the spirit of self-reliance in the construction of schools, clinics dams, to mention but a few.

#### Project Implementation

There have been some successes and problems in the implementation of the various projects that have been approved under Lone II microprojects.

#### Successes

- . New schools have been built and oppened;
- Communities have been able to increase their agricultural production due to improved water supply.
- Has encouraged the spirit of self help.
- Has been able to slightly reduce the socio-economic disparities in regions e.g. teachers and nurses can now go to rural areas knowing very well that they will have a good house.
- Has been able to bring medical services closer to the people by either extending the existing Rural Health Centres or by building new ones.

#### Limitations/Failures

- Some projects could not be implemented successfully due to poor planning.
- Some projects could not be completed on time due to the unavailability of materials.
- Some projects have not been able to take off due to the fluctuating costs of the, main components and some complications with the Tender Board.
- Other projects haven't been able to be completed properly because the amount allocated to them had become inadequate due to the time lag - the time the project is presented and when it is approved for funding.
- Some projects haven't been completed in time due to lack of assistance from their respective District Councils c.g., some Councils could not provide transport to the project (even if provision was made to use EEC funds for transporting the agreed materials.



- Other projects could not continue because money allocated to them was misused, hence funding had to be discontinued pending investigations into the issue.
- Other projects could not be completed in time due to the under estimation of the project duration due to poor planning and monitoring at District or local level.

## Recommendations

- For effective planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of projects I recommend that all project proposals should be sent to the Provincial Planning Units through the District Councils.
- The District Councils should take an active part in the implementation of the projects.
- Desk Officers for Provinces should work hand in hand with the Project coordinator's office to ensure an effective project monitoring and evaluation system.
- 4. All Provincial Planning Units should be fully aware of the operations of the Microprojects Programme so that they would be able to give advice and assistance to local communities in project preparation.

REPORT ON THE TOUR OF LUSITU BASIC EDUCATION SCHOOL UNDERTAKEN ON THE 23RD OF MARCH, 1988

The tour was undertaken in order to inform the local community that their project had been approved for funding by the EEC-Microprojects Programme. I visited the school on my way from the NCDP/MAWD Workshop being held in Siavonga.

I arrived at the school at about 12.40 hours and I had a meeting with the PTA Secretary/Headteacher and a few other members of the PTA.

I told them that their school project had been approved and that funding was waiting for the signing of the financial agreement by the School PTA and the District Council. I was told that there was going to be a PTA meeting on Saturday, 26th March, 1988 and that the PTA Committee would come to our office the following week.

I also inspected the buildings which need to be renovated at the school and I later gave the EEC-Microprojects Programme guidelines to the Headteacher and also told him that our office is open to them anytime they need some clarifications.

We left for Lusaka at about 13.35 hours.



# REPORT ON TRIP TO NORTH-WESTERN AND COPPERBELT PROVINCES TO INSPECT MICROPROJECTS; UNDERTAKEN FROM THE 10TH TO 21ST OF JANUARY; 1988

I arrived in Solwezi in the late afternoon a d next morning proceeded to meet the Chief Regional Planning Officer at the Provincial Planning Unit.

After a brief meeting in which I informed the Chief Regional Planner of the purpose of my visit, we proceeded to Chizera District where we presented the first allocation of funds (K5,500) to Kakikasa water wells project committee.

On arrival, we immediately went to see the District Executive Secretary who later introduced us to the District Agricultural Officer who later took us to meet the project chairman, Mr Maxwell Mafiba. After discussions, during which the conditions of the microproject programme were outlined, I. presented the cheque to him. I also left the agreement forms for the committee member's signatories. They promised to post the forms after they are signed. We drove back to Solwezi in the late afternoon.

On the 12th of January, we drove back to Ndola and arrived in the afternoon. I immediately went to meet the Development Secretary at the Ndola Urban District Council Civic Centre. The D.S explained the position of the 2 proposed projects at Temweni and Sakanya clinics. He explained that the projects only requirements was the construction of staff houses at the two clinics.

Later, in the afternoon we visited the two clinic sites and found that a lot of progress had been achieved, all on self help. The following morning we travelled to Ndola Rural to visit, Mpongwe and Mushili Primary Schools which have already been approved and already received their if first allocation. The two projects have not taken off as yet, infact I strongly doubt whether the funds have been utilised as yet. It seems the projects were proposed with-out the local leaders knowledge let alone their willingness to implement the project on self-help. I complained to the Hon MP. in the area who promised to follow up the issue and report back to us as soon as possible.

Later I visited the proposed Mpongwe self-help secondary school project and had a discussion with the Headmistress, Miss N. A. Namfukwe. The currently has 12 classes of Junior Secondary and 2 classes of senior secondary, 16 teachers houses. The school is actually a co-education boarding school. I was told by the headmistress that in orderr for the school — to be graded a senior secondary school, it needs additional facilities in the form of classrooms, domitories dinning hall facilities as well as 13 teachers houses. The PTA has approached GRZ with the request but unfortunately the response has been unfaceurable, thus the request for assistance from the microprojects programme.

Later I was accompanied by the Executive Officer at Masaiti Boma to the proposed Kafulafuta. self-help Junior Secondary School. My visit to this project was at a time when a group of American Anglican Churchmen had concluded their visit. They have proposed to take over the mission station which has been left by their Australian counterparts. I was informed of their willingness to assist with the general maintance of the old mission station as well as the clinic. Probably assistance to the Junior Secondary school is in order.

#### CONCLUDING REMARKS

The projects in Northwestern Province are progressing very well and I have confidence that they will be completed. The ones on the Copperbelt (Mushili and Mpongwe) have not progressed at all. Representation to the relevant authorities at the two schools should be made so that they too should commence as soon as possible. I recommend that in future projects submitted with the members of Parliament should be followed up with the local leaders who will be responsible with the implementation.

The school is to be located in an area which has been selected for resettlement of retired civil servants, and as such will be important to the population as a social service.

5. On 4th February, I again was accompanied by the Chief and Senior Regional Planners West and Mwangala (Miss) on a tour of Mulungushi self-help clinic and Kasamba Earthern Dam Projects.

It was unfortunate that we did not find Br Mansoa or Br Grovanni the two who are directly responsible for the project, but however, we were taken around by the Sister-in Charge.

A lot of progress has been made at this project which is almost complete. We were informed that two staff houses for the clinic were bing constructed by Brunelli. I am of the view that this development should be investigated further before a decision is made.

6. Re proceeded to Kasamba Earthen Dam Project, where we were met by the Headman Mr Kashilole. We were taken to the dam which is almost complete. All that is remaining is the spillway. We were also informed that they have not yet received the last allocation of K 1,000 which the late Krisifoe had left with the Maize Development Project Officials. The officials said that they needed the money to pay for the delivery of sand They also explained that they were expecting 30 more pockets of cement in addition to the 50 they received last year.

Upon our return to Kabwe, we enquired from the MDP officials about the money, and we were informed that the funds were deposited in the Kabwe Branch but has not been transferred to Kapiri Mposhi Branch. Mr. West promised to follow-up the case with the MDP officials and of the Bank.



# REPORT ON INSPECTION VISIT TO CHIUNDAPONDE SELF-HELP BASIC SCHOOL 16TH DECEMBER TO 19TH DECEMBER 1987

The purpose of the visit was to see the site of the proposed site to make an on the spot inspection of what progress has been acheived so far.

We arrived at Chiundaponde Primary School on the 17th December, after having spent a night in Mpika. The road is quite good and I am convinced that material could definately be transported from Mpika to the project site.

Upon arrival, I proceeded to inspect the school buildings. There are a total of 5 classrooms with 3 teachers houses. The buildings seemed to be in quite good condition and are roofed with iron roofing sheets.

Later, I had a meeting with the FTA chairman, the Secretary and 2 of the committee members. I explained to them that their request had been received and was receiving the necessary consideration. I went on to explain the mechanisms involved in the Microprojec's Programme. After clarifications on issues which were raised, The chairman expressed his thanks for my visit and promised to mobilise the people in readiness for the implimentation of the project once the funds or material are made available. We spent a night at Mr Tayali's house who is one of the committee members.

The followin day in the morning, I had a me ting with the ward Chairman who informed me that the party also had a lot of interest in the upgrading of the school to a Junior Secondary School. He pledged to work hand in hand with the PTA committee to ensure that the school project is completed for the benefit of all children in the area.

The ward chairman then took me to see the Chief Chiundaponde. After explaining my mission to the chief, he went on to express his gratitude to the microprojects programme for having responded to their cries for assistance. He assured me that/ income are made avaliable he will use all his power to ensure the success of the project. We left Chiundaponde's village just before noon.

We got to Mpika just after lunch and immediately proceeded to meet the District Education Officer, Mr Mamba and I explained the jurpo e of our visit. He was delighted to receive us and promised to second a building team to the project once it is approved. We spent another night before returning back to Lusaka on 19th December, 1987.

## INTRODUCTION

The EECMicroprojects Programme is funding the following projects in the Southern Province.

The purpose of the tour was to inspect theprojects in order to find out about the progress made and the problems encountered. The tour was intended to encourage the project committees and the local communities to work extra hard to ensure that projects are completed by the end of June 1988.

#### OBSERVATIONS

THE FIRST PROJECT TO BE VISITED WAS Syamulunga and this was on Monday, 7th March 1988. A lot of progress has been made at this school, i.e a one by two classroom block has been built and is in use although it lacks doors and windows and one classroom still has to be cemented. One staff house is almost complete and itonly lacks a door, glass panes and a concrete floor in the dining room, kitchen and one bedroom, but it is in occupation. The other



teachers' house is also built and it still needs a concrete floor, doors and window panes. Lime wash has already been bought and the buildings will be painted after completion. Overall, it was impressive to note that the local community made their own doors for the project. I would recommend that the last allocation be made in a lump sum soft that the project is completed before the end of May or June.

In the afternoon, a meeting was convened with the PPU where the microprojects in the area were reviewed including theprojects which have been approved but funds have not yet been released.

and another from the District Council. Water taps have been erected in most parts of the compound and only a small section is left. It was feet felt that the project could be completed if the final allocation is made in good time. The cast from fittings and other materials would be oblained focally. It was also felt that when the project is completed, residents might start putting up permanent houses.

On Tuesday morning we visited Kanyanga Primary School with Kalomo District Education Officer. The 1 x 2 classroom block is almost completed and it only lacks the doors, window frames and roofing sheets for one classroom. One staff-house is at wall plate level. The other staff house is also complete and itonly requires glasspanes and some doors. It is however occupied by the Headteacher. The classroom block is also in use. It wasnice to see a lot of work done with only K 23,000.00. I recommend that the school be allocated a higher amount for its second allocation.

In the late afternoon, we visited Masuku Secondary School. The project has no now been completed. The Science laboratory and the library looks very nice, more so with the electricity in all the classrooms and the dormitories (hovs), The water supply is erratic in that the water table is low and the water tank is very small considering that it has to cater for both the school and the clinic. There is need to insert a bigger water pump and water tank. The school



has put up a project proposal for plase II.

On Wednesday morning, we visited Namwala Hospital where to say the least not much effort has been done by the council and the local community. The excuse given for this state of affairs, is the non-advailability of river sand due to bad road conditions brought about by the heavy rains. It look is like the people were anticipating another drought! I strongly feel that this condition of lack of river sand could have been averted had enough river sand being collected before the onset of the rains. I warned the Project Committee that if nothing concrete is done before May, then the project funds would be withdrawn. The Doctor-in-charge at the hospital and the secretary of the Project Committee assured me that once the rains stop, they will start work on the project on a very serious note. I hope they will honour their promise.

In the afternoon we visited Gwembe Primary School with the social secretary from the council. We found the Secretary of the PTA (the Head teacher) who showed us the doors, door and window frames, cement, etc which have bought. Over 2,500 cement blocks have been made and more are expected to be made after the rain season. No construction work has started yet but I was assured that at least the classroom block and one staff house will be completed by May. They already have some experienced bricklayers in the local community.

Earlier, we had discussed the new projects in the district i.e Chaanga Day Secondary and Lusitu Basic Schools. During our discussions with the Social Secretary and an official from the District Education Officer's office, we concluded that the PTAs should be formed at the schools and bank accounts opened as soon as possible. At least the one signatory must be from either the District Council or the local council of Education. These PTAs will be formed with the supervision of the District Executive Secretary.

In the evening, we visited Chikuni Primary School were the classroom block has been erected, but it has no roof and no window and door frames. Window frames have been bought and some roofing nails have also been bought, although they are



not enough. The PTA secretary asked if some roofing nails could be bought by our office so that the costs are lowered a bit.

On the last day of our tour we were meant to visit the communal diptanks and crushpens in Mazabuka. We found the Cistrict Executive Secretary and his other officials in a meeting and no arrangements were made to give us someone to accompany us. Instead the social secretary only gave me a report about the progress on the projects. The report is however outdated because it was written in December. The Social Secretary however said that the projects would be completed by July, 1988.

# CONCLUSIONS:

FROM THE OBSERVATIONS MADE ON MY TOUR, I can conclude that most of the projects can be completed before July . if only a little effort can be made by the local communities with the help of the District Councils concerned. It is also apparent that some projects need to be monitored more closely if any progress a is to be made.

## RECOMMENDATIONS:

I would recommend that:-

- a) the projects which are doing well should be allocated with slightly more money in order to quicken the pace of the work.
- b) Project committees should be encouraged to come and get some materials from the coordinator's house.
- c) those projects which seem to be static should be warned to pull up their socks otherwise their projects would not receive . . . further assistance.
- d) the projects should be told to stick to the estimated duration of the projects ie not more than 12 months.
- e) all projects proposals should be submitted tous through the PPUs or the
  District Councils in order to avoid any delays in the project implementation
  once the projects ahave been approved.
- f) all projects must submit progress reports every after three months in order to make our project monitoring a bit easy.



- g) Projects should be visited every after two-three months so that we can be kept abreast with the project progress.
- h) In view of the increasing costs of building materials, a higher contingency percentage should be used eg. 20-30% especially for those projects in remote areas.

All in all the tour was a successful one and it is hoped that a. lot of progress will be made in the next three-four months.

# INDRODUCTION

The EEC Microprojects Programme is funding the following projects in the Eastern Province:

The tour was aimed at inspecting the projects and so that promess on the projects can be noted and problems on the implementation of the projects would be sorted out. The tour was also aimed at enclurating the local communities to complete their projects before June when the Microprojects Programme under Lome II comes to an end.

#### OBSERVATIONS

On Monday morning the 14th March, we drove to Lundazi from Chipata and toured the project in the district, namely the Mwase Dam and the Mwase-Kapichila Road. The drift on the Kapichila Road was completed and reams to be quite stron. The drift on the Mwase dam is almost complete, two pillers have been erected and these have held bac the water so that



now the bridge can be safely crossed. One more main wall is left and work on this wall would begin on Tuesday the 15th of March 1988. However, work on the road has not yet started, but it is loped that work would start in April this year when the second allocation is given. Even if the work hasn't started on the upgrading of the Mwase-Kapichila Road, once work starts it can be completed by June or July. The council was advised to pull all its resources to ensure that the project is completed before the deadline.

In the afternoon I had a meetin with the District Council (there was a full council meeting oing on when I arrived) and I was assured that the council w\_\_\_ in possible to com,late the project.

They also informed me of project prosals which were sent to the PPU but up to now have not been received by this office.

On Tuesday morning, I had a meeting with the Chief Regional Planner in hipata where we discussed a few other issues including the monitoring of the on-going EEC funded Micropr jects and the mode of new project presentation. He (Mr Njobyu) assured me of their support although the PPU is hit by a staff shortage.

I later went to see the officials from the District Council over

Namesche Bridge Project. We went to visit the project site with the

Development Secretary. No work on the project site has been done yet

although cement has already been bound than the culverts have been

made. They were waiting for trans ort to take the culverts to the

project site. It was felt that since this was a minor project

it would be completed before May or June. A total of 12 culverts will

be used and only a slight expansion of the present bridge will be done.

On our way to Petauke, we stopped in Katete to see the completed project, namely the Katete Community Tree Planting Project, but unfortunately, there was no one to take us around from the Forestry Department. We waited for almost fourty minutes and later drove to Petauke, without seeing the project. It looks like we shall just have to depend



In the late afternoon, we went to see the Development Secretary of the Petauke District Council.

The Development Secretary arranged for a meeting for me with the District Education Officer and the District Health Inspector. With the two officials, we mapped out the programme for visiting the seven projects in the District.

On Wednesday morning, we went on a marathon tour and we started with Chivunga Primary School. The Classroom block has been built and one classroom is in occupation. The other calasro m was to be plastered in the afternoon. One teacher's house is built up to roof level but it has nt got a concrete floor, no winds and door from and no roof. I told the Headteacher that they are expected to complete the project before June because it's estimated duration is already over.

At Kangambwa Primary School, A 1 x 2 classroom block has been built and only needs to be plastered and painted. However, the roof angle is very narrow and it almost looks like a flat roof. Plans are underway to raise the roof a bit. Four staff houses have been built and three of them are in occupation the fourthe one was being plastered when we visited the school. The roofing places were being eaten by ants and the District Inspector of schools promised to provide some ant killers (chemicals). The houses lack looks which have been requested for from this office. A 1 x 4 toilet block has been built and is in use. Two toilets/Shower rooms have been built for the two staff houses and the other two will be built before the end of this month.

It was good to note that most of the work on the project is done by the rupils with the sup rvision of their Practical Subject teacher, who is a lady!

The project at Mtuambatwo Primary school is progressing very slowly. However the classroom block has been built and is placetered inside only.





The roof wasn't properly put such that the ridges do not fit. It was suggested that the block should be re-roofed. One staff house has been built and only needs a plastering outside. A toilet/bathroom block has been built, but it has a simple door. It was suggested that the block should have two doors; one for toilet and the other for the bathroom. The other staff nouses is at foundation level. The PTA secretary was told that the project is expected to be completed by June otherwise no more financial essistance will be given to the school. The Secretary said that he was a hopeful that the project will be completed before the dead line because means of the materials have been secured already.

From Mtumbatwa, we proceeded to Minjoza Primary School. This project is completed except for some glass panes for seven windows. The three staff houses have been built and they only need some air-vents. All the buildings are in use and will be painted as soon as more money (last allocation) is released. They requested us to live thou their balance of KJ,800-00.

We arrived at Nyampondolo at lunch time and we found a leadership Seminar going on. We had lunch with the local Meaders and then proceeded to implect the work done. Two houses have been erect and they are in use. They only need plastering and painting. Some air-vents also need to be fitted. The 1 x 3 classroom block is in use and we found the people busy plastering the walls. Window and door frames are also required. The foundation for the 1 x 2 classroom block has already been dug and after seeing the effort done by the local community on the project, I was left with little doubt that the project will be completed on schedule. I sould say that there is very good workmanship on the two houses ouilt so far. The District Health Inspector told me that, the clinic will scon be operational.

Our last but one project to visit was Matonga Primary School. At this school, one staff house is almost complete and only needs painting and glass panes. The 1 x 2 classroom block is half roofed. The quality of roofing is



simply marvelous. Further process has been hampered by lack of roofing sheets. The mony has already been paid for the roofing sheets which are out of stock in Petauke. I was told that the other staff house, will be built in April/May and the project is expected to be completed by then.

The last project we visited was Kakwiya Rural Health Centre. Le arrived at the Health Centre at about 16.25 h urs, but we didn't find any of the committee members. However, we looked at the extension but noted that it did not conform to the standards of an LCI Clinic. The District Health Inspector told me that his office was nt consulted. I asked the Project Committee to meet with the District Health Inspector on the 24th March 1988. The minutes of that meeting will be forwarded to this office in due course.

From the tour of the province, I can conclude that almost all the projects could be completed by June. Some of the project committees need to be muched a bit if progress is to be made.

#### RECO MADATIO S:

From the observations made on the tour, I would recommend that:

- i) District Councils should be told to help our projects very much otherwise further help to .negligent councils will be stopped.
- ii) The District Councils should arrange transport to lick up some of the materials at the Co-ordinator's house if they can't buy them in their respect ve districts.
- iii) Projects which are left with little amounts of money as their last allocation, should be eiter the money early so that they can given complete their projects in time.
  - iv) Projects wast so an roved by the local councils before construction work can be in an offer to avoid cases like that at Kabwiaya where improper structures were suilt.



There is need for this office to intensify the efforts in monitoring sothat they and evaluating the on-going projects, can be implemented more effectively and on sch-dule.
