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I. CHITUNGWIZA

1. Geography and History

With a population of nearly one million people and situated in Mashonaland East, Chitungwiza is the third largest and fastest growing town in Zimbabwe. It is located about 20 kilometres south of Harare. Chitungwiza was born in 1978 by the amalgamation of three former Salisbury so-called African Townships, viz. Seke, Zengeza and St. Mary's.

The above residential areas, like other "locations" in colonial days, served to shelter cheap labour for Salisbury, now Harare. Nonetheless, Seke had some light industries and has been encouraged to set up factories since independence in 1980.

The industrial base of Chitungwiza has been planned in such a way that it can expand to accommodate over 100 industrial firms. Though many residents work in these industrial sites, by far the large majority still commutes up north to Harare to work.

Chitungwiza acquired municipal status in November 1981 and social services are being expanded. In spite of the expansion this town is facing some problems.

2. Socio-Economic Situation

Chitungwiza is having a number of problems of administrative, social and economic nature. Recently, the press was awash with stories of "inefficiency and ineffectiveness" and "many fundamental problems in direction, staffing, management, administration and other operational areas". As a result Chitungwiza Town Council (CTC) lost a chance to build hundreds of houses under the Government and World Bank-sponsored Urban II Housing Programme following a negative report by a firm of management consultants. The CTC is said to have failed to prepare a financial statement for 1991, and can not repay loans.

The problems of CTC can be clearly seen in the grinding poverty of three shanty villages, viz. Korstain, Unit D and Unit H. Korstain village, home to several thousands of residents, is a sprawling slum area lying between a modern shopping utility and a waterlogged plain full of sewage. Most of the shanties are built of an assortment of rusty scrap metal, planks, dagga, plastic and timber cut-offs. Some of these unplastered "match-boxes", which hold up to 16 people, look dangerous for habitation as they are balancing at slanting angles.

There is no proper sewage disposal system. People in these settlements use pit latrines which also seem to be collapsing. The zinc and hessian latrines are

so small that they can only accommodate one person at a time. On account of the toilets condition, children help themselves outside and faeces can be seen behind the shanties. There are also no proper facilities for bathing.

Inside the shanty-village, stinking sewage flows along roads and paths daily. A visitor to the area is frightened to see children playing in such filth while their elders ignore the health hazards of so doing. It is not necessary to have a study to show that there is a prevalence of malaria, T.B. and other poverty diseases in this neglected part of Chitungwiza. There is only one understaffed hospital meant to service the whole town. Like most parts of this town there are no recreational facilities.

Kapota, a resident who has lived in this area since 1972 says, the council does not seem to be concerned about the recreational amenities in this squatterville which is a stone's throw away from the plush shopping complex. He also says that the residents have lost hope of CTC developing or upgrading their shanties.

Like other parts of Chitungwiza walking at night has become a nightmare. The "criminals", most of them youths, are a product of this harsh and uncaring environment. They have not known anything better - for theirs is the survival of the fittest. As we shall see soon, this area has become a thriving black market.

II. SITUATION OF CHITUNGWIZA YOUTHS

The above socio-economic reality is the background against which the experiences of the youths, the problems they encounter and their responses must be seen.

1. Experiences

Before the current Economic Structural Adjustment Programme (ESAP), its attendant problems and drought, youth in Chitungwiza were about half the population. However, now with the continuous streaming of youths from outlying Seke communal lands, Murehwa, etc. into Chitungwiza, in the hope of getting jobs, young people are well over half a million.

On account of the hardships in the communal areas, young people are separated from their families earlier than before. While some engage in back-breaking gold-panning along rivers, others sell their labour to wealthy families yet others come to Chitungwiza hoping to supplement the meagre if not non-existent resources of their families. In this sense they can be said to be maturing faster than before.

For most of Chitungwiza's young population, the town is a sign of livelihood. Both boys and girls find their way into the enticing yet cold streets of Chitungwiza. Few get employed as unskilled contract labourers in the building industry, clothing factory, supermarkets, Chibuku brewery, etc. However, for most of the school leavers this marks the beginning of many problems.

2. Problems

a) Poverty

The vulnerability of unemployed young people to poverty is seen in the fact that they do not have financial savings or insurance against sickness, accidents or disasters. They do not have assets like furniture or a house, i.e. property which they can sell should disaster strike. Thus they remain marginalised, powerless and poor. They have to depend on begging and handouts from relatives and the public as employment is hard to come by.

b) Education Not Adequate Answer

Most of the youths here now realise that an "O" or "A" level certificate, or even a diploma is no longer guarantee for a job and in turn a secure future. Some youths allege that council officials ask for membership cards of the ruling (ZANU(PF)) party as a condition for employment.

Furthermore, it is common cause that favouritism and nepotism play a significant part in the allocation of public values like jobs. On account of unemployment, sickness and malnutrition the young people become physically unwell and in turn produce less in their petty-economic activities as we shall have occasion to consider soon. That is to say, they can not look for information and will not have time and energy to actively protest against situations or systems that keep them in disadvantaged position. They are pre-occupied with survival. Thus, they remain poor and powerless.

c) Ignorance of Law

The powerlessness of the youth is also evidenced by their ignorance of the law and lack of legal advice. Thus they are in a weak bargaining position as they have only their unskilled labour to rely on. For instance, a number of them are hired as contract labourers. They are not able to dispute wages and/or prices as time and energy is spent queuing for essential goods like bread, buses, telephones, payment of rates, etc. Many unemployed youths also spend time in queues outside factory gates. In most cases they end up gambling with little money they may be having. This not only isolates them from participating in the life of the community but also makes them perpetually poor.

d) Illiteracy

Isolation and marginalisation of the youths is also caused by illiteracy and not being well-informed. Given the economic hardships, many parents have failed to send their children to school. Girls have become the first targets or victims in an attitude reminiscent of the sixties where it was considered not necessary to educate girls. (Many of these girls are contracted into domestic service and are paid criminally.) This means that the victims cannot read economic literature or make sense from news on the radio. Ultimately, this leads to continued poverty of the youths.

e) Blaming the Victim

Further still, as they are isolated, the youths do not feel backed by anyone. They feel betrayed by the elders who refuse to listen to them or take them seriously. The resulting isolation pushes them to rebellion, discouragement and a return to individualism. Young people are talked about a lot but are not given a place to say what they want or how they see society. They remain objects of care without being allowed to behave as active people or contributors to a new creation.

Similarly, the adults tend to blame the youths as responsible for the pathetic situation in which they find themselves and not the system. As such these victim-blamers seek to change the "character" of the youths rather than the unjust material social and economic environment impinging on the victims.

3. Responses

The youths in Chitungwiza have responded to the situation in which they find themselves through a variety of ways: selling petty-commodities; mortgaging one's labour; improving one's educational level; participating in political parties; theft and prostitution; religious escapism and wish to be self-reliant.

a) Petty Trading

Some youths staying with parents, friends or relatives are forced to supplement the earning of the household. This is particularly so as the cost of living (e.g. basic food and rent) continues to rise. Such young people have resorted to selling petty commodities like cigarettes, candles, tomatoes, vegetables, belts, handkerchiefs, beans, buttons, earrings, roasted corn, sweets, tea and pieces of bread, fruits and exchanging bottles and bones for sweets. Others frequent bottle stores and beer halls where they roast meat for clients for a "roasting fee". Tawanda, an 18 year old man who earns his living that way at a beer outlet at Makoni shopping centre complains of the ill-treatment he gets from some of the patrons. Outright refusal to pay him for his services is not uncommon. And as we have seen earlier on, Tawanda like other youths, is exploited as he is ignorant of the law or lacks legal advice. Other youths go to South Africa and Botswana to buy locally unavailable car spare parts, necklaces and jewellery, electric hardware, clothing, watches, cosmetics, tinned foods, etc. for resell here at high prices. Some also peddle drugs like marijuana, mandrax and so on. This lucrative business has become hazardous for the youths in a number of ways. Firstly, they are usually exploited by unscrupulous relatives and businessmen who make large profits while the youths as middlemen get very little. Secondly, they are treated badly in those countries as people blame them not only for the rising cost of living but also for such things as prostitution. Girls are said to engage in selling their bodies as a way of avoiding to pay for hotel accommodation so as to bring home as many goods as possible. Lastly, many Zimbabweans including boys and girls from Chitungwiza sleep at railway stations on empty stomachs. There is also another type of young man and woman who has reacted to the economic hardships by buying and selling Rands and Pullas on the black market. The shanty villages mentioned elsewhere in this paper are a thriving illegal foreign currency market for travellers who can not get enough forex from the banks.

b) Exchange One's Labour for a Skill

Some young people trade their labour for a skill. For example, Misheck, a Form 4 drop out in St. Mary's has made an agreement with Never, a skilled carpenter and owner of a carpentry workshop. Under the agreement, Never will teach Misheck how to make cabinets, tables and chairs for 6 months but the proceeds from the products will go to the former.

c) Improve Educational Standard

Other youth's reaction to their plight has been to seek an improvement in

----- their educational qualifications. Hence, the once-large numbers of boys and girls attending evening classes here. Some still believe that education is a "ladder to success" which is taken to be synonymous to getting employment. However, currently on account of the economic reality, satisfaction of basic needs tends to proceed secondary pursuits like education. Nonetheless, young people look for information and want to know what is happening in other parts of the world.

d) Participate in Political Parties

In the belief that they would get some material benefits, some youths get involved in political parties. Here they are often used as tools to carry out orders. The negligible number of youths employed in these parties is a far cry from the large numbers who remain jobless. As the youths are used to enforce orders amid empty promises, this usually results in strife particularly when they are turned against each other. The 1985 parliamentary elections which led to a stand-off between the youths of the ruling party and the opposition are a case in point. However, some youths here are purportedly joining the ruling party with the conviction that such membership would maximise their chances of getting employment and accommodation which they believe is given on political affiliation lines.

Nonetheless, the youths are increasingly becoming disillusioned by party politics as parties seem unable to meet the former's aspirations. Thus, more and more youths tend to shun political parties as a way of meeting their needs. But some tend to be sceptical about honourable ways of living.

e) Anti-Social Behaviour

Believing that there are no honest or decent ways of earning a living, some youths steal, mug or even kill to eat and clothe. According to police statistics here, the number of criminal activities including thefts have soared tremendously compared to the same period in the past 5 years. There are also those who have been forced into prostitution by circumstances so as to feed themselves and in many cases their children. At times such liaisons result in unwanted pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases. Hence, baby dumping and the spread of AIDS whose incidence seems to be high among the poor in general and poor youths in particular. Again, these victims are blamed for the societal and systematic ills.

f) Escapism

In the face of poverty some youths become hopeless, fatalistic and escapist. They resign themselves to providence and drugs including beer. A good number of them take refuge in religious sects like Johanne Masowe and some Pentecostal groups in which stress is put on "knowing Christ as a personal Friend and Saviour" who is responsible for everything including their situation. Protesting against a dehumanising milieu is equated to disobedience to God's will. Fear to confront the overwhelming reality (in addition to the frustration caused by elders) in a challenging and creative manner also leads some youths to drink excessively, take drugs, and subtle forms like soccer and music.

g) Yearning for a Just Society and Meaningful Educational System

It is important to note that Chitungwiza youths want to be self-reliant in food, shelter, clothing and other basic necessities. But while a number of

them are dependent on parents' and relatives' income, many have no one to rely on. They also yearn for fashionable clothes, radios, cassette players, digital watches and want to watch films, attend parties and generally "have a good time".

Such youths protest, often through anti-social activities, at an educational system that largely does not prepare them for life outside the school. They complain about a world where some people are doomed to failure even before birth. They curse themselves for being born into poor families.

But young people are also increasingly questioning an economic system that tends to favour a small group of people at the expense of the vast majority condemned to suffering on the margin of life. They question artificial "differences" of skin colour, nationality or language. To this end, they want to build an economy that would respond to their needs and in which they would take an active part. However, their level of consciousness is uneven. Hence, CHIYSAP is a way of not only supporting their initiatives in improving their material condition through technical skills but also enhancing their level of social awareness through leadership training. We now turn to these aspects.

III. VISION, ORIENTATION AND STRATEGY OF CHIYSAP

1. To "Live" not just "Survive"

The idea to form Chitungwiza Integrated Youth Survival Project (CHIYSAP), has its origins first of all in the prevailing harsh socio-economic situation of the youth and their strong desire not only to have technical skills and mere "survival", but also to "live" in society with others as true human beings. Secondly, it is one way to respond to Zimbabwe Government's national policy to "improve the socio-economic standards of our people (youth) regardless of academic qualifications". It is a way of developing human resources towards collective self-reliance. Thirdly, the availability of David Munhumeso Manenji and Joseph Pokawa, both of whom have had long and rich experiences of working with the youth at grass-roots, national and continental (African) levels, living amongst the youth in Chitungwiza gave impetus to the formation of this project.

2. A Project by and for the Youth

CHIYSAP is therefore a project not only for the youth but also owned and run by them. It aims at creating awareness of their human, economic, political and social potential, strengthening their self-confidence to critically evaluate values and patterns of relationship they experience and to organize themselves to corporatively exercise whatever work skills they have for their own development and the transformation of their society.

3. Breaking the "Culture of Poverty" and the "Culture of Silence"

The starting point and content of the programme promoted by CHIYSAP is the reality of the world in which the participants in the project live and how they perceive it. A vicious circle of the twin reality now known as the "culture of poverty", put in place over the years as a result of exploitation and domination, and the "culture of silence", which does not only keep the oppressed and poor people (youth) in their present situation, but also closes their eyes from seeing what and who are responsible for their state, must be broken. The acquisition of technical skills to survive should act as a catalyst to promote critical reflection so that together the youth can foster ways to break this double circle of "poverty" and "silence".

4. Methodology

The methodology used to realise the project's aims and objectives is based on the Experience-Reflection-Action process. The concrete experiences the participants have and those they go through during the acquisition of technical skills provide opportunities for critical analysis of their environment, for deepening their self-perception in relation to it and for building confidence in their own creativity and capabilities to bring about a more human and just society.

5. Strategy, Youth Collaboration with the Poor.

Concretely, CHIYSAP's programmes and strategies have as one of the goals to give the youth control over the material conditions of their lives. That is, over the system of production, distribution and consumption of material goods and resources (technical and communication skills). Moreover, it is to create the possibilities for young people to be involved in decision-making processes especially those that affect them (creation of social awareness). Lastly, CHIYSAP's programmes will ensure collaboration with all marginalised people and sectors to work for the transformation of society (mobilisation for social transformation).

6. An Initiative of the South

The problems facing youths in Chitungwiza are not peculiar to this part of the country or continent. Rather poverty as it affects young people is a common phenomenon in Third World Countries. Thus CHIYSAP is in this sense an initiative of the south to fight structures of death and bring about life and liberation.

It is a response to the urban crisis developing countries are experiencing. As such the spread of CHIYSAP to other towns and cities, not only in Zimbabwe, but also in the region, the whole of Africa and even beyond, is foreseen. That is to say, just as countries are interdependent, today's big problems, including youth poverty, alienation and unemployment cannot be solved in isolation permanently outside the international context. Local groups would benefit from the experiences of sister groups elsewhere. Hence the need for exchange and dialogue and to compare perceptions, analyses and actions. CHIYSAP will take its place as an international NGO within this framework at the service of the young people: unemployed, school dropouts and those retrenched, viz. the drags of society.

IV. AIMS, OBJECTIVES, CONTENT, METHOD AND DESIRED EFFECTS

1. Aims and Objectives

a) To provide young people with basic and technical skills which will enable them to survive taking into account their needs and situation. At the end of a specific period the participants will have:

- mastery in at least one technical skills area in an income generating venture,
- ability to work effectively to exercise the newly-acquired skill(s),
- ability to seek initial capital and logistical support to begin a new way

of living.

b) To provide the youth with skills in leadership, communication and team work so as to be aware of oneself and others, lead and communicate effectively in groups and in work situations. At the end of a given period of time they will:

- have knowledge of oneself and ability to reflect on one's feelings and to verbalise the self-image,
- be aware of limitations, have the ability to listen, identify and categorise facts in a given situation,
- be open to others, lead and have the ability to accept criticism and to build up good relationships with people of different ideas.

c) To provide young people with tools of analysis that will create awareness on the root causes of poverty so as to motivate them to speak out and act collectively by moving from perception to analysis of structures and reality. By the end of a particular period they will:

- have critical consciousness by moving from perception to analysis of structures and reality,
- be leaders who will speak on behalf of the marginalised and less privileged,
- be able to build or work with organisations that will undertake actions which will transform reality.

d) To enable young people to collaborate with others, especially the marginalised people to mobilise them for the transformation of society. On leaving CHIYSAP, the participants will be sufficiently motivated, equipped and have the capacity to:

- live a new lifestyle, seek new group relationships and solidarity with the less-privileged and the marginalised,
- promote among the poor and the marginalised economic well-being with increased critical consciousness,
- create alternative structures that allow for free participation in decision making.

2. Content

The content of the programme will be based on the experiences of the participants, their needs and aspirations. That is to say that:

a) The basic technical skills will be geared towards income-generating activities in the following subjects:

- Nomadic Photography (N.P.)
- Painting and Printing (P.P.)
- Carpentry (Carp.)
- Brick Moulding Work (B.M.W.)
- Building (Bldg.)
- Market Gardening - Horticulture (M.G.)
- Hairdressing & Beauty Therapy (H.B.T.)
- Vegetable (Intensive) Production (V.I.P.)
- Tailoring (Tail.)
- Knitting (Kni.)
- Welding (Wel.)
- Mechanics and Electricity (M.E.)
- Cookery and Nutrition (C.N.)
- Raising Small Livestock (R.S.L.)
- Book Binding (B.B.)
- Dress-Making

- Barefoot Business Skills (B.B.S.)
- Shoe Repairs & Maintenance (S.R.M.)
- Repairs & Maintenance of Time Gadgets (R.M.T.G.)
- Child Bearing Assistance (C.B.A.)
- Social Theatre Dynamics/Dancing (S.T.D./D)
- Fence Making/Fencing (F.M./Fe)
- Sculpture: Stone & Wood (S.S.W.)
- Weaving & Puppetry (W.P.)
- Pottery (Pot.)
- Typing & Secretarial Duties (T.S.D.)

b) The dialogue generated within the group for the purpose of awareness building will be based on:

- Potential awareness of self and others,
- Communication techniques,
- Collaboration and working in groups,
- Decision-making and leadership,
- Conflict-management.

c) The programme will take into consideration as its content:

- tools of analysis, i.e. a framework of analysis of society based on economic, political and ideological structures at the micro and macro levels,
- problem-posing skills, i.e. Paulo Freire's educational approach and the process of conscientisation,
- problem-solving skills, i.e. identification of the most effective strategies for community mobilisation and continuous process of "Action-Reflection-Action".
- mobilisational and organisational skills, i.e. mass participation, decision making patterns and building of people's organisations.

d) Better understanding of the problems experienced through community-based issues such as:

- Surviving urban life,
- Surviving shortages,
- Joblessness in a world of shortages (Unemployment).
- Skills versus the paper chase (Education),
- Rich Christians in an age of poverty at large scale (Faith & Commitment),
- Smaller families higher income, larger families lower income (Unequal distribution of wealth),
- People are what they eat (Food game and as weapon),
- Homegrown and foreign colonialism (War against the poor),
- Women in History, Culture & Religion (Sexism),
- Rural youths voting with their feet (Rural-urban youth migration),
- The social production of health illness and medical care (Struggle for a healthier society),
- Private empire building (Multinationals & debt crisis), etc.

3. Method

a) For the acquisition of technical skills, participants will:

- be organised into groups of between 5 and 10 trainees and assigned to skilled instructors with workshops over a specified period of time,
- be exposed to the reality of each skill or trade area,
- learn through doing the particular trade.

b) With regards to skills in leadership, communication and team work, the method will be through:

- simulation exercises and group dynamics,
- relating experiences (of self and others) and discussions,
- drama, songs, dance and poetry.

c) To develop a critical consciousness of existing economic, political and ideological structures in society, participants:

- will work in small study circles, reflection groups, etc.,
- then work in larger study sessions questioning the mechanisms that create a culture of poverty and a culture of silence,
- the dynamics of workshops, seminars, etc. will be used.

d) On mobilisation and organisation participants will:

- use case studies of successful communities that have been mobilised and organised,
- study of specific documents, videos, films, slides, etc. in relation to group motivation, mobilisation and organisation,
- study of localised examples of actions organised people have taken and the kind of leadership promoted.

4. The desired effects of CHIYSAP

a) At Economic Level:

- Income for the less privileged,
- Improvement in employment opportunities,
- Improved production and marketing facilities as a result of collective work or co-operation,
- Improved living conditions.

b) At Educational and Cultural Level:

- Movement from mere perception of problems to analysis of structures,
- Increase in the degree of critical consciousness and commitment,
- The internationalisation and praxis of new values in personal and social life,
- New creativity and creation of alternative cultural expression,
- Experience and education become part of struggle to be free,
- Liberating faith and religion become basis for new values,
- Permanent process of Reflection-Action-Reflection-Action.

c) At Social and Political Level the growth and development of the following is expected:

- Consciousness of being together and organisation,
- Strategies of action to meet needs,
- Local decision making to reduce alienation,
- New sources of power to negotiate or confront structures of exploitation and domination,
- New links of solidarity with others as a result of identification of common interest.

In summary, CHIYSAP aims at and wants to realise the true and total human development from not only a situation of economic underdevelopment (culture of poverty) to a situation of economic development, but also from a situation of magical and naive consciousness (culture of silence) to a situation of critical consciousness.

V. OWNERSHIP STRUCTURES AND ORGANISATION

1. Target Group and Membership

Potential members include:-

- All young people residing in Chitungwiza willing to undergo the CHIYSAP training programme in order to break out of the vicious circle of poverty and culture of silence,
- Specifically disadvantaged youth groups like: school dropouts, unemployed and retrenched youths, girls, physically handicapped youths, etc.,
- All adults who are genuinely concerned about the plight of young people,
- Active membership is restricted to those undergoing the training programme at any given time.

2. General Membership- The Annual General Meeting (AGM)

- Decides on general orientations of CHIYSAP,
- Makes resolutions,
- Elects the Management Team (MT).

3. Management Team (MT)

- This is a policy and decision making body,
- It receives reports from the other levels in the organisation, evaluates them and gives directions as to their implementation based on the recommendations made at the AGM of CHIYSAP,
- It elects, appoints or approves other members working in the other levels of CHIYSAP,
- The MT is elected for a period of one(1) year by the General membership of CHIYSAP,
- It is a training ground for youth leadership in the organisation,
- The majority of the membership of the MT will be young people i.e. a boy and girl from each course subject(technical),
- The Chairperson is elected every year by the MT members and must be a young person.

4. The Co-ordinating Team (CT)

- Consists of youth and experienced youth workers/leaders elected or appointed by the MT, Also includes trainee animators and co-ordinators who are youths.
- Implements decisions of the MT,
- Diagnoses problems, and designs strategies for implementation of measures that are in the spirit of the aims and objectives of CHIYSAP, subject to approval by MT,
- Reviews the work of the members,
- Makes reports to the MT,
- Recommends full-time workers, facilitators and technical instructors to the Council for appointment or approval,
- Produces a regular newsletter, the Chitungwiza Youth Prophetic Voice as the mouthpiece of CHIYSAP,
- Co-ordinates workshops, seminars, solidarity events and workcamps, team-building sessions, etc., to enhance leadership in the projects.

5. The Facilitators' Team (FT)

- Consists, mainly of experienced youth leaders,
- Mediates leadership skills through exploring how society works, critical consciousness-building, team building, etc.,
- Develops a curriculum for leadership in CHIYSAP,
- Is approved by CT,
- Makes verbal and written reports on members' progress to CT and MT,
- Keeps records of work.

6. The Instructors' Team (IT)

- Equips project members/participants with technical skills, e.g. Barefoot Business Skills, Welding, Dressmaking, etc.,

- Reports verbally and in written form on course requirements and progress of members,
- Keeps records of work.


7. The Board of Advisors (BOA)

- Men and women of outstanding contribution to young people's well being,
- It acts in a voluntary capacity and advises all other organs or/and levels of the organisation,
- Cannot vote,
- No restriction on time in office.

WHAT IS CHIYSAP ?

Problems affecting young people in Chitungwiza, namely, poverty, alienation and unemployment have received different reactions from surrender to fighting to survive. Chitungwiza Integrated Youth Survival Alternative Project is an NGO founded by young people determined not only to "survive" but to "live". Thus CHIYSAP, is a response to the urban crisis as it faces youths in Chitungwiza.

However, the ills that face youths here are not unique to this part of the country or continent. Rather poverty as it affects young people is a common thing in Third World countries. CHIYSAP is in this sense an initiative from the South to fight death and bring about life and liberation.

AIMS OF CHIYSAP

CHIYSAP aims at:

- .providing young people with basic technical skills which they can use effectively in co-operation with others to survive taking into account their needs and situation.
- .providing the youth with skills in leadership, communication and team work so as to be aware of oneself and others, lead and communicate effectively in leadership teams and project teams. Participation and democracy underline team work.
- .providing young people with tools of analysis that will create awareness of the root causes of poverty and be their own best advocates.
- .enabling young people to collaborate with others, particularly the marginalised people and sectors to work for the transformation of society.

METHOD USED BY CHIYSAP

The Experience-Reflection-Action (ERA) process is the basic method of CHIYSAP. In other words, the concrete experiences of the participants have and those they undergo during the acquisition of technical skills provide opportunities for critical analysis of themselves and their surroundings. Such analysis is meant to deepen their self-perception in relation to the environment and for building confidence in their own creativity and ability to bring about change. The main goal of CHIYSAP's programmes and strategies is youth control over the material conditions of their lives. That is to say over the system of production, distribution and consumption of goods and services. This means young people's involvement in goal-setting, decision-making, planning, controlling, communicating and marketing. Some subjects in CHIYSAP are as follows:

CONSTITUTION

INTRODUCTION

We believe and observe that:

- the youth are a very important resource of our city and country now and in the future;
- young people are tomorrow's leaders and hence the need to expose them to leadership through experience;
- the youth have the capacity to acquire skills from which they can develop themselves and their society;
- the youth form a large part of the population of our city;
- many young people are trekking to Chitungwiza City from rural areas because of drought and economic hardships;
- many young people are involved in anti-social activities like thefts and other crimes because they have nothing meaningful to do;
- the Ministry of Youth, Sports and Culture, and the Department of Social Welfare in Chitungwiza are doing commendable work, but have limited resources;

Therefore:

A project known as "CHIYSAP" is being born and all persons, particularly the youths, who share these values and aspirations are encouraged to become members of this project.

1) NAME

The name of this project will be the "Chitungwiza Integrated Youth Survival Alternative Project" which project may also be referred to as "CHIYSAP".

2) STATUS

CHIYSAP is:

- a) a charitable, non-political, non-religious and non-profit making urban youth project;
- b) a body corporate with limited liability and perpetual succession, which has an existence separate from its members; and
- c) registered as a Welfare Project as required under the provisions of the Welfare Organisations Act (Chapt.93) and will be entitled to solicit funds from the public in order to carry out its functions.

3) PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The principal office of CHIYSAP will be at Chitungwiza, Zimbabwe, or at such other place as the Annual General Meeting (A.G.M.) may decide from time to time.

4) AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The aims and objectives of CHIYSAP are:

- a) To develop youth human resources so as to improve their socio-economic condition regardless of academic qualifications and to help them become self-reliant in accordance with the national policy;
- b) To supplement the efforts of Chitungwiza City Council especially the Social Welfare Department in rehabilitating young people facing various social and economic problems;
- c) To equip the youth with survival technical skills in areas of their choice including Nomadic Photography; Hairdressing; Painting and Printing; Carpentry; Building; Brick Moulding; Market Gardening; Vegetable Production; Tailoring; Knitting; Welding; Mechanics and Electricity; Cookery and Nutrition; Raising of Small Livestock; Book Binding; Shoe Repairs and Maintenance; Repairs & Maintenance of Time Gadgets; Fencing/Fence Making; Sculpture; Weaving & Puppetry; Typing and Secretarial Duties; Pottery; Child Bearing Assistance, Hair Dressing, etc.;
- d) To create awareness among young people of their capacity to contribute to development and harmony in their society;
- e) To equip young people with leadership skills through such themes as Living In a Changing World & Working in A Changing World/Society, Surviving Urban Life and Shortages, Family Life, Leisure In A Changing Society, Man's Response to God Through Faith and Love, etc;
- f) To instil in young people a sense of self-confidence and entrepreneurship with particular stress on their civic responsibilities to their customers and society;
- g) To improve their communication skills among themselves so that through corporate action they can improve their lives;
- h) To encourage the youths to organise themselves to exercise their newly-acquired skills co-operatively for the improvement of themselves and their community;
- i) To prevent young people from joining the swelling numbers of street people.
- j) To enable and encourage youths and adults to work harmoniously;
- k) To promote dialogue between out-of-school youths, students and the poor with the hope of undertaking joint activities;
- l) To co-operate with other individuals, groups and organisations involved in the promotion of young people's welfare;
- m) To promote the project's aims and objectives through documentation, etc.; and
- n) To raise the necessary financial resources to carry out its work.

5) METHOD TO ACHIEVE THE ABOVE AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

In order to achieve its aims and objectives, CHIYSAP will engage in the following programmes and activities:

- a) organising young people into groups of 5 to 10 trainees and assigning them to skilled instructors with workshops over a period of time;
- b) promoting and supporting young people to start their own income-generating businesses/ventures;
- c) by establishing a Revolving Loan Fund;

- d) holding seminars, workshops, and conferences including drama to sensitise young people on their civic responsibilities to make a positive contribution to their lives and the community;
- e) providing training in grassroot group animation, group accounting and auto-evaluation; and
- f) sourcing funds for its work and activities.

6) TARGET GROUP AND MEMBERSHIP

- a) The beneficiaries and membership of CHIYSAP will include unemployed youths, school drop-outs, retrenched youths, all of whom must reside in Chitungwiza and all adults and organisations that are concerned about the plight of young people.
- b) A membership fee will be decided upon by the A.G.M. which may vary it for unemployed youths, the employed, groups and institutions.
- c) A simple majority of the members will constitute a quorum.
- d) Any institution or organisation becoming a member will be entitled to have one vote at any A.G.M. of CHIYSAP exercisable through a person nominated by the institution or organisation to represent it at the meeting in question. Only paid-up members can vote.

7) TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

- a) The membership of any member of CHIYSAP will be terminated if other members in General Meeting decide by a two-thirds majority vote that the member concerned has acted in a manner which is incompatible with the aims and objectives of CHIYSAP.
- b) Any member may resign from CHIYSAP at any time by submitting notice of his/her resignation in writing to the Management Council.
- c) A member of CHIYSAP will be deemed to have ceased to be a member if he/she has failed to pay the annual membership fee if notice requesting payment has been sent to him/her after the fee falls due and within three (3) months thereof the member has failed to pay the membership fee.

8) OWNERSHIP STRUCTURE

The ownership structure will be the General Membership (G.M.), Management Council (M.C.), Board of Advisors (B.O.A.), Co-ordinating Committee (C.C) and the Instructors' Team (I.I.) as illustrated below:

General Membership (G.M.)

Management Council (M.C.)

Board of Advisors (B.O.A.)

Co-ordination Team (C.I.)

Facilitators' Team (F.I.)

Instructors' Team (I.I.)

Review Team (R.I.)

9) MANAGEMENT COUNCIL

- a) There will be a Management Council (M.C.) elected by the general paidup membership for a period of one (1) year which will be renewable only once.
- b) Its membership will be drawn from the general membership, i.e., a boy and a girl, from each course or subject area (or any number as will be determined by the A.G.M. from time to time) who will meet at least three(3) times a year on dates to be fixed by the M.C.
- c) The majority of the M.C. members will be youths.
- d) The Project Co-ordinator, Project Animator and anybody else decided upon by the M.C. will be ex-officio members of the M.C.
- e) The Chairperson and Secretary of the M.C., who will have to be youths, will be elected by the said Council for one (1) year.
- f) The M.C. may co-opt additional members into the Management Council from time to time and members so co-opted may not remain in office after the A.G.M.

10) RESPONSIBILITIES OF M.C.

- a) The M.C. will be the policy and decision-making body based on the resolutions and recommendations of the A.G.M. of CHIYSAP.
- b) The MC will receive reports, written and verbal, from the Co-ordination Team, evaluates them and makes decisions in order to achieve the aims and objectives of the project.
- c) The M.C. will also oversee the activities of the Co-ordination Team.
- d) The M.C. will appoint members of the Co-ordinating Committee.
- e) the Chairperson of the M.C. will see to it that M.C. meetings are properly convened, and minuted.

11) BOARD OF ADVISORS (B.O.A.)

- a) The Board of Advisors will be composed of women and men who have made outstanding contribution towards youth welfare.
- b) It will also include women and men from outside Chitungwiza who are sympathetic towards the problems faced by the youth in general and those in Chitungwiza in particular.
- c) Membership of the Board of Advisors will be subject to approval by the M.C.

12) FUNCTION OF THE BOARD OF ADVISORS

- a) Board members shall act in a voluntary capacity.
- b) The function of the BOA members will be to advise the MC on policy matters, strategy and the implementation of the project.
- c) Board members may attend CHIYSAP meetings at all levels in an advisory capacity and with no right to vote.

13) CO-ORDINATION TEAM (C.T.)

- a) The C.T. will consist of the Chairperson, the Project Co-ordinator, the Programme Animator, and the Chairperson and Secretary of the Management Council.

c) Members of the MC may attend meetings of the Co-ordination Team but with no voting rights.

14) FUNCTION OF THE CO-ORDINATION TEAM (C.T.)

- a) The C.T. will implement the decisions of the Management Council.
- b) It will also design strategies to implement measures that are in the spirit of the aims and objectives of CHIYSAP.
- c) Additionally, it will review the work of the project members, and
- d) It will report in verbal and in written form to the Management Council.

15) PROJECT CO-ORDINATOR (P.C.)

- a) There will be a full time Project Co-ordinator whose function will be the running of the day to day affairs of the project and seeing to it that all project aspects are integrated.
- b) The Project Co-ordinator (P.C.), who will be a woman or man who is conversant with administration/management, shall serve for an initial period of four(4) years and her/his term of office can only be renewed once.
- c) The Project Co-ordinator, who must have proven experience in working with young people, will be appointed by the Management Council.
- d) The Co-ordination Team, through the Project Co-ordinator, may assign duties to Team members as it may find fit.
- e) The Project Co-ordinator, in consultation with the Chairperson of the Management Council, on the recommendation of the MC members employs and dismisses the instructors and other staff on a part-time or full-time basis.

16) THE PROGRAMME ANIMATOR (P.A.)

- a) There will be a Programme Animator who will be a full-timer tasked with the duty of animation, leadership programmes and publicity.
- b) She/He will be responsible for research and documentation as well as integrating the findings into the project so as to enhance it.
- c) The Animator will also be in charge of, among others, compiling and publishing the 'Chitungwiza Youth Prophetic Voice' which will be the mouthpiece of CHIYSAP.
- d) The Animator, who must have proven experience in working with young people, will be appointed by the Management Council.
- e) The Animator will hold office for four (4) years with the possibility of renewing the term only once.

17) FACILITATORS' TEAM (F.T.)

- a) There will be a Facilitators' Team of men and women.
- b) The Facilitators' Team will be responsible for imparting leadership training to project participants for an honorarium to be decided upon by the M.C. from time to time.
- c) The F.T. will be answerable to the Animator.

18) THE REVIEW TEAM (R.T.)

- a) There will be a Review Team.
- b) The R.T. will be composed of the C.T. Team Leader, Project Co-ordinator, the Programme Animator, and any other people as may be decided upon by the C.T.
- c) The R.T. shall review/assess the work of the C.T. and individual members of the C.T. once every week with the view to enhancing efficiency and effectiveness.
- d) The R.T. shall also sit as a disciplinary committee to discipline members of the C.T. or make recommendations for disciplinary action to the M.C.

19) OTHER STAFF

There will also be other administrative and supportive staff as may be decided by the Management Council.

20) INSTRUCTORS' TEAM (I.T.)

There will be an Instructors' Team.

21) FUNCTION OF INSTRUCTORS' TEAM (I.T.)

The instructors will equip the young people (in the training programme) with basic technical skills efficiently and effectively in the various skills areas of the project.

22) INTERIM ARRANGEMENTS

Until such time as the first Annual General Meeting is called, an Interim Management Council (I.M.C.), which appoints a Secretary, will carry out the necessary duties such as identifying and recruiting prospective members, getting the necessary approval from the authorities, looking for and recruiting initial instructors and identifying possible trainee Co-ordinators/Animators and rallying material support for CHIYSAP.

23) DISSOLUTION

- a) CHIYSAP may be dissolved at the completion of its stated aims and objectives by two-thirds majority of paid-up members present at a meeting called for this purpose after at least one (1) month's notice.
- b) In such an event as in (a), all the assets of CHIYSAP shall be given to the Youth Department of Chitungwiza City Council for onward distribution to youth organisations in Chitungwiza seeking self-reliance support.

24) AMENDMENTS

Any proposed amendments to this Constitution should be submitted in writing to the Management Council (M.C.) at least one (1) month before the Annual General Meeting (A.G.M.) at which they will be raised.




Dear Jonah,

Liberation and self-reliance through action and cooperation

A church related NGO seeking to promote ideas and actions that enhance participation of communities in socio-economic and political issues of concern.

Theological Preamble

Ess is a service programme which is motivated by a Christian conviction to facilitate progressive actions designed to achieve liberation and self-reliance for the oppressed. The concern Jesus had for the poor and the need to create structures supportive of their struggle for liberation serve as a model in our work. Jesus proclaimed a mission to bring good news to the poor with the use of the Old Testament text that announces the jubilee, which invokes spiritual, economic and social liberation (Luke 4.16 - 19 and Isaiah 61)

ESS is a programme run by a group of Christians from different church denominations, seeking to promoting and be part of a new prophetic role, voice and action emerging from Southern Africa.

ESS has emerged out of the recognition of the need to develop a prophetic and ecumenical response to:

1. the need for the development of a theology which is rooted in the realities and experiences of those committed to the struggle for social transformation.
2. the process of Globalisation of the systems now under way, which as a result, has opened new areas of exploitation for the already marginalised people of the South.
3. the need for the development of issue oriented programmes and activities which can maintain a capacity to challenge oppression and exploitation at local, national and global levels as well as offering viable alternatives.
4. the need to direct energies and resources towards the creation and sustenance of critical perceptions, processes and actions required to contribute towards effective radical changes in favour of the poor and oppressed.
5. the need to create mechanisms for the involvement of the poor and oppressed in influencing policy makers for positive change.

ESS PLANS TO REALISE THE ABOVE MENTIONED EFFORTS BY:

- a. organising and facilitating activities designed to promote the development of prophetic theologies and mission in Zimbabwe.
- b. developing and strengthening Ecumenical witness through socio economic justice advocacy work.
- c. facilitating linkages with organisations of similar concerns.
- d. addressing issues of people's participation in the decision making processes affecting their lives.
- e. developing and supporting a critical consciousness and activating which enable and promotes gender sensitivity.
- f. creating space within which the voices of the poor and oppressed can be heard.

INTRODUCTION

This report covers the period January - June 1995. It combines all programmes and activities initiated by the Ecumenical Support Services.

Full and detailed report of some of these programmes and activities have been prepared separately and available from ESS on request.

STRENGTHENING ESSs STRUCTURAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE CAPACITY

The end of 1994 saw the Ecumenical Supporting Services developing from a programme which was more or less operating on an ad-hoc basis to more systematic planning and a more formal structure supported by an administrative and programme budget.

The ESS Management Committee which originally had six people was expanded to eight and was from the beginning of 1995 able to hold regular meetings.

The formalisation of the Management Committee resulted in the election of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer plus four committee members. The ESS constitution was also drafted, discussed and approved and is now available as its legal document.

The status of the ESS Co-ordinator was also formalised together with that of the Administrative Assistant who had initially been hired to assist with the organising of the NGOs and ESAP meeting.

At this stage the ESS has established offices having secured a grant to cover administrative and programme costs. There is a feeling at this stage that structures have been created within ESS to allow for systematic planning and accountability.

PROGRESS ON PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES

WORKSHOP ON THE EFFECTS OF ESAP ON NGOS AND THEIR SERVICES

The year started with preparations for the National workshop on the effects of the Structural Adjustment Programme (ESAP) on NGOs/Churches and their services to the poor. The preliminary research work commissioned by ESS and carried out by Dr. John Makumbe of the University of Zimbabwe was also started in January to March.

The workshop eventually took place on the 20-24th March 1995 attracting 57 participants representing 37 NGOs.

WORKSHOP PROCESS

Dr John Makumbe presented his research findings in which he pointed out that the majority of NGOs in Zimbabwe have had their services seriously affected by ESAP. As a result of these effects some NGOs are having to change some of their objectives and functions. ESAP is seen by NGOs as presenting them with a challenge. The following are some of the ways in which ESAP is adversely affecting the people, according to the perception of NGOs:

1. Cost of obtaining farming materials has increased beyond the capacity of most small scale farmers to acquire them:
2. Government's cost recovery measures are resulting in the poor being unable to obtain the goods and services that they used to get at affordable prices:
3. hardships are facing people to sell some of their produce at very low prices; some people are even resorting to stealing in order to survive.
4. working people have lost the sense of job security and some are trying to supplement their low salaries by taking on second jobs and engaging in informal activities.
5. the poor are getting poorer: retrenchment and unemployment are resulting in increased poverty.
6. housing and accommodation are becoming difficult to get: especially for disabled people.

Dr. Makumbes' paper was then followed by presentations by respondents from the following sectors: Agriculture, Health and Welfare, Women, Education and Job Creation and Labour.

Respondents confirmed that the Economic Structural Adjustment Programme (ESAP) in Zimbabwe has had adverse effects on their sectors with serious implications for their beneficiaries.

THE CHALLENGE

DISCUSSION IN PLENARY AND GROUP SESSION BROUGHT OUT THE CHALLENGES HIGHLIGHTED BELOW.

It was noted that NGOs ought to be doing more work directed at ESAP. NGOs have in the past avoided participation in debates involving issues of National Development and yet they are considered as development actors.

Examples were sighted of debates concerning the land issue which is a central issue and one of the main problems affecting the various constituencies of NGOs in Zimbabwe. Also sighted were a number of constitutional amendment bills, drought relief and recovery and water resources. NGOs have not made any policy input to these issues and yet they affect people and development.

NGOs were challenged to organise themselves into one co-ordinated voice which must be heard addressing issues of policy at National level. NGOs will need to agree on a common National Agenda to tackle policy issues particularly as regards to ESAP and its effects on the distribution of National resources.

It was also felt by the participants that if NGOs were to have an impact at National level, then the role of their umbrella organisation National Association of NGOs will have to be strengthened. NGOs should be involved in NANGO and demand more from NANGO.

ESAP has presented a dilemma for NGOs in Zimbabwe. It was noted that NGOs do not have the capacity to meet the increasing demand for their services in the face of government's systematic withdrawal of essential services in health, education and welfare. NGOs should instead insist that government should do more for its people.

PEACE MAKING AND RECONCILIATION IN SOUTHERN AFRICA

6 - 8 March 1995 - Lilongwe, Malawi

"The region We Want"

The Ecumenical Support Services jointly sponsored a regional consultation on Peace Making and reconciliation under the theme "The Region we want" from 6th - 8th March 1995 in Lilongwe - Malawi. The consultation was coordinated by the Ecumenical Documentation and information Centre for Eastern and Southern Africa (EDICESA) and hosted by Christian Council of Malawi. Fifty participants were drawn from Southern and Eastern Africa.

The consultation was an attempt to get people of the region to reflect on the problems of militarisation and the ongoing

conflicts and to find ways in which they can bring about lasting peace and reconciliation. The emphasis was on the specific contribution the church can make as part of its prophetic witness.

The meeting was able to cover the following issues;

- . African Christians and the future of our region
- . The land question
- . The history of militarisation in Southern Africa
- . Background on Angola
- . SADC: Towards economic integration in the Southern Africa Region
- . Reconstructing Southern Africa: The churches vision and the agenda for the Region we want.

Speakers highlighted problem areas concerning the above issues and group session went into further details and eventually coming up with suggestions in terms of what the agenda of the church should be in addressing the issues raised.

Angola featured prominently in the consultation with participants admitting that people in Southern Africa have not been as active or involved as much as they ought to have done in seeking a lasting solution to the problem of war in Angola.

Churches in the region were challenged to take an active role in persuading Angolans to negotiate a peace process which should be adhered to strictly by all parties concerned.

It was regretted that previous peace agreements have not achieved lasting peace because of a lot of mistrust between the two sides. Churches could play a crucial role in trying to build confidence and trust between the Angolan government and Unita.

One of the resolutions passed was for the consultation to set-up a regional working group on Angola which will be directed by the Angolan churches on what steps to take in order to promote dialogue towards the peaceful settlement of the conflict by warring parties.

**WORKSHOP ON URBAN POVERTY ALLEVIATION IN EASTERN AND SOUTHERN
AFRICA 14 - 16 MARCH 1995**

The workshop on Urban Poverty alleviation in Eastern and Southern Africa took place at the United Nations Complex in Gigiri, Nairobi from the 14th to 16th March 1995.

The workshop was hosted jointly by the Municipal Development Programme Eastern and Southern Africa Regional Office and the Urban Management Programme Africa Region.

As this was a follow-up of the March 14-16 1994, Harare workshop, country representatives were requested to prepare and present reports on developments since that first meeting. It was also noted that country groups had as a result of the Harare March 1994, meeting, proposed specific activities. It was the status and progress of such activities that MDP wanted reports on.

DELEGATION FROM ZIMBABWE

Countries represented their reports in teams. The Zimbabwe delegation comprised of Daniel Tevera-UZ, Barne Masanzu-Harare City Council. Jonah Gokova - ESS - Local Committee on Poverty Alleviation, B. Mbiba - UZ and Tsunga M. Mhangami - Municipality of Masvingo. The Zimbabwean delegation also shared the platform in presenting their report. Jonah Gokova's report was specifically concerned with developments since the Harare March 1994 meeting.

REPORT FROM ZIMBABWE

Jonah Gokova reported that an NGO Poverty Alleviation Committee was established in March 1994 during the Harare meeting and continued to meet after the workshop.

The committee on a number of occasions during its meetings discussed possible strategies and programmes to deal with the growing problem of poverty in Zimbabwe.

The committee consisting of seven people was concerned about the lack of charity as to who was doing what in poverty alleviation

in Zimbabwe.

Undoubtedly, the Economic Structural Adjustment Programme (ESAP) conditionalities in Zimbabwe have adversely limited access for the poor to facilities such as education health and social welfare, thereby compromising the general living conditions of the poor and their access to adequate shelter, food and water. Recognising these limitations and the need to strengthen poverty alleviation programmes in the country, the committee decided to motivate for a research proposal on institutions and organisations addressing urban poverty in Zimbabwe.

The proposal also sought to carry out a detailed survey of the existing structures and institutions addressing the problems of poverty in urban Zimbabwe.

This proposal was submitted to the Manicaland Development Programme Regional Office in Harare. Upto now the committee has not been able to implement its action plans because of limited financial resources. The proposal would have been an ideal starting point as it would have presented the committee with upto date information on available human material and financial resources in terms of poverty alleviation in Zimbabwe, thereby laying the ground in terms of consolidating already existing programmes and for the establishment of new ones.

The workshop also heard reports from other countries who highlighted the desire to confront urban poverty but with very limited resources available.

UMP RESEARCH PROJECT

From the Urban Management Programme a report was presented of a research work carried covering Botswana, Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

In Zimbabwe the report was done by Dr. D. Tevera and his team at the University of Zimbabwe. His report highlighted work done in Mbare Joburg lines where more backyard shacks continue to increase resulting in considerable strain on the infrastructure

and compromising the quality of services the city council is providing to the community.

There was a recognition that poverty in this area is very evident and will require the intervention and collaboration of the City Council-Town Planners and NGOs.

GROUP WORK

In group sessions participants discussed ;

1. Strategies to facilitate access to basic and physical infrastructure by the urban poor,
2. employment and the informal sector
3. Social Equity and vulnerable groups.

Participants agreed that victims of poverty vary from
squatters
street children
young girls forced into prostituting
street mothers
scavengers
elderly
commercial sex workers
female headed household
unemployed
refugees
retrenches etc, the list is endless.

Some of the identified policy areas were as follows;

Tax exemption
Land distribution
property ownership
building regulations
bulk infrastructure
low cost technologies
cross subsidy
gender sensitivity
access to justice
public awareness
strengthen CBOs, etc.

It was clear from discussions that apart from providing material help to alleviate the problem of urban poverty, organisations involved will need to devise ways in which decision makers are made more aware of the problems of poverty and the consequences of their decisions.

THE WAY FORWARD

The Zimbabwean Committee on Poverty alleviation has already prepared a research proposal submitted to MDP for funding. It is unfortunate that funding so far has not been available. However, this should not be allowed to destroy the momentum already gathered.

Alternative sources of funding should be explored. The committee could also use already available information particularly from Dr. D. Tevera's research project to begin to formulate concrete action plans.

The starting point could be a one or two day workshop in which interested parties could be invited to be given the opportunity to express their commitment.

GENDER INEQUALITY - CHALLENGING THE MEN IN ZIMBABWE

Gender-inequality and the need to sensitise men on gender have remained a central concern for ESS. Padare/Enkhundleni/Men's Forum is a programme being coordinated by Ecumenical Support Services designed to get men to challenge other men on the need for gender sensitisation among men. The programme goes further from mere sensitisation to challenging and organising men to actively contribute towards creating values, a culture and attitudes which recognise and respect women as equal partners in building a truly participatory and democratic society.

A number of meetings have been organised in Harare and Bulawayo. Harare had its first public meeting on 18 March 1995 drawing 46 men and women. Three speakers namely Mr Jonah K. Gokova (ESS), Mrs Victoria Chitepo (Women's Leagues) and Dr T. Mahoso (Lecturer, Harare Polytechnic) shared the platform at which MR J.K.Gokova outlined the historical development of Padare/Enkhundleni/Men's Forum on Gender. He said that the idea came out of informal discussions when it was discovered that a number of gender sensitive men existed in Harare and that they would benefit from a gender discussion group such as Padare/Enkhundleni.

A number of discussion meetings were held which have led to a publication for men by men on gender. This public meeting was the first to be organised by the group in an effort to open up the gender debate among men and to recruit more members.

Mrs V. Chitepo highlighted the efforts by women which have seen the establishment of various lobby groups on gender. She noted that men have not been forthcoming and must be challenged to be involved in finding solutions to the problems of gender inequality.

She welcomed this initiative and expressed the hope that PADARE/ENHKUNDLENI/MEN'S FORUM on gender would come up with effective strategies to get more men to participate in its programmes. Dr T. Mahoso pointed out that historically Zimbabweans had a traditional practice and culture which respected women. Colonialism has weakened the role of women in

our society.

He expressed disappointment at the way colonial thinking which is so prevalent in our society has reduced women to mere objects male violence and abuse. Dr Mahoso shared Mrs Chitepo's hopes that by targeting men and with the right strategies, it will be possible to effect changes at the level of society's culture and attitudes towards women.

Subsequent meetings were organised "for men only", on

25 April,

22 May,

20, 22, 27 and 28 June 1995.

Bulawayo had its first public meeting on the 13th June 1995 attended by 56 participants. A panel of 3 speakers namely Mr Jonah K. Gokova; ESS/Padare/Enkhundleni/ Men's Forum, Mrs Mlambo; Bulawayo City Council, and Cllr. J. Malinga; Mayor of Bulawayo shared the platform on the topic; Gender Inequality, A moral and political challenge to the men of Zimbabwe.

Participation from the floor highlighted and emphasised the need for men to play a complimentary role that appreciates the gender struggle that women have been engaged in for years. It was agreed that subsequent smaller men to men discussions on Gender should be organised with the hope of spreading this initiative to high density and rural areas throughout the country.

THEOLOGY AND DEVELOPMENT SERIES LINKING FAITH AND ACTION

ESS has been convening Theology Reflection meetings in which ordinary people of Faith come together to reflect on their commitments and experiences in the light of the Gospel message. The meetings have now developed into monthly series in which various topics are discussed and participants get a sense of belonging and their commitments affirmed. Theology and Development series is opening up new possibilities in terms of shaping new perspectives, options and strategies for a more visible prophetic ecumenical witness by Christians from different denominations. Participants to Theology Reflection Series are

discovering more and more that their faith gives them a mandate to actively work for social transformation and democracy and that a new theological perspective needs to emerge from their involvement in these issues.

Theology Reflection meetings have taken place only in Harare but there are plans to start similar processes in other centres within Zimbabwe.

The Harare Group has previously looked at issues as follows;

- Role of Theology in Social Development
- A Challenge to conventional church theology
- Poverty
- Social inclusion and Marginalisation

POLICY ANALYSIS TRAINING

MAY 1995

ESS held a Public Policy Analysis Training for development actors from different NGOs and Churches. The workshop attended by 28 participants was officially opened by Mr Matindike, Executive Director of the National Association of NGOs in Zimbabwe.

The workshop which is believed to be the first of its kind had the following objectives.

1. to enable participants gain a substantial appreciation of Public Policy Analysis and the need for it.
2. to demystify Public Policy Analysis as a preserve for learned solutions.
3. to identify major policy areas that have affected people since 1980.
4. to link faith to public policy for grassroot participation in building a more just society.
5. to equip participants with a model of applying social analysis on policy issues on a proactive way.

6. to facilitate the creation of a task force to monitor and debate the theory and practice of Public Policy.
7. to identify possible areas of intervention in the policy processes.

Areas covered in the workshop included;

- . overview, context and tools of Analysis for Public Policy Analysis.
- . Theory and Practice of Public Policy Analysis in post-independent Zimbabwe.
- . Public Policy Analysis : The Parliamentary process.
- . Public Policy Analysis : A legal perspective.
- . Social Analysis as a model of Policy Analysis.
- . Strategies and options for intervention in Policy Processes.
- . Theology and Public Policy Analysis
- . Mobilisation for grassroot participation in Policy formulation.

Method Used:

The workshop had 3 full-time facilitators. Four speakers were invited to present papers on Policy Analysis giving different perspectives.

Participants went into groups to discuss presentations and relate these to their situations. The plenary sessions also helped to clarify issues leading to a number of resolutions adopted by the participants.

ARISINGS FROM THE WORKSHOP

- (a) Resolutions of the workshop have been sent to more than 35 organisations within Zimbabwe as a way of sharing information and also inviting those interested to join the working group get to look into lack of involvements by NGOs in Policy Analysis and lobbying at National Level. The resolutions are contained in the workshop report which is available from ESS on request.

- (b) The Working Group referred to above has already started its work and will report to the workshop follow-up meeting proposed to take place in November.
- (c) Workshop participants who were presented with certificates of participation were expected to go back into their organisation/communities and put into practice skills imparted at the workshop.
- (d) An evaluation of post workshop experiences was proposed for November, giving participants 6 months to test new skills acquired.

This report presents a very challenging exciting but also anxious time for ESS.

The availability of resources has enabled ESS to embark on a very ambitious programme. This was of course out of the impatience generated, by what seemingly was a lack of capacity and time by organisations to respond to critical issues of the day.

The emergence of ESS was a clear reflection of the position and concern that victims of poverty under development and socio-economic injustice should be encouraged, mobilised and educated to become the authors of their own development and liberation.

Anxiety comes when we come to the question of whether ESS can continue to exploit and maintain the momentum and expectations generated by activities contained in this report.

This question calls for new strategies at the local and regional level. ESS will need to consider ways in which present contacts can be widened, strengthened and given tasks in terms of implementation of programmes as an option to increasing the number of staff at the Secretariat.

At an International level, a campaign will need to be initiated which will be at two levels.

1. Establishment or link with advocacy and solidarity networks i.e. linking groups in Africa, Europe, Latin America, North America and Asia working on similar concerns and issues.
2. developing partnerships with a wide range of funding organisations who will provide the necessary material and financial support for the furtherance and explanation of work reflected in this report.

At an administrative level, the next half of the year should see more emphasis directed at realising the above suggestions.

There is no doubt that for ESS a itch has been discovered and Identity established for more work to be done.

Continuation of programmes and activities already started is vital in order to maintain the seriousness with which other organisations have respected and benefited from ESS initiatives.

ASSESSMENT : THE IMPACT OF REPORTED PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES

ESS initiated programmes reflected in this report have largely been very successful.

1. Attendance at workshops has been beyond ESS's expectations. We have had to deal with the problems of what to do with the overwhelming response from organisations.
2. Expectations from participants were also very high and these have been considered as challenges by ESS.
3. ESS has always believed in collaborative work. Programmes have been designed to make other organisations aware of issues and problems affecting development and the resulting challenges requiring their active response.

4. The Economic Structural Adjustment Programme ESAP completing its 5 years of implementation in Zimbabwe has been one such issue. The ESS's workshop on NGOs and ESAP provided an opportunity for NGOs in Zimbabwe to collectively engage in an evaluation of the programme and its effects on their services.
5. Following the ESAP workshop was the Policy Analysis Workshop which was pre-planned but ended up as a direct response to concerns raised at the NGOs and ESAP workshop. Participants has noted with concern the lack of participation by NGOs in Public Policy issues. ESAP and the land question were sighted as examples.
6. Among other things participants to the Policy Analysis workshop appointed a working group to look into the ineffectiveness of NGOs in addressing National Policy issues in terms of lobbying Govt. and other major development actors. This working group has started its work and is already drawing in a number of other organisations interested in the issue.
7. We now envisage a number of further concrete actions resulting out of consultation and collaborative with a variety of organisations.
8. ESS has been involved in two major regional activities during the last 6 months.
 - (i) Consultation on Peace making and reconciliation in Southern Africa held in March 1995 in Lilongwe-Malawi.
 - (ii) Workshop on Urban poverty and Governance in Eastern and Southern Africa - also in March 1995 in Nairobi-Kenya.

These two workshops have opened possibilities for information exchange and collaborative action at regional level. The experience from the two workshops is important for ESS in a number of respects.

- . The workshops have provided ESS with the opportunity to reflect on local, national issues of concern at regional level.
- . The workshops have provided a learning experience on how others deal with problems in their own countries.
- . Contributed ESS's experience to regional efforts to address problems of concern.
- . Have widened ESS's experience, scope and understanding of the complex nature of a wide variety of problems which are part of ESS's Agenda.

There are ongoing programmes which are part of ESS's work. These are, the Theology and Development Series and Gender Inequality - Challenging the men of Zimbabwe.

Regular meetings are organised in which people discuss theology and how it can be related to action or life experience. Gender meetings have also generated their own momentum with many men committing themselves to addressing problems of Gender Inequality at various levels. It is in this area where we hope to produce documentation in the 2nd half of the year.

PROBLEMS AND DIFFICULTIES

Until April 1995 ESS has been an organisation without its own offices, equipment and furniture. This has generally limited our efficiency as we had to share office space, furniture and equipment whose capacity were already stretched.

Now that ESS has its own offices, the stocking of furniture and equipment remains a priority but current funding allocation for this purpose is inadequate.

Considering that this is a 6 months report, the first under the 1995 budget allocation, problems that have arisen are mainly to do with setting up of a new programme, process directions and maintenance of continuity.

Obviously when an organisation has developed and processes set, new problems will emerge which we hope to capture and reflect in out end of the year report.

PROJECTIONS FOR 2ND HALF OF 1995

The major issues to be dealt with in this coming period will include

- 1) follow-up on the implementation of the resolution of the
 - i. NGOs and ESAP workshop
 - ii. Policy Analysis workshop

Follow-up needed for the Policy Analysis workshop will require constant communication with participants in order to provide them with guidance and direction needed for the effectiveness of their work and also for confidence building.

Having given themselves a timeframe of six months they have to get committed to some serious work.

- 2) Major workshops envisage for the coming period are:

- i. Seeking new perspectives: The role of the Church in strengthening civil society.
- ii. Gender workshop: Challenging Men in the media.
- iii. Women in the church and Society: Strategies for action.
- iv. Evaluation and follow-up: Policy Analysis training workshop. (Strictly for participants to the May 1995 workshop).

Regular meetings of Padare/Enkhundleni/Men's Forum and Theology and Development Series will continue to be organised. We envisage more concrete actions arising from the reflections and challenges of these meetings.

ESS programmes and activities are designed to contribute towards the building of Ecumenical prophetic activism. This must be a combination of critical thinking and Analysis as well as democratic consciousness and culture in the church and Society.







Gossner Mission together with other church bodies like "Bread for the World" and NGO's in Germany is interested in having a consultation on similar issues with the Economic Justice Network, in particular, that is under the Department for Justice, Peace and Reconciliation, and the Ecumenical Support Services, in order to improve our advocacy work in Germany. We like to discuss with church groups and NGO's in Zimbabwe who cooperate in the Economic Justice Network on ESAP related issues, on common strategies against ESAP and the increasing poverty and marginalisation of masses in the South (and in the North as well).


Rev. Kuchera and Mr. Mutasah mentioned the possibility to combining both consultations due to time reasons but also to improve effectiveness and our collaboration in the North.



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



They have to think of their resp. the participation of any other church leader.

The Synode of Northelbia has released a remarkable statement and resolutions on Economy and Global Justice. Prof. Gerhard Grohs has been the Vice - Chairman of the EKD Chamber for the Churches's Development Service and a member of the Dialogue - Programme of the Churches with the government. They are, however, more committed to Tanzania than Zimbabwe that is - like Mocambique - rather part of the work of church related groups and NGO's.

Since Gossner Mission is a little church organisation, we do not fit into the frame of the nordic - FOCCESA workshop. That does not mean that we are not interested in that workshop but wondering whether we will be adequate participants. When discussing the issue of our participation with Mr. Mutasah and others, we were not aware of the character of that workshop.

Please, allow me to contact our partners in Zimbabwe as well. We will definitely not destroy your concept. As soon as I get any reply you will hear again from this end.

Operating from the Isis-WICCE documentation centre which has a unique collection of material on women's concerns and actions and a small but growing library, we respond to the information needs of women activists, researchers, development organisations and concerned individuals in different ways.

Networking is central to the implementation of all our programmes. Other networking activities include participation and organisation of campaigns and advocacy work both locally and internationally; promoting local, regional and international links; and solidarity work.

8.4 Publications

Our publications serve as an important tool for the dissemination of relevant information. Our present and planned publications include:

- *Women's World* (English) and *Monde des Femmes* (French). Both are bi-annual magazines;
- a bi-monthly news update (from 1995);
- an occasional book or resource guide on a theme related to the Exchange Programme.

8.5 Co-ordination and administration

In order to implement the above programmes there is need to coordinate and administer the activities of the above programmes.

Solidarität hat Gesichter - Chancen und Inhalte ökumenischer Partnerschaft

Einleitung

Wenn ich auf die Solidaritätsarbeit der Gossner Mission, die Solidaritätskonferenzen seit 1981 eingeschlossen, zurückblicke, dann war diese Arbeit von drei Elementen geprägt:

1. von der politischen Solidarität: Wir wollten solidarisch sein mit Befreiungsbewegungen und Gesellschaften, die einen nichtkapitalistischen Weg gehen wollten und vor allem mit den Christen, die diesen Weg unterstützten. Unsere Solidarität galt Vietnam, dem ANC und der SWAPO, Nikaragua und Kuba, Zimbabwe und Zambia. Und unsere Partner waren an uns als "Christen im Sozialismus" oder "Christen für den Sozialismus" interessiert.

2. von der materiellen Hilfe: So bescheiden sie war, sie war nötig und sie half, Menschen bei uns zu motivieren, wenn sie fragten: Was können wir tun? 3. von der persönlichen Begegnung: Viele von uns werden, wenn sie nach den Gründen für ihr "Dritte-Welt-Engagement" gefragt werden, antworten: Weil ich Bernardo oder David oder Ben kenne. Die Erfahrungsbereiche aus Nikaragua oder Südafrika waren - das sage ich im Nachhinein - manchmal beschönigend, oft aber auch ernüchternd. Jedenfalls haben sie uns die Situation und die Menschen näher gebracht.

Solidarität hatte Gesichter. Auch in der Vergangenheit. Gäste aus der ökumene haben wir in Gemeinden vermittelt. Allerdings gab es keine direkten Partnerschaftsbeziehungen von Gemeinden zu Gemeinden oder Projekten in der "Dritten Welt". Viele Kirchengemeinden in der DDR hatten Partnerbeziehungen zu Gemeinden in der BRD, manche auch in Holland. Die Beziehungen zu den Partnern in der BRD waren sehr unterschiedlich - sie reichten vom inhaltlichen Austausch bis hin zur bloßen finanziellen Unterstützung. Dabei haben wir beides erfahren: materielle Hilfe konnte zum selbstverständlichen Teil von Ressourcen werden oder zu einem demütigenden und entsolidarisierenden Akt.

Für viele von uns waren die "natürlichen Partner" weniger "die Brüder und Schwestern im Westen" als die in der "Dritten Welt". Wir in der "zweiten Welt" waren der "Dritten" näher als der "Ersten". Wir lebten auch nicht in einer Überfluß- und Überproduktionsgesellschaft. Wir hatten auch keine Devisen, waren bei "Westbesuchen" auf das Taschengeld der Gastgeber angewiesen. Wir unterlagen Reisebeschränkungen, waren als Christen eine Minderheit (wie in Vietnam oder Indien).

Solidaritätsarbeit war nicht die Weiterentwicklung alter Missionsbeziehungen. (Nach Übertragung der Indien-Arbeit auf die EKIBB stimmt dies auch für die Beziehungen zur GELC.) Sie war auch nicht nur das Bündnis Gleichgesinnter. Sie war der Austausch und die Weggemeinschaft derer, die sich für Befreiung und Gerechtigkeit engagieren wollten.

Der Blick in die Geschichte dient nicht der Nostalgie, er soll uns auf das aufmerksam machen, woran wir anknüpfen können und was weitergehen muß, wenn wir über Chancen und Inhalte von Partnerschaft reden. Wir müssen uns heute fragen: Können wir als Teil des reichen kapitalistischen Nordens Partner für die Armen im Süden sein? Was heißt "Option für Gerechtigkeit" angesichts der Tatsache, daß der Sozialismus gescheitert ist und der Kapitalismus keine Perspektive für die Millionen Armen bietet? Gerade weil die Antwort fehlt, können betroffene Menschen gemeinsam nach ihr suchen.





thank you for your letter dated 28 - 04 - 1995. It was good to hearing from you even if the news concerning drought are bad.


We have heard about the new drought that strikes Zimbabwe and your area as well. As far as we know the government of Zimbabwe has started to implement a drought relief programme. Therefore we ask you to approach your ministry for local government in order to get involved into the programme. BIDA may be to advice you whom else you must approach. Drought relief programmes are organised by governmental or non governmental organisations, whereby donor agencies from abroad provide finances through those organisations, only, not to receiving communities or groups directly.

For me it is, however, not clear, what for the literacy group in particular needs drought relief. Do you want to feed those attending the course, to attract them to come? Have you done that before? What are you planning to do, after the \$ 5.550.00 are eaten up? What are the other activities you want to finance? Can you, please, specify a bit what you want to do with the money, and in which way you have financed your activities until now.

As I mentioned when being in Siachilaba, in September 1995, Gossner Mission is no donor agency, we don't have money in stock, we don't even run drought relief programmes. Therefore it makes more sense to approach your government or any non governmental organisation working in the field of drought relief within Zimbabwe. The only thing we can do, is to ask a congregation or a group of good will people here to collect some money for the literacy programme. This, however, takes some time. To do so, it would be helpful to have a more specific proposal what for the money is exactly needed, what the members themselves are contributing, how the group works.



Dear Mr. Gokova,

many thanks for your letter and the report on the workshop on the Effects of ESAP on NGO's. Thank you also for your phonecall. I beg your pardon for not briefing you in time on the intended workshop we discussed about in November.

The workshop of the Nordic churches and FOCCESA has been postponed to April, 10th to 14th. It is meant for church leaders from both regions, three from each country. German participation is welcome, according to the coordinator from Norway. The workshop is relevant, the German participation as well. Some of our churches released good papers and resolutions on global justice and economy. But I don't think, that I shall participate. It is better if German church leaders will go. It appears to be a problem that German churches have no official ecumenical partners in Zimbabwe but in Tanzania. Since the workshop deals with the effects of SAP's in Tanzania and Mocambique as well, some have shown interest.

This gives us space to plan another workshop on interlinked South - North - strategies vis-a-vis structural adjustment programmes. My suggestion is to hold that workshop in April in Germany instead of Zimbabwe. That would give more organisations and groups in Germany the chance to participate.

Mr. Kuveya likes to come to Germany in April. His visit could be used to bring church organisations and NGO's together who do lobby work. Since he does not think to come with people from the pilotprojects, I suggested to include you and a third person into the Zimbabwean group. Funding is still an open issue. I asked Mr. Kuveya whether his budget for the "Let the people speak" programme allows three people to come to Germany. If this is not the case we must find other sources. Do you have a chance to apply for finances for a ticket to Germany and back? If not, please don't hesitate to notify it. I must try to do my very best to organise funds for both, your tickets and the workshop.

The programme of the workshop shall include those items you mentioned. A detailed programme can be worked out later, after I got a general "green light" from Mr. Kuveya and you and some organisations here that I am going to meet on the 8th of February.

An alternative date for the workshop would be the end of May when several NGO's committed to solidarity work with Southern Africa will hold a conference on issues of the economic and social perspective of Southern

Africa. I don't know the exact title of the conference. It will deal with SAP's and alternative SAP's, the role of the new South Africa, and the role of NGO's and the civil society.

Since Mr. Kuveya indicated that he will be busy in May, since furthermore the programme of the conference covers more than our solidarity work with Zimbabwe, I prefer the first option, but would like to discuss both options with those people I am going to meet on the 8th of February.

First of all I need Mr. Kuveya's and your general approval. Please, discuss the idea with Mr. Kuveya as well. I sent him a fax, yesterday, with the same proposal.



Thank you very much for your letter. I am glad that you have been able to use the information I sent to you.

I am enclosing the minutes of a series of meetings we held with the World Bank.

It is good to know that you have done some work on the proposal we discussed with you while you were in Harare.

Since our meeting at the Zimbabwe Council of Churches I have not been able to meet Mr Kuveya and Mr Mutasah to discuss details of our proposal for a joint workshop on ESAP advocacy and lobby, since it is towards the Christmas break, they will get my response by way of this letter.

ESS is particularly interested in using some of the information we have at hand and the experience generated so far to challenge Church groups and other interested parties to engage in advocacy and lobby work from that end.

From ESS's experience there has been very little interaction and forward looking planning which should result in complacent action on both side of North South relations. If this workshop is going to take place soon (February as we discussed), then I would suggest that you consider the following items for inclusion in the programme.

1. Presentation on Overview of the Global situation vis-a-vis North South Relations with specific reference to the status of Africa in Economic Relations.
2. Presentation of a critical aualgrin of German's role in WTO, IMF, WB, EU etc. How does this undermine development in Africa/Zimbabwe etc.
3. An overview of ESAP in the Economic Situation in Zimbabwe with special reference to the first 5 years of ESAP and its effects on the poor. Role of civil society who benefits from ESAP etc.

Liberation and Self-Reliance Through Action and Co-operation.

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4. Strategies and Options for solidarity work in Germany.
Linking the movement for Social Economic Justice in Germany
and similar work in Zimbabwe etc.

After these inputs we can then have group sessions where ideas, strategies, options, actions, timetables and mechanisms could be worked out.

These ideas are coming to mind as I write and they may need to be revised and redone etc. I will await for your response . I also think that the involvement of Zimbabwe Council of Churches is also crucial at this workshop and therefore Mr Kuveya and Mr Mutasah will need to make their input as well.

Once you come back to us with definite information about the workshop, date etc, then we can arrange a meeting here between ESS and ZCC to strategies on expectations, outcomes and so on.

This letter will arrive anytime after Christmas but even though, I must wish you a belated HAPPY CHRISTMAS and very meaningful and challenging NEW YEAR!!



Reflections after the workshop on the effects of ESAP on NGOs

I work with Gossner Mission Germany, a small church organisation that works at home as well as in overseas. Our society related service trains church people in issues of labour and industry within Germany, we assist development projects in Nepal and Zambia, we cooperate with the Gossner Church in India which is a church of Adivasis, and we endeavour to building solidarity and political and economic awareness in our society. The variety of our commitment has an advantage: we are part of the problematic developments in both hemispheres, the North and the South. Mission, according to our understanding does not mean first and foremost to convert Non-believers to Christianity. We understand Mission as God's liberating and saving acting in his world, as churches and Christians we want to participate in God's Mission. The perspective of God's coming Kingdom challenges and encourages us to follow Jesus Christ who has brought good news to the poor.

Speaking on Structural Adjustment I always ask: adjustment to what? To a more efficient economy? To more wealth? To an economy of growth? To the Northern capitalist mode of production and life?

Mr. Halimana gave a clear analysis: SAP's were first imposed on deeply indebted countries, in the beginning of the 80ies, when "debt crisis" shattered countries like Mexico were not able to pay their debts service rate. SAP's aim at enabling indebted countries to repay parts of their debts plus interests. SAP's aim furthermore at integrating economies in the capitalist world market. Countries have to open their markets, to liberalize their economy and to modernize their industry in order to earn foreign currency which must partly be spent to meet the debt service. In order to modernize their economy they make new debts, and get captured in the debt's trap. They are getting exposed to the capitalist world market but can hardly stand the tough competition there. SAP's meet the interests of those who are benefitting from the ruling world market economy, of which IMF and World Bank are instruments.

The interests of those benefitting from that market system in Northern countries go hand in hand with the interests of a minority in Southern countries, business people, manufacturers, commercial farmers. Those questions John Stewart raised the first day are relevant: Who is benefitting from ESAP? Who had an interest in ESAP? Whose interests are met by the current economic development?

Coming from East Germany I must say: We had to learn practical lessons in the last years, namely that the free market is a mere fiction, it is not free but dominated by those who have got the power and the capital. The market as such doesn't benefit the majority of the people, the poor and marginalized. The market follows one aim only, to make as much profit as possible. If the market economy in the former FRG has got a social component, if certain social and ecological standards has been achieved, then due to the struggle of people, trade unions, parties, civil rights movements and not to forget due to the fact that there was a socialist society on the other side.

It was said several times: socialism has discredited itself, we can't go back. There is no alternative.

Yes, indeed, socialism has discredited itself which I deeply regret. As far as I see the collapse of socialism has two main reasons: One is an economy which followed the concept of a permanent economic growth and competition with the capitalist mode of production without paying the social price for the permanently necessary modernisation. The other reason for the collapse of socialism has been the lack of an open democratic and participatory

Reflections after the mission on the state of the world

I have been thinking much lately of the world as it is, and of the work of the mission. It seems to me that the world is a very different place from what it was when I first came to it. The people are more educated, more civilized, and more Christian. The work of the mission has been a great blessing to the world, and I am glad to see that it is still going on. 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discussion about the concept and content of a socialist society.

Socialism has collapsed, but: Capitalism and SAP's have discredited themselves as well. There is no country in the world, where SAP's have overcome or at least narrowed the gap between rich and poor, in contrary, they widened it all over the world. More and more people are getting marginalized. In Germany we learn just now that our highly developed industry stands competition only if it gets permanently and aggressively modernized which includes the reduction of human labour. Less and less people are needed to produce more and more. New markets must be found. The question is: who will be able to pay the prices on those markets.

It was said several times: There is no alternative to EASP. I do not know. There is at least the African Alternative Framework to Structural Adjustment Programmes elaborated in 1989 by the UN Economic Commission for Africa which seems to have unfortunately no lobby.

And there are beyond the formal economy which is affected by ESAP projects of grassroot people with their own sources and their own markets. These projects need a lobby as well.

And there are demands raised by various groups and organisations like p.e. at the World Social Summit in Copenhagen: cancelling debts of developing countries, the 20-to-20 global convention (whereby developing countries have to spend 20% of their national budget and industrialized countries have to dedicate 20% of public development aid for priorities of human development); reduction of military expenses; a tax for speculative international capital transfer. These demands need a broader publicity and our support.

Lieber Jo,

seit langem liegt Dein Brief auf meinem Schreibtisch. Bitte entschuldige, daß ich bisher nicht geantwortet habe. Immer wieder wollte ich schreiben und immer wieder kam "Wichtigeres" dazwischen. Erschrocken war ich über Deine Mitteilung, daß Du einen bösartigen Tumor in der Niere hattest und die Niere entfernt werden mußte. Offensichtlich aber kommst Du auch mit einer Niere gut zurecht, denn sonst hätte Dich Dein Orden - hoffentlich? - nicht nach Zimbabwe ausreisen lassen.

Vergangenen Oktober war ich für drei Wochen in Zimbabwe. Ich hatte versucht, Dich anzurufen. Leider vergeblich. Den nächsten Besuch plane ich für September oder Oktober, um die Pilotphase des Projekts "Let the people speak" auszuwerten. Vielleicht kann ich Dich dann treffen.

Wie Du merkst, arbeite ich noch immer für die Gossner Mission, mit Schwerpunkt Zimbabwe. Allerdings ist das Interesse an Zimbabwe in unseren Gemeinden nicht sehr, und das Projekt "Let the people speak" greift nur schwer. Wir haben wohl zu viele Ziele mit dem Projekt verknüpft. Der internationale Austausch zwischen Dorfgemeinschaften dort und hier ist allein wegen der Sprachprobleme schwierig, die Ergebnisse sind nur schwer zu messen. Die Dorfgemeinschaften sollen zunächst ohne Hilfe von außen ihre eigenen Projekte bestimmen, aber natürlich wissen sie, was ein "Projekt" ist, und wir müssen bei Besuchen zwangsläufig als donors erscheinen.

Für Gemeinden bei uns ist Zimbabwe weit weg. Ökumenische Beziehungen und Interessen gehen - wenn überhaupt - nach Osteuropa.

Immerhin habe ich durch Besuche hin und her bei einigen Beteiligten Interesse wecken können. Auf beiden Seiten waren Gemeinden bzw. Communities gastfreundlich, offen und interessiert. Wir haben gesehen, daß die Strukturanpassung in Zimbabwe und in Ostdeutschland den Unterschied zwischen Armen und Reichen vergrößert, Massenarbeitslosigkeit und Sozialabbau bewirkt und die einheimische Wirtschaft kaputt macht.

Aber das Niveau der Armut im Osten ist natürlich ein anderes, so daß unsere Zimbabweischen Freunde unsere Kritik oft nur als Nörgelei und Unzufriedenheit werten können.

Im Moment bin ich dabei, mit verschiedenen kirchlichen und politischen Organisationen (Klein-NGO's) zu überlegen, wie wir direkten politischen Einfluß auf wirtschaft und Politik nehmen können. In Zimbabwe gibt es verschiedene Gruppen, die auf der politischen Ebene Unterstützung suchen. Sicher kennst Du den Ecumenical Support Service, oder das Economic Justice

Network, das beim Zimbabwe Council of Churches angegliedert ist. Das Silveira House und die Justice and Peace Commission gehören ebenfalls zu den Institutionen, die in Gesprächen mit der Weltbank auf eine Änderung des neoliberalen ESAP drängen. ZCTU arbeitet an einer Strategie für eine Langzeitentwicklung. Sie alle sind für uns wichtige Partner, deren Forderungen wir von hier aus unterstützen wollen.

Hast Du auch ständig mit ESAP zu tun? Im praktischen Leben ist ja wohl jede und jeder davon betroffen.

In der Woche nach Ostern werden die Kirchen der skandinavischen Länder und die Christian Councils des südlichen Afrika in Harare eine Konsultation zum Thema; Structural Adjustment and Economic Justice mit je drei Kirchenführern aus den entsprechenden Ländern. Die deutschen Kirchen dürfen aufgrund unserer Kooperation mit dem ZCC mit drei Leuten teilnehmen. Wir werden aber nur zwei schicken können. Einer der beiden Teilnehmer ist Udo Semper, er gehört zum Präsidium der Synode von Berlin-Brandenburg und zu meiner früheren Gemeinde in Oranienburg. Ich werde ihm Deine Adresse geben. 
We would be very grateful to get comments on our report and the idea to organise an exchange visit with our partners in Zambia.


greetings from Berlin in Germany.

I thank you for your letter dated October last year, when you asked for a church resp. mission sister. Please, forgive me that I reply only now. I wanted to send you a positive answer and have worked on finding a partner, this however takes more time than expected.

When I discussed your application with one of the congregations here as well as our commission on solidarity work we had to ask ourselves how such a partnership fits into the "Let the people speak" programme which we run together with the Zimbabwe Council of Churches, of which Siachilaba is one of the pilote projects. Presently I am still looking for a partner e.g. a church district or a community in Germany which is willing to establish a partnership with the community of Siachilaba. Within that framework a particular congregation belonging to the church district may become the partner of the Church of Christ.

If I am not mistaken you told me last year when I visited the workshop in Siachilaba that there are several Churches of Christ existing in your area. Did you get one, in the meantime? And what were the arguments between the different one's? Are you looking for a partner for one of the Churches only, or do you think to get one German partner for all of them? As you may know, the Church of Christ doesn't work in Germany. Therefore we will not be able to find a partner within the same denomination. The relationship must be an ecumenical one, and we would like to have partners which have an ecumenical approach. Please, can you tell us a bit more about your parish; the membership, the work you do, the relation to other churches.

I hope to come to Zimbabwe and Siachilaba in October, this year. Then we can discuss further issues.

greetings from Berlin in Germany.





How are you in Buhera. I was happy to hear from my colleagues that you are still energetic and tempered which proved your power. How is Privi?



Dear Langton,

greetings from Berlin. I hope you are well.

Let me first of all thank you for the programme you arranged for Udo Semper. He was very pleased to be met at the airport, and to travel straight to Binga. Binga gave him a good impression on what we mean with Development Education, and what the Conference was discussing about. He brought along the Final Statement and the open letter to the Worldbank, challenging documents, that hopefully will get response.

Udo gave me a short oral report only, until now. We hope to find sufficient time next week, in order to discuss how to popularize the conference outcome.

He told me that he has invited Selina and somebody else from Binga to come to Germany in July, for joining the Oranienburg youth group when they go on paddle tour. I don't mind, my only question is whether Selina likes to tour rivers on a hand driven paddle canoe for ten days, sleeping in tents. In any case, it will be a good experience for her as well as for the Oranienburg youth. I went with the group several times when I was still serving as minister in Oranienburg, and I enjoyed paddling a canoe, but it is also exhausting.

Anyway, she and a second person will be welcome. What do you think, should the second person be Colnard Mazvisvo from Matava? After the cancellation of the India trip it would be something like a compensation, and somebody from Matava would be part of the exchange programme. It might however cause a problem for the young Mrs. Selina Mudenda to go with a strange man to Europe.

Can the flight be paid from the Development Education budget, as part of the exchange programme? If this is not possible, the money Udo deposited with Jonah Gokova, can be used. The Oranienburg congregation and Gossner Mission will stand for the expenses in Germany.

I regret that you are not able to come in the end of May, together with Mr. Mashakada of ZCTU and Jonah Gokova. In June there are a lot of ecumenical events, not only the conference on Southern Africa in the Context of the Global Economic Development, but also the German Ecumenical Assembly. There, we will hold a workshop on: Reconciliation - the Economic Side of the Coin, focussing on Zimbabwe and South Africa as examples.

In your fax letter, you suggested to come in July/August. You are of course welcome to come together with Selina. The problem however is that July/August is holiday time in Germany, and one can hardly arrange a relevant programme in communities and congregations. You can, of course, join the paddle group but I doubt that you are interested to do so.

Therefore I suggest to postpone your visit until November/December. A visit in September/ October does not fit into our schedule. I will most likely go to Zambia for two or three months to substitute Birgit Groth for a while, since her contract expires in June. To work in Zambia would provide the chance to see what ESAP means in Zambia and how the churches there deal with ESAP. Besides that, I can work on the exchange programme between the projects in Zimbabwe and Zambia, and I will prepare the workshop with our partners in both, Zambia and Zimbabwe. The workshop is now planned for the second half of October/ first half of November. We think of 5 days in Lusaka.

The reason why the workshop had to be postponed is that our new Director who will be the new Africa Officer, too, shall participate, and so shall the new Liaison Officer in Lusaka.

The new Director has been elected two weeks ago. His name is Rev. Gottfried Kraatz. He lived in South Africa (Mitchells Plein near to Cape Town), for some years, before he was arrested in 1985, and expelled from South Africa. He will be in office from October on, but can leave for Zambia only after our Board Meeting, that will be held from October 10 to 13.

For the Lusaka Office, we are still looking for appropriate candidates. It looks as if the new officer can begin the job not earlier than October/November.

Please, can you check, and discuss with Mrs. Tanyonganga, which time fits in your timetable. As discussed before, Mrs. Tanyonganga and you should participate in the workshop. Who else from the Zimbabwean side? I was thinking of one representative from each of the pilote projects.

When being in Lusaka I can also come to Harare for my final visit, in order to assess the pilot phase of Development Education, and to write our report. Whether I come alone or together with a little group again, must be decided. Some people asked me whether and when the next group will visit Zimbabwe. I agreed to discuss that issue with you. Please, let me know whether you are willing to arrange a programme again for three or four persons.

After that visit and after we will have written our report on the pilot phase of Development Education, you should come to Germany in order to assess the German part of Development Education, and to discuss the outcome with donors and partners here.

Please, let me know as soon as possible what you think of that programme.

I beg your pardon for not sending my annual report, until now. I wrote in
German months ago but was not thinking of the translation. Sorry. I will post
it by ordinary mail.

Did you ever get a letter by IRED North from Rome? That organisation is
networking projects in the informal sector ("local economics") worldwide. I
wrote them last year and asked whether they have members in Southern Africa
that could be of interest for you. I was told that they have a lot of
experience and expertises as well on project management and implementation.
I never got an answer. Do you want me to push them for a reply, or are you
not interested?

Did you discuss the issue of the survey in Siachilaba/Binga with Lizzi
Nyathi? Last year we said that the survey needs her and your backing
otherwise we would give up the idea. Since we did not hear anything from your
side, I did not proceed on working on it.

Did you ever get reports from Siachilaba, Marume and Matava, of that we can
get a copy? It was one of the recommendations in our assessment report. We
did not want them to write extra reports but to share what they had to
report, in any case.

For the sake of your fast information I send the letter by fax. The report
will come by ordinary mail.

I hope to hearing from you soon.
Please, convey my greetings to Mrs. Tanyongana, Janet, and all the other
colleagues of the Training Centre, and to Fiona and your family as well.

Annual Report 1995 - Solidarity Desk

1. The project: Let the people speak or: The power of the ordinary people - Development and Justice in Zimbabwe and Germany

In 1995 one group from Zimbabwe visited Germany and one group from Germany visited Zimbabwe.

In April/ May, Mr. Langton Kuveya, Miss Leokodia Mutsindikwa, development worker under the ministry for rural development, job creation and cooperatives, and Miss Lizzi Nyathi, acting coordinator and organiser of the women's programme of BIDA (Binga Development Association) visited East Germany in order to be confronted with and learn about problems of structural adjustment in rural areas in East Germany. The group visited congregations and communities in the church districts of Angermünde, Templin, Neuruppin, Oranienburg, Lübbenau, Halle, Magdeburg, Malchin. They got to know the kind of production in large highly specialised Agricultural Associations and in a big farm run by a family in the very fertile Magdeburger Boerde where few people attain high yields. They visited ecological farms and an ecological village where farmers practice the concept of integrated agriculture. The farmers have to work very hard and to struggle for markets, and they get poor salaries.

Visiting job creation projects the Zimbabwean group realized contradictions of the "second labour market" that follows often a more social than an economic approach. The target is to drop down the high unemployment rate in the rural areas, mainly among women above 40 years. Projects subsidized by the government are not allowed to make profit and to sell their products along commercial lines, and to compete with the private sector that is not subsidized. Such projects often revitalise simple traditional production means.

In Niederndodeleben near to Magdeburg, we held a joint seminar with the Zimbabwe Network on: Structural Adjustment in Rural Areas in Zimbabwe and in East Germany.

The group attended a workshop on: Village Development run by the Boarding Folk High School at the Lake Seddin.

The group was well received wherever they went. People got interested in Zimbabwe. The direct encounter of people is still a proved method to build global awareness and to start the process of ecumenical education which is of course endless and of that results are difficult to assess. The direct political output in terms of political lobbying is however low.

None of the congregations and church districts visited is willing to run a direct bilateral partnership programme with the pilotprojects in Zimbabwe on their own. Both, congregations and church districts fear language and finance problems. They are still lacking an emotional ground for a partnership, they don't have a common history, they don't see common interests or strategies with the pilot projects. Exchange visits and the discussion on topics as: globalisation of poverty, development, justice, power and powerlessness must be organised by Gossner Mission, otherwise they will come to an end. Our Zimbabwean partner and we agreed to proceed the exchange programme but to involve people from other sectors of the Zimbabwean society than the pilot projects. The main criteria for people to be selected for the exchange programme must be their contribution to the topic deliberated.

In April, I attended the Conference in Harare on: The effects of ESAP on NGO's and their services. The conference was organised by the Ecumenical Support Services (ESS), a small ecumenical NGO that is financially supported i.a. by "Bread for the World". The main aim of ESS is to promote justice and to reflect ecumenical issues within the Zimbabwean context.

In October/November, Hanni Musche from Bernburg (who works in a One World Shop group) and Gunnar Theissen from Berlin (a student who is also active in a One World Project "Baobab Infoshop"), and I visited the pilot projects in Siachilaba, Marume and Matava, and various church projects. We were briefed by representatives of the ZCC and of ESS, and we had the chance to attend a few lessons of a short course on development at the Ecumenical Resource and Training Centre. Gunnar contacted ZCTU that works on a study project: Beyond ESAP - Framework for a Long-Term Development Strategy.

After five years of structural adjustment in Zimbabwe and a new severe drought problems of impoverishment got worse. The government made new internal and foreign debts, so that the Worldbank has suspended a 600 Mio Z\$ loan until conditions like the decrease of the budget deficit to 7.5% are fulfilled.

Supported by the ZCC and under its structures a Network for Economic Justice was formed with various churches and NGO's cooperating. The main demand of the network is: Three meals per day for every Zimbabwean. Some NGO's have regular talks with the Worldbank Office in Harare. NGO's reject to be defined as traditional welfare organisations but want to discuss with the Bank alternatives to the classical adjustment policy of the Bank. They raise their voice in order to influence ESAP II which will be implemented from 1996 on. The Network for Economic Justice and the NGO coalition are relevant partners for our lobby and advocacy work in both Germany and the European Union.

The three pilot projects Siachilaba, Marume and Matave made progress. What they are doing can be called: Economy from below. The quality of baskets, stools and clothes produced in Siachilaba has improved, although productivity is still low and marketing difficult. The dam in Matava has been finished after three years of hard and collaborative labour of the people. The villagers are very proud of their project which comprehends besides the dam an adult literacy course, sewing groups, a pottery group, a bucket making and a soap making group. The three pilote projects don't get funds. That is their strength and advantage. The limitations of self-help projects must however not be overlooked. Communities are lacking funds for their projects due to the growing costs of living caused by ESAP and the drought. The concept of self reliance must not release the government from its responsibility. It must enable and empower the communities to stand for their rights.

In our preliminary evaluation, Mr. Kuveya and I discerned the different notion of development education in our respective context: In Zimbabwe, development educations focusses on self reliance and project management, whereas development education in Germany relies on political solidarity and criticism of the global market. To interlink the both sides of development education has been the target of the bilateral project which is difficult to achieve.

We agreed that Mr. Kuveya will proceed in accompanying the three pilot projects, he will document and conceptualize their development. We in Germany will improve our lobby work in cooperation with the Economic Justice Network and the Ecumenical Support Services.

Comprehensice reports on the exchange visits are available.

2. Public relations work and cooperation with congregations

At the annual Solidarity Conference in January (13-14/01) under the topic: Solidarity has got Faces - Chances and Problems of Partnership, we discussed our relationship to partners in various churches and countries. Experiences and results of the bilateral development education project: Let the people speak, of partnership relations between congregations in the former German Democratic Republic (East Germany) and the former Federal Republic (West Germany), between German congregations and resettled German Lutheran congregations in Russia, between Gossner Mission and the Gossner Evangelical Lutheran Church in India, between NGO's and development projects in Nikaragua, between a district of Berlin and a district of Maputo/Mocambique were deliberated. A report on the conference is available (in German).

In December 1994, Gossner Mission together with other organisations hold a preparatory workshop for the World Social Summit in Kopenhagen, in order to formulate a statement. Gunnar Theissen took part in the NGO Forum in Kopenhagen, on behalf of Gossner Mission.

The visit of the Zimbabweans was used to make the situation in Zimbabwe and the work of the visitors known, and to introduce the concept of development education in both Zimbabwe and Germany in public meetings, congregations, church services, and in schools.

I reported the youth synode of the church district of Luckau, in church meetings in Schwedt and Wiesbaden, in meetings of church ministers, in services, at the church rallye in the church district of Senftenberg, in a meeting of the Rosa-Luxemburg Society in Lauchhammer about Zimbabwe and present developments in Southern Africa.

At the Gossner Conference (7-8/09), participants discussed the common paper of the Catholic and Protestant Churches in Germany on: Concerning the Social and Economic Situation in Germany. We expressed our position in a paper with special regard to the economic and social situation in "3rd World" countries. The paper is available (in German).

3. Cooperation with South Africa

Various attempts to stabilize our relationship with partners in South Africa failed.

The Ecumenical Land Restoration and Development Programme (ELRDP) in Kimberley that applied for financial support was too ambitious and not rooted in the forcibly removed communities whom it was designed to serve legally and practically. Contacts with one of the resettling communities, Schmidtsdrift, shall be organized through the "Covenant Programme".

The Interdenominational Committee for Industrial Mission (IKIM) asked for a young theologian from Germany as fraternal/sororal worker. Unfortunately, we could not meet that request. Firstly we had no candidate matching to the demand of IKIM. Later on, there were no means available to finance the person.

In Berlin, a group of students of theology and others meet once per month in order to deliberate on theological issues like reconciliation in South Africa after Apartheid came to an end.

In cooperation with "Third World House" Bielefeld, World Peace Service, "Women for Justice" we received two representatives of SANCO the umbrella organisation of civics.

I participated in the Trialogue Programme between South Africa, Poland and Germany: Dealing with the Past in Justice. The programme was organized by the Ecumenical Bureau Berlin. Participants came from South Africa, Poland, USA and Germany.

4. Zimbabwe working group and Solidarity Committee

The Zimbabwe working group is a circle of 8 to 10 persons who work either in the field of development education and global justice or are simply interested in Zimbabwe. The group and the Solidarity Committee that is a subcommittee of Gossner Mission's Board met five times, in order to discuss Zimbabwe and South Africa related issues.

5. Other committees

I have been a member of the Protestant Commission for Southern Africa, of the South Africa Advisory Board of the Berlin Mission, of the Advisory Board of the Office for Development Education in the Regional Churches of East Germany (That office was closed in September 1995), of the Ecumenical Missionary World Service Committee - Department for Society related Services, and of the projectgroup of the German World Day of Prayer.





Greetings from the cold and snow-covered Berlin, and many thanks for your fax message dated 14 January.

The meeting on 8 February was quite good. We were 12 participants altogether of NGO's and church organisations working for global justice and solidarity with the "forgotten" Southern Africa. We decided not to start a special campaign for Zimbabwe but to contact Christian Aid because of their experience with campaigns and talks with the world bank. We decided furthermore not to plan an extra workshop on lobbying for Zimbabwe but to participate in a conference which will take place from 14th until June 2nd, in Cologne and Southern Africa within the context of the global economic development.

That conference will be organised by KOS (local) from for Southern Africa which is a network of various church- and non-church-related solidarity organisations, of which some were present on the meeting of 8 February as well. The conference will be mainly topic-based with alternatives to SAP like they have been elaborated by ZOTU. The general secretary of ZOTU has been invited as speaker. A group discussion on development, education and lobbying in the North for the South is planned, too.

That means: The conference will tackle some of the issues we discussed with Mr. Kuveya and Mr. Mufasa, and it does not make sense to organise an extra workshop. It makes however sense if Mr. Kuveya attends the conference since he has been one of

networking NGO's to prepare them for talks with the World Bank. He knows what NGO's are demanding from the Bank and can give us some highlights to be backed from our side. It would be also meaningful if you could participate in order to tell us something on surviving strategies of the ordinary people. Therefore I propose that you and Mr. Gokova should come to Germany in the end of May and first half of June, to participate in that conference. Mr. Gokova must come on a different ticket that we have to finance.

What do you think of that proposal? Apart from the conference we shall have meetings with those who have been involved in the "Let the people speak" programme in East Germany who hardly will attend that conference.

The 13th of June is fixed for a meeting to assess the conference and to discuss with Morgan Tsangvirai (or any other ZCTU representative if he cannot come) future strategies for a better advocacy work in the North. Since there are working relations between ZCTU and the Economic Justice Network, you and Mr. Gokova shall participate in that meeting as well, so that various agents demanding alternatives to ESAP agree on common strategies.

All in all I think of a two to three weeks programme for you that should include a visit to "Bread for the World" in Stuttgart. The visit shall not last longer than mid-June since our summer holidays begin on 20 June, then you find hardly somebody coming to meetings.

Please, let me know your reply soon, in order to give me a chance to save that time.

For how long will your contract with ZCC last, and will it be prolonged? If ZCC prolongs the contract with you will it be for Development Education as special programm under ERTC or will you shift to the staff of ERTC as lecturer? I would like to hear more about your intentions in order to relate them to our plans.

You know that we intend to hold a workshop in September, in Zambia on the future cooperation between Gossner Mission and her partners in Zambia and Zimbabwe. The exact date is not fixed, yet, but will tend to the end of September more than to the beginning.

Doris Margraf-Knuth of "Bread for the World" told me that most of the money earmarked for "Let the people speak" has still been shelved on their accounts. Does the ZCC pre-finance your programme and will reclaim the funds later? Or did you save the money in order to make longer use of it?

The Zambia report and the unhonoured cheque did not arrive, yet. I trust they will come soon. As far as the 1.100,-- DM are concerned, do you want me to write a new letter to the Buhera school people to explain the delay?


Can you, please, send me the last papers of the Economic Justice Network (Half Year Report)? If there are reports from the pilote projects, please, send them as well.

Hanni Musche and the Bernburg One-World-Group are willing to sell baskets made by the Siachilaba women's group and crafts from the Buhera group. The qualitiy seems to be fine. To sell crafts here would give the woman a little but safe income. Is there a possibility to post a container with goods? What is the freight charge and is there any custom excise? I suppose Mrs. Chaite of the Procurement Service knows the regulations. What about the catalogue she was mentioning last October?



Dear Langton,

many thanks for your fax message dated 5th of January 1996 and your report on our visit that arrived on January the 19th.

Has the money arrived? I hope the delay did not cause any tension with the Marume people. I announced the 1.100,-- DM in a letter, shortly before our departure from Zimbabwe. Do you remember? Do you want me to send another letter to them in order to explain the delay?

The 2000,-- DM can be handled in the same way. We agreed that they shall be used for a borehole for the school. The school in Buhera is an attractive project for our people here. Last time when I reported on the "Let the people speak" - program to a church group, the parish made a collection of 87,50 DM for the school.

Concerning your report on our visit I have got the feeling that there were a few misunderstandings:

I don't think the exchange visits by Development Education Officers shall remain as it was, with only the both of us discussing issues as Human Rights, Poverty, Human Development etc..

As far as I understood our proposal, we want the exchange programme to focus on issues like Human Rights, Poverty, Community Development/Local Economy etc. Participants shall come not only from the three pilote projects but be choosen according to their ability to contribute to the respective issue. (cf.p.2 of the appendix to your report)

Proposal 7 says that pilot project members shall write reports. This again is somehow misunderstandable or a different proposal to what I wrote under P.4. I did not want the people to write more reports, my suggestions was to ask the field workers who write reports regularly, to send a copy of their report to us through your office. That would help us to get informations and to see the development of the projects. That is however only possible if the reports are not confidential.

You promised to send us a copy of your report on your trip to Zambia that you wrote for your annual report. I am still interested in getting that paper. It will help us to discuss your observations with both, our Zambia Desk and the projectholders in Zambia.

Did you discuss with Lizzi the proposal concerning the survey on living conditions of people in Siachilaba after ESAP? Dr. Kunze and Gunnar Theissen are still ready to assist in that survey, or even to make a project out of it for their sociological research. To do so they need "green lighth" from your side and Lizzi's readiness to take part.

In your fax you indicate your visit to Germany for March/April. What shall be the objectives and terms of reference for that visit? We must definitely meet in order to assess the three years pilotphase of the "Let the people speak" program. March/April is a bit early to do that. The three-year-pilotphase expires with the end of this year 1996, according to my understanding. October would be the appropriate time to write the final report for ZCC and "Bread for the World", with our recommendations and proposals concerning the improvement of community development, on development education and political empowerment as contribution to the discussion on development concepts and development strategies.

I think we must save time for the final discussion and the final report around September or October. The report can be discussed and written either in Ziombabwe or in Germany. Since I have to go to Zambia in September for the planning workshop on Gossner Mission's future commitment in Southern Africa, I could combine the visit to Zambia with a visit to Zimbabwe.

As you know you and Mrs. Tanyongana will be invited to participate in the planning workshop. The exact dates are not fixed yet. Who else shall participate from the Zimbabwean side. Representatives of the pilotprojects? Mr. Gokova?

Coming back to your intended visit to Germany: I don't see it making much sense to go again to Job Creation Schemes or to visit projects of local economy. Do you have something special in mind what you want to see and to discuss?

My sugesstion is to organise the workshop on common and interlinked South-North-strategies vis-a-vis structural adjustment programs, in April in Germany. When we discussed the workshop with Mr. Mutasa and Mr. Gokova in ZCC's Headquarter, in October last year, we thought that workshop could be linked with the one of the Nordic Churches planned for February. I learned that that workshop has been postponed to April (10/14-04) and is meant for church leaders from Scandinavian Churches and FOCCESA. German participation is welcome. I am looking presently for German church leaders who can participate. That makes more sense than sending people from church groups like Gossner Mission. It appears a problem that our Regional Churches have no ecumenical relations to churches in Zimbabwe. There are many contacts to the Lutheran Church in Tanzania. I hope nevertheless to find somebody, in particular since the conference will deal with the effects of ESAP on Tanzania and Mocambique as well as Zimbabwe.

I propose to have an extra workshop on our level on interlinked South-North-strategies, that takes place in April in Germany, with Mr. Gokova, you and a third person as participants. What do you think in this regard? Can the tickets be part of the "Let the people speak" budget? Including the workshop of three or four days, your visit to Germany shall last not much longer than two weeks.

On February the 8th, I will have a meeting with German church groups and NGO's working in the field of global justice and global development, cancelation of debts for "3rd World" countries etc. "Bread for the World" and Zimbabwe Network will participate as well. We will discuss our lobby- and advocacy-work on ESAP, and plan practical actions. I suppose the participants will favourizing a workshop in Germany with people from Zimbabwe, in order to get the chance to participate.

I would be grateful if I could get a first response from your side, soon, in particular whether your budget allows to provide three tickets to Germany and back. We will stand for board and lodging.

Please, discuss the proposal of having the intended workshop in Germany with Mr. Gokova. I will write him as well.

Just for your information: My contract with Gossner Mission will definitely come to an end in December 1996. It was extended in April 1994 for the "Let the people speak" program but will not be extended again. Due to severe finance problems we have to minimise our staff. Our policy committee has suggested, and the board has decided, that Gossner Mission will have in future only three senior staff: The new Director will work for both the Directorate and the Africa desk. Mr. Bernd Krause will take over the Asia Desk, after the present Director, Mr. Hecker, and the present Asia Officer, Mrs. Hecker, have left Gossner Mission in August 1996. Wilhelm Damm, the Officer for Zambia, will work part time, and after his retirement in 1998, not be replaced. Michael Sturm from Mainz works now in Berlin for the program: Society related Services.

That means all in all: The staff of Gossner Mission will be halved from next year on, we will definitely go on with our work in the South of Africa, namely in Zambia, Zimbabwe and South Africa. Details shall be discussed at the workshop in Lusaka, in September this year.







Dear Langton,

greetings to you from Berlin. We all arrived safe back home, only Hanni's suitcase was missed but later brought directly to her house in Bernburg which made travelling by train easier for her. Gunnar has got some trouble at the university since he was late in the beginning of the new term. We hope that he will be accepted nevertheless for a particular seminar, if I confirm that he made a practical in Zimbabwe. I think, that he learned a lot for his subject at the university. Therefore it was a practical, indeed.

Please, find enclosed our report. I regret that it got quite long, again. In order to document the pilot phase of the project, and later on to evaluate it, it seemed us to be necessary. We didn't discuss the final version of our assessment and our plans. I hope that you agree to my formulation, otherwise I ask you to contradict.

I will send copies of the report directly to the three pilot projects, to UCCSA, RCZ, and ESS. Whom else you will submit the paper, is up to you.

I discussed our plans for the time being with "Bread for the World". They seemed to be happy with the idea to involve other partners on both sides in order to improve the political efficiency of Development Education.

Until now I didn't get any reply from the Norwegian church concerning the conference in February. The telephone number I was given, must be wrong, I don't get a line. Therefore I had to write what requires more time to answer.

As far as the 2000,--DM for a water project are concerned I can confirm that the money is still on our bank account. To use it for the borehole for the primary school in Buhera, is okay. Did you get cash for the cheque I left with you?

I am still interesting in getting your report on your trip to Zambia. Our Zambia Committee, that wants to know your appraisal and your proposals on the further cooperation between Zambia and Zimbabwe, meets on Friday the 24th of November, already. If the reports doesn't come in time, I must report what I heard from you. Please, send us, nevertheless, the written report.

Concerning the exchange program between projects in Zambia and Zimbabwe, we think it would be helpful for the Naluyanda Integrated Project if some people could go to Matava, soon. Do you think it will be possible to invite 6 to 8 persons from both the Executive Committee and the staff of N.I.P. to go there any time before or after the harvest season, next year? 6 to 8 persons would be fine since they can use the Gossner minibus driven by either Mr. Chibeshe the driver or Mr. Sumaili, the N.I.P. supervisor, or Mr. Hamajata, the agriculturist. Such a tour will definitely be educative and motivating for those participating. Please, send us a calculation how much that trip will cost. We have to negotiate finances with our boards and the N.I.P. ExCo. Can one part of the total costs be covered by the money approved for "Let the people speak" Development Education Program? Please, discuss that issue with your director. It should be possible since we said that the South - South exchange shall be part of the entire program. The other partners should also contribute, of course.



Dear Langton,

finally you get my report on your visit. It took more time than expected since other office things had to be done as well. In the meantime I spent also a ten days holiday in Italy which was very nice.

I hope you found your family in good health and mood, and your father in law back from hospital. Locadia wrote a letter indicating that your flight home was safe and exciting, and you all proceeded to your homes the same morning which was good to know.

Looking back I think the programme was too fully packed leaving not enough time for reflection. The next time we must have at least two to three days in the beginning to elaborate guidelines for our reflection and assessment. And we must include a three days workshop/seminar in the end of the visit, to discuss our observations and impressions in a more systematic way. Those issues raised in the evaluation meeting on the 3rd of May need a deeper reflection, I think.

Going through your reports I was missing a more detailed assessment of our situation in Germany. Apart from some critical remarks on non profit making ABM projects nothing is mentioned about the general situation as you see it, about developments in our economy, about our lifestyle, our poverty, culture, the role of the church etc. You would really help us in revealing your feelings and observations. I strongly believe that we need your provocation (in the real meaning of the word) in order to do the little we can to raise awareness on justice and a more humane development in our society.

Concerning our next visit to Zimbabwe, I am planning to come in October, any time after the 7th. September has already been fully packed with meetings, and our governing board where I must be present, will meet from the 5th to the 7th of October. Together with me Gunnar Theißen would like to come, and almost likely somebody from Neuruppin and somebody from the group in Halle. Do you think four persons are okay? Gunnar comes likely in the end of September, already, and would like to have partly his own programme. He has a particular interest in making contacts with the university. Please, let me know soon, which time is most suitable for you and the communities. We would like to spend most of the time with the communities.

The Siachilaba adult literacy group Bunsiswa has sent an application letter in order to get \$ 5.550 as drought relief support from us or any donor agency in Germany. I will reply directly to them in saying that we don't have programmes for drought relief. Who runs such programmes in Zimbabwe? Is it Christian Care or the Zimbabwean government? I understand, that the group wants to make use of us as overseas partner. We agreed however that Gossner Mission should not and cannot function as donor, we don't have any charity funds available. If they need finances for their activities - besides drought relief - we must find other solutions either through ZCC and its development programme or through donor agencies here. Or, what do you recommend? Shall I ask the congregations around Neuruppin to collect some money which will certainly take some time.

Rev. Inge Burkhardt from Halle will send us about 1.000,--DM that was collected at a baptism and is meant for the "work with children done by Mr. Kuveya". Do you want that money to be donated to the Buhera people for the school?

The staff of the Gwembe South Development Project in Zambia plans an excursion to Hwange and Binga for July, the 14th to 17th. I don't know their programme but they might contact BIDA as well. We gave them BIDA's address. Please, let Lizzi know that these people may come. Since they arrange their own programme I don't think it will be useful for you to make an extra trip to Binga. If you should be there by chance, you can take the opportunity to meet them.


Last but not least: I don't know whether you learned whilst being with us that the Gossner Church in India celebrates it's 100 anniversary in October and November this year. Part of the celebration will be a workshop about the social responsibility of the Church. That workshop is meant for grassroot people from the Gossner Church in India with some participants from Germany and resource persons from both countries, India and Germany. The workshop will be take place from October the 15th to the 21st.

Gossner Mission likes to invite somebody from Zimbabwe to participate in that workshop, with a programme prior to and after the workshop so that the whole time for a visit to India can cover the period October 12th to 25th. The person coming should be preferable a women which is not a must, work on the grassroot level in the field of "Learning for Transformation" and be familiar with the philosophy behind the three volume publication "Learning for Transformation" issued by the ZCC which is well known and well used in India. Gossner Mission will of course stand for all expenditures for that visit. Whom shall we invite? Please, give us a name. Would Selina be the right person? Or Miss Chipo Khupe? Or anybody else?

I wish you all the best and look forward to hearing from you. Please, convey my best regards to your director, Mrs. Tanyongana, to your secretary Janet and all the other colleagues.

Dear Langton,

please, find enclosed the English version of my report on the workshop we carried out over Eastern. It may a bit long. I wanted, however, to write down the informations and datas we got.

What is the situation in the Council and the EHRC? Did the ZCC finalize its restructuring process? I learned from Helmut Hess that the practical implementation of development programmes will be with Christian care, in the future.

Did the ZCC facilitated further workshops on ESAP in the regions, as indicated in the report on the workshop of December 1993? What was the outcome of those workshops? You know that I am interested in papers which keep us up to date concerning ESAP.

Have you been in the pilote projects, in the meantime? What is the situation like, there? Are they affected by drought? Do they get drought relief? As mentioned before I got a finance application from the Adult Literacy Group in Binga. They wanted about \$ 5.500 as drought relief. For me it was not quite clear why they wanted money for drought relief. I referred them to BIDA resp. to you. I suppose that only families, no groups get drought relief. If people in the pilote projects need, however, money for literacy programmes, we should tell "Bread for the World" that there is still a need for informal education.

Until now, I discussed only on the phone with Helmut Hess and Wolfgang May about the future of "Let the people speak". We fixed a date for September, the 18th. Then I will go to Stuttgart for a deeper discussion.

Did you get any reply from Edna Maluma? Mr. Damm wrote her, I think, some weeks ago, telling her that she should invite you to the Gwembe Valley. Mr. Damm himself will go in the end of August to Zambia.

Last weekend, I had visitors from Zambia. Two members of the Naluyanda Project have come to Germany for three months, on invitation of one of our former co-workers in the project. I gave them our reports. The first reaction was: These reports are very informative, for us as well.

Please, can you send us as soon as possible the name of the person our Secretary for India wants to invite for the conference in India. We must send an official invitation to that person, and we must book the flight. The person may have to apply for a visa, too.

All the best to all of you.



greetings to you from Berlin.
I hope you got my letter from October the 11th. What is your reaction so far?

Please, find enclosed the minutes of the meeting of the Zimbabwe working group from the end of September. I didn't find time to write the English version down earlier.

In the meantime I visited few congregations and staff meetings in the church district of Oranienburg and Cottbus to brief them about Zimbabwe and our project "Let the people speak".

They found the general idea and philosophy of our project very interesting, mainly the concept of tackling structural adjustment problems in both Zimbabwe and Germany, and the idea of an intercultural exchange on a grass root level as well. They agreed to our common understanding of development as a comprehensive global process. They saw the necessity to correct the wrong onesided definition of development as economic growth and as that societal and economic pattern that goes from North to South. They saw an obligation to change patterns of life in Germany. And they thought that voiceless and the powerless people in Germany can be encouraged to organize themselves through an exchange with Zimbabwean communities.

But they were reluctant when I spoke on installing a permanent partnership with communities in Zimbabwe. They fear financial and language problems, and many are overburdened with the traditional pastoral work in their congregations. I think a permanent partnership can be one of the targets of our pilot project and not the pre-condition. We can start an exchange programme even if there is presently no readiness to install a permanent partnership with one community in Zimbabwe.

In the beginning of November I visited our friends in Crussow, Rev. Uecker and the group, and the women's group in Gellmersdorf. Heiko, the young man, found a job in a big shopping centre. He is very keen to go to Zimbabwe and to meet the communities. So is Rev. Uecker.

The women's group agreed to write a letter to the women's groups in the communities to introduce themselves. This is not yet done since Rev. Uecker has to undergo an operation and can't push them.

Rev. Uecker told me that his neighbour pastor is going to join the "One-World-Shop" project and has also an interest to make contacts with Zimbabwe. But Rev. Uecker didn't give me further details, and I was not able to meet the colleague of him until now.

Several times people were objecting the concept of an exchange programme, arguing that the money should rather be spent for economic development projects. Their point was: Instead of wasting money for expensive trips to and from Zimbabwe one should drill boreholes and build clinics. Despite of such objections people are willing to receive visitors from Zimbabwe, and to host them for a week and to organize places in projects or small scale enterprises run in their areas.

On Saturday, the 26th of November, we will hold a workshop in Berlin on: ESAP - causes and effects. One of the students of the Anti Apartheid Initiative will present a paper on that topic which he wrote for his political science subject.

Renate, Juergen and myself will report what we have seen. Then we will discuss strategies what to do.

After that workshop I will brief you on the outcome.

Concerning Dr. Mai's letter to you I like just to comment: This is still our target, to bring grassroot people together so that they eventually discover their common interest and find common political strategies. But this is - as Wolfgang Mai knows - not just a question of organisation, it requires time, mutual confidence, political awareness etc. And I suppose that we will make a similar experience as my colleagues make when discussing with unemployed in Germany. In most cases they don't like to discuss about unemployment. They want to get jobs. We may have to discover that the poor don't like to discuss poverty but simply to get what they need for a decent life. Having said this I add that I am convinced that marginalized poor people want to know and must know what is causing their problems. I hope to further that process during the visit of the Zimbabwean group in March/April 1995. Then we must hold a workshop on adjustment problems in both countries, Zimbabwe and Germany, together with people from the Zimbabwe Network and young people from rural areas.

And your people will be exposed to the normal live in villages. We have to discuss political strategies for both sides as well.

As soon as I know the exact dates for the workshop I will notify the time for the group visit. Did you identified already the three or four persons who will come along? I am thinking of persons like Selina or one of the retrenched teachers in Matava. What about Rev. Jonah K. Gokova the person from the Ecumenical Support Service who could brief the Zimbabwean and the German side on ESAP?

Apart from our project I like to raise another question: From time to time young Germans who like to live and to work as volunteers in an African country for some months, ask whether we can organize a living and working place for them. These youngsters like to go abroad after they passed their examinations for a half a year or a year, in order to learn more about the world. Such a time abroad will help them to make new experiences and to widen their horizon. They are ready to pay for their stay, and we must accept them before they go. Do you know whether ZCC or any church body in Zimbabwe runs a programme for volunteers, or would be willing to organize accomodation and a place to work for a young person who is keen to help and to learn? What are the conditions to be fulfilled? Does one need a workpermit?

We got just recently a request by a young women who likes to work with children in any "3rd World Country", e.g. in a kindergarden or a preschool or any other programme for children. I would be grateful if you can check whether there is any possibility for her to go for a limited time to Zimbabwe.

I hope you and your family are fine. Please, convey my best greetings to them as well as to Mrs. Tanyongana, to Janet and all the others sisters and brothers including those in the communities.

Dear Langton,

thank you for your report which I found on my desk in the beginning of this week when being back from various conferences and meetings.

It reminded me of the three interesting and challenging weeks in Zimbabwe with you and all the friends around our project "Let the people speak". I like to thank you once again for all what you have done for us and for all the work which you have invested into the project. I hope you found a bit of rest after we had left. I know what it means to organize programmes like ours.

The three of us arrived safely back home, in Berlin resp. Leipzig, although my suitcase was missed. Fortunately, it came still the same day and was brought to my house. It was a nice service.

In the office I found a lot of files and letters on my desk as usual after weeks of absence. The same week, the governing board of Gossner Mission met where I had to report on "Let the people speak". On the one side our boardmembers were quite supportive in saying that this type of bilateral exchange has become very important in particular since our economies and our political problems and their solutions are interlinked. The project is part of Gossner Mission's ecumenical attitude and commitment. Boardmembers, on the other side, were not too enthusiastic on the project since they became aware that we began a new programme as Gossner Mission. The question was raised whether Gossner Mission can afford to start a new programme in a time when facing serious financial problems. For the pilot period the project was approved already last year. So nobody was questioning our pilot project. But what are the implications for the time afterwards?

I don't want to disturb you but just want to let you know what was discussed, since Gossner Mission's financial situation

seems to be part of the problems we are discussing: The rich Germany and the rich Europe are in a severe crisis. Due to the economic recession and the fact that people are leaving the churches (for several reasons like disappointment, desinterest, other financial burdes etc.) churches get less church taxes than before and cut their subsidies for groups like Gossner Mission. Our circles and friends go on to support our work but their donations are not enough to finance us fully, whilst others prefer to support initiatives within Germany or direct economic instead of education projects. So, we have also to learn from your side how to operate within a narrow financial frame.

However, for the time being I go on with "Let the people speak" and the other fields of international solidarity work.

Coming back to our reports: Did you go through ours? What was your reaction?

Personally, I regret that there was not time enough in the end to discuss impressions and observations in length with you. The evaluation meeting with ZCC units was fruitful, but I wished to have a full day with you to evaluate our experiences and to plan the next steps.

I do however understand that one needs some time to reflect before one gets fully aware of what one has learned. This is at least true as far as I am concerned.

In addition to our report I like to make some more remarks:

1. I was pleased to see that you had not to start from the very beginning when you work with the three communities. They started their projects obviously before "Let the people speak" came in. Please, can you tell me a bit of their story. Who motivated them? Did they start by their own? Without any pressure or motivation from outside be it the government or any NGO? How do the people earn their living individually apart from their projects?

These are in my understanding also ways to speak out what they want.

2. I realized that various development organisations operated in the three communities: in Marume the governmental structure was predominant, in Matava the LWF, in Siachilaba BIDA and the others. This is very interesting since it gives us the chance to compare the approach and the work of these organisations. What is your assessment of their work? What makes them functioning? Which are their obstacles?

3. During the workshop in Siachilaba I missed a real participatory approach. The facilitator approached the audience as a teacher in briefing and teaching them. Then she asked them to raise questions which only a few did. I know briefing people is sometimes necessary. But I wonder which methodology you are using to make them speaking.

4. How can you or we discuss the international aspect of the project with the communities? They have heard apparantly on Europeans mainly as donors who are rich and nice. How do they

see the role of Germany and Europa as exploiter and colonial power? Which picture at all do they have of Germany and Europe? This would be also of interest for us.

5. Our visits to the communities were short. One or two days are not enough to install a certain mutual understanding. I did understand very well that talks with the church officials were very useful to make the projekt known to them. But the next time I would prefer to have more time for meetings and workshops with the communities.

6. I am not too happy with our long reports but would suggest to write more problem oriented than narrative reports. The itinery may be annected. The report itself should focus on certain issues which we identify as relevant for the project and its outcome.

I understood that you have sent both reports yours as well as ours to the three colleques Claasen, Hess and Mai of "Bread for the world". Am I that right or do you want me to mail them from here?

Recently I was for a conference on South Africa in a little town near to Stuttgart and used a short stop in Stuttgart for talks with Wolfgang Mai and Bernward Causemann the person in charge of the Zimbabwe Network. I briefed them on our visit to Zimbabwe and we had an exchange of ideas. Mr. Mai is focussing on the issue of arms trade, not on ESAP. The Zimbabwe Network is planning a bigger event for 1985, the 15th anniversary of Zimbabwe's independence. Apart from that we would like to hold a common workshop on ESAP in Zimbabwe and adjustment problems in East Germany. That workshop should take place in East Germany in April/ May in connction with the visit of a Zimbabwean group in Germany. That means we should fix the dates for the visit as soon as possible. Please, let me know, which time fits into your schedule.

Whilst we were in Zimbabwe a church rallye which took place in Chorin near Angermünde and Schwedt collected around 2000,-- DM (10.000 ZimDollar) for boreholes, pumps or a dam. Which community do you think should get that money? And how can it be transferred?

I hope you and your family are fine. Please, convey my best greetings to Fiona and your children, to Janet, to Mrs. Tanyongana, to Mr. Kuchera and all the other friends of ZCC and around you.

Key issues as far as Zimbabwe is concerned were: Who resp. what is responsible for the growing gap between the poor and the rich? Zimbabwe has got a broad variety of natural resources and technical know-how - why was she forced to join the IMF? Is there any alternative to the SAP? Will the resettlement programme help the poor or destroy commercial farms and decrease the country's food production? Are there training and assistance programmes for the landless so that they increase the productivity in food production? Which role do the parties and the numerous NGO's play? Does the relatively broad democratic approach help the poor to organise themselves? Is "Democracy" what people with an empty stomach want?

As far as Germany is concerned, we asked ourselves: How can we in the North influence international finance institutions like IMF and World Bank? The North has no solution for the problems created by its economy and politics like unemployment, overproduction, new poverty - how can we overcome the still existing attitude as if the South would have the problems, the North solutions?

Although I can't brief you on relevant answers, I like to inform you on our discussion.

Concerning my possible visit in South Africa it seems to be clear now that I don't go for the elections to S.A. That means also that I can't come to Zimbabwe in connection with that trip in May. With regard to the TCC to discuss matters of our future
cooperation in the programme "Let the people speak" has high
priority. However, before booking a flight to Harare I would like
to know whether I can meet people being involved in that
programme.

I would like to fly over to Harare on the 14th of November and must
fly back to Johannesburg on the 15th of November, due to the kind
of flight to and from South Africa.

Since I understand that the General Secretary of the TCC will be
in Harare in the beginning of November, perhaps even being there
already, I address this letter to the acting G.S. as well as to
the General in charge of the "Let the people speak" programme.



Dear Sir, dear brother Kuchera,

greetings to you from Berlin, Germany.

After few years of silence I write you now, because of a request of "Bread for the World".

Gossner Mission is asked by Dr. Wolfgang Mai from "Bread for the World" whether we would be able and willing to serve as the counterpart of ZCC in the bilateral programme "Let the people speak".

We were asked, because we try to combine both. development and solidarity activities with churches in "third world" countries, mainly India, Zambia, South Africa, and awareness building programmes in Germany. Gossner Mission in the former FRG has dealt since many years with the more internal problems of a highly industrialized capitalist society and the role churches and Christians have to play in that context. Gossner Mission in the former GDR which understood herself as a service and witness community in a socialist society has got the experience of being part of the collapsed socialism. We in the East of the united Germany experience now what it means to live in a capitalist society, to be "adjusted" to such a highly developed capitalist economy.

On that background and as part of our present discussion about the necessary struggle against the "new world order", against global injustice and the destroying affluence in our capitalist societies, we see programmes like "Let the people speak" as absolutely necessary and challenging.

We cooperate with various groups and organisations within and outside the church who work in the same direction. We think it would be possible to organize contacts between relevant and representative organisations in Zimbabwe and Germany.


Of course, we have still to find out where the finances for such a programme come from, as far as the German part is concerned. The finances for the ZCC part has been approved, I understood.

Before we can initiate anything and apply for anything we would like to know whether the ZCC is still prepared in implementing that programme.

We would also like to know whether you found already a person who will run the programme on your side.

There might be the possibility to come for a visit to Zimbabwe, if necessary. But before planning anything we need your response.
